### MISS DEFOREST

### MADE NEW MARK

### IN 3-YEAR-OLD PACE

Braden Direct Won the Event at Lexington However—Argot Hal Came Back in 2.24 Pace

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 6.—The pacers lugged with world's records this afternoon, Miss DeForest lowering the mark for 3-year-olds, traveling the sidelong gait to 2.05½, and Ess H. Kay smashing our miles in 2.03½, 2.02, equaling the fastest two-heat race won by a stallion.

Miss DeForest's sensational performance came in the fourth heat of the pacing future, which furnished the fastest and longest contest ever put up by young pacers. The race lasted seven heats and was won by the original favorite, Braden Direct, who looked a beaten colt when darkness stopped racing on Thursday.

The handsome son of Baron Direct forced Miss DeForest to her champion ship mile, which was made with the wind blowing very strongly. The terrific effort told on the filly, and with King Daphne making breaks, Braden Direct was able to win without having to take as fast a record as the other heat winners. His heats were in 2.08½, 2.09½, 2.11½, while Miss DeForest went in 2.06½, 2.05½ and King Daphne in 2.07½, 2.10.

The splendid race paced by Ess H. Kay was a surprise, as he was the least thought of in the field made up of Evelyn W as favorite, Earl Jr second choice, Lady Maud C third and Independence Boy fourth. The race was a profitable one for the New Englanders, as they played the field well against Evelyn W rather than picking Earl Jr.

### HORSE BROKE LEG

The 2.07 trot was a gift for Grace, the Futurity winner of a year ago. She was in against an ordinary field and did not have to approach her mark of 2.05½.

Peter Dorsey, 2.07½, made a misstep over at the quarter pole in the second heat, broke a leg and was shot to end his sufferings.

Argot Hal, the trotting-bred pacer, who loomed up as one of the cracks earlier in the season and then went lame, reappeared and won the 2.24 class. He was up to a mile in 2.08, but being short of work, hog-fat and a bit sore, could not repeat, losing the third heat; but by loading along to the three-quarters at a 2.16 clip, he pulled down the money by brushing home in 31½.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
