FREER TRADE THE ISSUE IN SASKATCHEWAN

Regina, Sask., June 20—The Legislature is dissolved. Nominations, Thursday, July 2; elections, Thursday, July 11.

In his proclamation to the electors Premier Scott said: "My Government has been in office for nearly seven years. During that period we have had to deal with a large number of very important problems, the creation of a provincial system of telephones, the establishment of a provincial university and agricultural college, the passing of laws in the interest of citizens and workmen, the hail insurance problems, railway extensions, the protection of the public health, the creation of rural municipalities, the organization of high schools and colleges and the creation of public institutions, including our legislative buildings at Regina.

"The assertion has been made that the government would not appeal to the electors on its record. This is sheer nonsense. There is not a single problem with which we have dealt that we are not prepared to discuss from the public platform. If there is one thing more than another we wish the electors to consider, it is our past program of safe and sane legislation, and our splendid financial condition."

Concerning "wider markets and freer trade" Premier Scott says: "Mr. Haultain and his followers, with two exceptions, voted against the memorial referred to because of its reference to the United States market. Nevertheless none of the matters mentioned in the memorial are of great importance to the people of Saskatchewan. Leaders may say what they like, the issue exists. It is made by the people themselves. Conservatives would like to believe it dead, but it is alive, and must ultimately triumph. The issue embraces the entire field of wider markets, freer trade, and lower tariffs. By a majority of nearly twenty thousand votes, our people declared for these principles last September. They were in earnest then, and unless I misjudge public opinion, the severe lessons of the past season have made them more earnest and more determined to carry on the struggle for their rights.

"It would be idle for me to state this issue is not at stake for this contest. The Provincial Conservative party has adopted a policy and formed an alliance that make the situation clear. They no longer try to conceal the fact that they look almost solely to the assistance of the Federal Government and its political machine to bring about their success. The battle cry of the Conservatives has become 'Saskatchewan for Borden and Haultain.' This can only be interpreted as meaning Saskatchewan for limited markets, restricted trade and higher tariffs."

PREMIER SCOTT IN FORM HEADS FIGHT

Regina, Sask., June 20—Premier Scott made his first public speech Tuesday night in the city in the present campaign when he addressed a good sized gathering at a rally in the Regina Liberal club-rooms. Speaking in vigorous fashion for upwards of forty minutes, Mr. Scott showed that he has wholly recovered from his late serious illness and has regained all his old time vigor.

The Government, the Premier stated, was more than willing to be judged on its seven years' administration record, and asked nothing better than the closest scrutiny by the electorate of its transportation, elevator, and good road policy. He maintained that his government had

more than made good in the performance of their 1908 railway extension promises, fourteen of twenty roads being actually in operation, and all but two of the balance under construction, several of them only waiting for steel, the inadequate supply of which has held up operations.

As announced yesterday, the Legislature is dissolved with nominations set for July 4, and election July 11. The issue of the election writs finds both parties in good shape for the fight. The Conservatives have candidates in all constituencies but one. In the remaining district, Millstone, the convention will be held tomorrow. A. E. Whitmore, the present member, is in Rochester, Minn., awaiting an operation and will not likely be able to enter the fight. It is expected either T. J. How, of Rouleau, or Sam Taylor of Yellowgrass, will be the candidate.

Independent candidates will form an important factor in the present campaign. There is an independent candidate in Swift Current against Premier Scott, in addition to the candidate of the Conservatives and another has taken the field in Arm River. There is every probability of more independents taking part in the campaign.

GRACEFUL TRI- BUTE TO HON. W. S. FIELDING

During the closing years of the Liberal administration, Hon. W. S. Fielding was looked upon as the legitimate successor to Sir Wilfrid Laurier as the leader of the Liberal party in Canada. As a statesman and politician his long career had been a brilliant success.

He entered public life in 1882. From 1881 to 1896 he was premier of Nova Scotia and from 1896 to 1911 he filled the portfolio of minister of finance in the Laurier cabinet in a manner that won for him enormous credit from all classes. His career as minister of finance was both brilliant and spectacular. He gave to Great Britain a preference in our markets. He secured the abolition of old trade treaties made by Great Britain that hampered the expansion of Canadian development. He made the Germans sit up and take notice by imposing a surtax on their imports. He successfully negotiated a commercial treaty with France. These are only a few of the measures with which his name will always be associated and which will give him for all time a commanding place among the eminent men of his day.

His sincerity no man ever questioned. His personal honesty and integrity no one ever impugned.

We have but little doubt but that when he returned from Washington in January of 1911 with the reciprocity pact in his pocket that he looked upon that agreement as the crowning point of his long and successful career.

For half a century Canadian politicians of both parties had been pledged to secure, if possible, better trade relations with the United States. We all know the result. Horses and oats got mixed up with British connection. Potatoes and turnips in Ontario got tangled up with the Ne Temere decree. The railways and big industries took alarm and a landslide took place that swept the Grits out of office.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier needed a first lieutenant in the House it was for Hon. George P. Graham a seat was opened.

True, Mr. Fielding's health was far from the best and the offer may have been made to him, but to us it would appear that the tacticians of the Liberal party realized that Mr. Fielding was a marked man, that his failure was antagonized strong interests and that his nomination would have the same effect as a red banner to a bull and every effort would be made to bring about his defeat.

There are rumors now that he will accept a nomination in Western Canada, where the gospel of "freer trade" is preached with more latitude than is allowed in the east.

The life of a public man is far from being an enviable one. It is the same story as old as the ages. One day it is the crown, the laurels, the plaudits; the next the cross, the defeat, the condemnation.

McDonald, Tupper, Howe, Blake and other men who sacrificed time and strength for the country's good all had the same experience. Hon. Mr. Foster was at one time in his career almost down and out. The Montreal Star and Toronto News read him out of the party but he won his way back to the front rank by his sheer ability.

It was the manipulation of trust funds that was almost the ruin of
