## FINISHING A LONG AUTO TRIP

Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Rhodes of Amherst in City Enroute Home from Toronto—Motored 1500 Miles since June 1

## WANTS PERMANENT HIGHWAY IN THE PROVINCES

Mr. Edgar N. Rhodes, Conservative M. P., for Cumberland, N. S., accompanied by Mrs. Rhodes and her aunt, Miss Carrie Pipes, arrived here on Sunday night by auto and are guests at the Queen. They made the trip from Toronto via the New England States and are on their way to Amherst, N. S. They started from Toronto on June 1st and after a run through Western Ontario crossed the boundary line and went as far south as New York City. In all they have covered a distance of fifteen hundred miles, and when they reach Amherst the total will be seventeen hundred.

Yesterday the party made the run from Bangor, Me., to this city via Houlton and Woodstock, a distance of one hundred and eighty-nine miles.

## FOUND BAD ROADS

Speaking to a Mail representative in regard to his trip Mr. Rhodes said that his object in making the trip from Bangor to St. John by this roundabout way was to get rid of a piece of bad road between St. Andrews and St. John. "I was over it last year," he said, "and once is enough for me." He went on to say that in some portions of the New England States he travelled over macadamized roads, which made motoring a delight. He struck a piece of bad road between Houlton and Woodstock, and on the way down the river came in contact with some bad bridges and culverts, but notwithstanding these drawbacks made very good time.

Mr. Rhodes expressed himself as being greatly delighted with the scenery along the St. John Valley. You have a magnificent country," he said, "capable of supporting a much larger population. I would like to see the government of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia unite and construct a permanent highway road from St. Stephen to Halifax. I believe if such a road were constructed thousands of motorists from the United States would come this way every year, and the money they would leave in the province would more than provide for the interest on the outlay, to say nothing of the direct benefit it would be to our people."

Mr. Rhodes is one of the youngest members of parliament and his friends predict for him a brilliant public career. He redeemed Cumberland for the Conservatives in 1908, and was re-elected last fall, after a most spectacular contest with Mr. H. J. Logan, ex-M. P. as his opponent.

Mr. Rhodes and party took their departure for St. John at 1.30 o'clock this afternoon and will make the run from St. John to Amherst tomorrow.

## DIVINE SERVICE SUNDAY

Interesting Address by their Chaplain Rev. Dean Schofield Delivered at Cathedral

The Boy Scouts attached to Christ Church Cathedral attended divine service at the Cathedral yesterday morning and were addressed by the Chaplain, the Very Rev. Dean Schofield.

The text was taken from Romans, 12-23.—"Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good." The speaker first directed his attention to the parents and congregation generally, recommending the Boy Scouts to them and pointing out that the movement was not merely military, but has as its ultimate aim the development of all the powers of the boy towards good citizenship. The weakening of a boy's interest in any good, clean and healthy exercise had a strong tendency to remove his thoughts from evil. The vows taken by the boys seemed a sufficient endorsement of his position on this point.

Speaking to the boys Dean Schofield admonished them to be true to their vows and faithful to the proper ideals of manhood.

A large congregation listened to the stirring discourse, and a deep interest was displayed in the aims and objects of the movement. At the close of the service Major the Hon. Thomas Ashburnham inspected and highly complimented the boys on their appearance. The Dean also thanked the Parish Church band which kindly furnished music for the parade.

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## MRS. FRANK LISTER

## VICTIM OF PTOMAIN POISONING SUNDAY

Medical Aid Summoned and Recovery is now Expected—Improperly made Cheese said to be Cause of Poisoning

## CANNED GOODS FREQUENTLY CAUSE SUCH CASES

Mrs. Frank Lister, of Saunders Street, was taken dangerously ill at her home yesterday, and, on Dr. H. H. McNally, being summoned, was found to be suffering from ptomaine poisoning. For a time Mrs. Lister's condition was serious but she is now on the way to recovery.

Improperly made cheese is assigned as the source of poisoning in this case Mrs. Lister having eaten a quantity of it a short time before the symptoms of poisoning manifested themselves and it is said that particularly at this season of the year there is considerable danger of ptomaine poisoning from such cheese. Milk which is not in proper condition when used in the making of the cheese is the original cause of ptomaines developing in the cheese.

Similar cases have occurred in this vicinity before. Trout which have been out of water too long before being cooked frequently have caused ptomaine poisoning and canned goods also have done the same. Ptomaines are very apt to develop in such goods if they are allowed to remain in tins after being opened and exposed to the air.

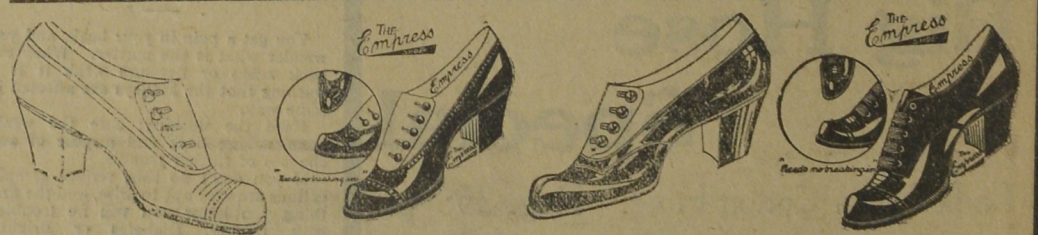
