CALIFORNIA WOMEN ARE
CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS

San Francisco, Oct. 9.—On the eve of tomorrow's general election, following the close of one of the most memorable campaigns in the history of this State, the women of California are confident of the victory of their cause at the polls tomorrow. For many months they have kept up the agitation in favor of women's suffrage, and with remarkable energy and ability they have conducted their State-wide campaign against big odds and despite the powerful influences which the opposition brought to bear upon the campaign. Argumentative literature in favor of women's suffrage was scattered broadcast over the whole State of California; suffrage orators travelled from one end of the State to the other, addressing meetings in the interest of the women's cause; the churches, women's societies and even the school children were enlisted in behalf of the momentous question and nothing was neglected that seemed to offer even the remotest promise of furthering the cause of suffrage.

Now the exciting work of the campaign is ended and both sides to the great suffrage question are resting on their guns eagerly awaiting the decisive battle at the polls tomorrow, which will settle, once and for all, whether the women of California shall be the political equals of the men or not. The advocates of women's suffrage, although admitting that they shall have to contend against a strong opposition, express themselves confident of victory. They believe that the strenuous work of

their campaign was by no means wasted but that it caused the conversion of thousands of voters heretofore prejudiced against woman's suffrage.

The woman's suffrage amendment to the Constitution, it is true, is by far the most important of the twenty or more constitutional amendments to be voted on at tomorrow's election, but there are several among them which claim considerable attention on the part of the voters. Although the other amendments have received less attention during the past campaign, some of them are really far more important than the woman suffrage amendment. Among them is an amendment which provides for the initiative and referendum in State legislation. Other amendments provide for the recall of the elective officers of the State, for county charters, and county home rule; for eliminating technical errors as a ground for reversal in criminal cases for direct legislation enlargement of the powers of the railroad commission; the abolition of justice courts; for the inclusion of judges of the district court of appeals among those State officers who may be impeached, providing for a divided session of the legislature, municipal ownership for borough organization in chartered cities. The other amendments about ten in number, are of minor importance and have been almost entirely overlooked, as they were overshadowed by the much greater importance of the other questions at issue.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—The football season opened today both in the intercollegiate and interprovincial leagues with games in Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto and Kingston. In the intercollegiate league, Toronto by an easy win over Queens looked like strong contenders for the championship which they have held for three years. The Hamilton Tigers last year's champions in the interprovincial league went down in defeat in Toronto before the Argonauts after a hard game. Ottawa had difficulty in defeating Montreal although the former were conceded an easy win.

TORONTO BEATS QUEENS

Kingston, Oct. 7.—Queens team went down to an 18-6 defeat before Toronto today. Jack Maynard the Toronto player on the field and pulled off some brilliant runs.

OTTAWA BEATS MONTREAL

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The Ottawa team was behind at half time in their

match with the Mantrealers today, but showed a superior stamina and pulled out a victory by vigorous work in the third quarter. A feature was the reappearance of Teddy Savage the big wing man with Montreal. The final score was 15-9.

MCGILL A WINNER

Montreal, Oct. 7.—The McGill outclassed Ottawa college in the opening game of the Intercollegiate Rugby season here today. The local backs outkicked and outran the visiting defence, and the McGill line proved better tacklers than the Ottawa wing men.

The final score was 20-5. Capt. Johnston of the McGill team, received a kick on the head in a scrimmage which knocked him out and he is suffering from a slight concussion. Gillmore, last year's captain who took his place broke his thumb. Jimmy Lee one of the McGill backs twisted his knee making a tackle, and

