1908—Grover Cleveland, ex-President of the United States died in Princeton, N. J. Born in Cornwall, N. J., March 18, 1837.

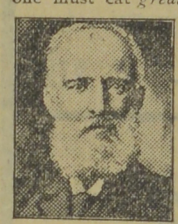

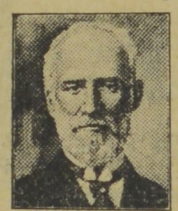

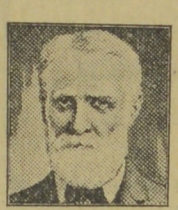