IN FREDERICTON

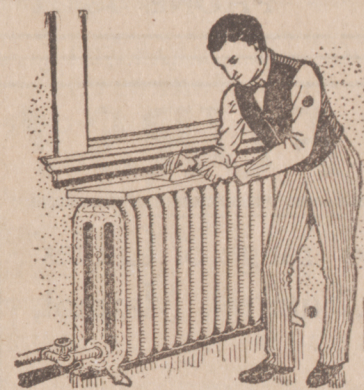

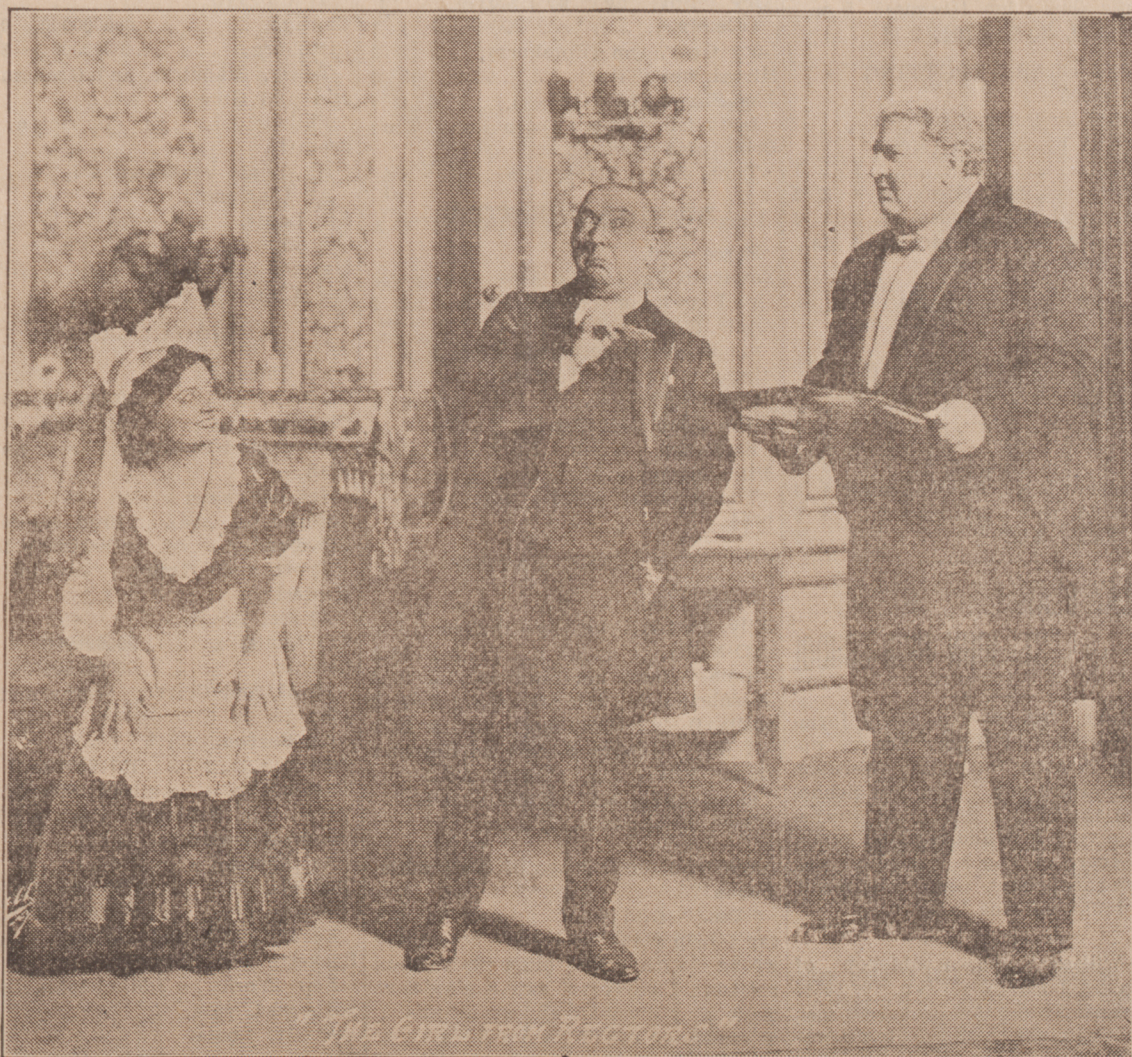
