TurfTHE EEL WON  
IN STRAIGHT HEATS  
AT GOSHEN, N. Y.Sterling Hall Won 2.24 Trot in Six  
Heat Race--Acted Badly How-  
ever

Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 22--With ideal weather and in the presence of a crowd that broke all records for the first day, the grand circuit race meeting here opened this afternoon under the most favorable conditions. There was a crowd of 6,000 in attendance. The new steel grandstand, the gift of Mrs. E. H. Harriman, was filled and hundreds of persons watched the racing from vehicles in the infield.

There were three good races on the card, and all were hotly contested. In the free-for-all pace The Eel was the winner in straight heats. There were five starters and each heat was very close, but the gray horse had too much brush at the finish and won out each time in a drive in the homestretch. The time was very fast for a two-lap course--2.07½, 2.06½, 2.07½.

In the first heat of the 2.24 trot Sterling Hall came under the wire first, but was placed second for running. Sterling Hall was leading 60 yards from the wire, when he broke and ran the rest of the mile. Ucon, driven by Robert Proctor of Readville, Mass., was given the heat.

The next heat was a repetition of the first, only Sterling Hall, after leading all the way, went up at the 100-yard post and finished last. Upon winning the heat. In scoring for the next heat Ucon acted badly, refusing to come down and delaying the starting for 15 minutes. A colored groom took hold of his head and led him.

Finally he was gotten off three lengths behind the field. He went a good heat and finished second in 2.14½. Sterling Hall won this heat. The next heat Ucon acted badly again. A pair of blinkers was put on him and he ran into the fence and was distanced. Fortunately he was not hurt. Sterling Hall won the heat.

Then Nat Ray came to the front with Emily Morris and captured the fifth heat. Sterling Hall finishing second. The final heat went to Sterling Hall in 2.18.

The association gives a \$50 drivers' prize for the driver winning in straight heats. The third event on the program was the Inn purse for 2.20 trotters, amateurs to drive. Border Guard was too fast for his field and was never headed in either heat.

Willy will start tomorrow afternoon to beat the record of 2.100 that he made here last year. Thursday Uhan will go to beat the track record of 2.08½. The summary:

TERRIBLE SLAUGHTER  
AT SCULLY'S GROVE  
YESTERDAYWoodstock Won 10 to 2--Locals Blew  
up in Seventh Spasm--Game To-  
day

Woodstock won 10 to 2 yesterday at Scully's Grove, Fredericton blowing up gracefully in the seventh inning. Stan Bates did the pitching for Fredericton and was effective until the fatal seventh. Up to that time he had been found for only two hits but in the seventh Woodstock took to his benders to the extent of five safe bingles and a base on balls and two errors contributed to the grand total of six runs. That turned the score from 2 to 1 in Fredericton's favor to 7 to 2 in Woodstock's favor and the visitors had the game won. Larry Conley went into the box in the seventh and finished the game. Two hits were made off him in the eighth. He passed a man and another couple of errors let Woodstock score three more.

Up to the seventh inning the game was as good as any seen here this year both teams fielding in sloppy fashion and the pitchers holding the batsmen down. Bates was rather a mystery but was wild passing seven men. Urquhart was hit often enough and hard enough for Fredericton to win the game in the first five innings. After that he allowed but one safe hit and had Fredericton eating out of his hand. The locals played in hard luck. Griffin had a finger put out by being struck by the ball and hurt an ankle sliding to second. In left field Tift tripped and fell going after an easy fly and the ball fell safely for two bases. Rain threatened early in the afternoon and on that account a small crowd witnessed the slaughter.

TennisEVELYN W. BEAT  
INDEPENDENCE BOY  
AT COLUMBUSBoy Was the Favorite but Lost in Four  
Heats--Great Racing Witnessed  
by 10,000

Columbus, O., Aug. 22--Columbus lovers of the harness horse racing sport flocked to the track in droves today in the hope of seeing their favorite and home-owned pacer Independence boy win again from Earl Jr., in the champion sweepstakes for pacers. But Independence Boy had a bad knee and with it swollen twice its size from pounding in his race at Cleveland and here last week, he was drawn.

But the disappointment of 10,000 spectators was soon turned into cheers by the greatest turf battle seen here this meeting, when Evelyn W. came down from Buffalo and took up the challenge that the Boy could not fulfill. After four heats a world's record was again broken, and Evelyn W. was beaten the gray king of the quarter-stretch at his own game.

In the first mile Evelyn W. is third position, separately timed, paced home in 58½. The official last half for the heat was 59½. Earl Jr. had loathed the first half, confident that he could outstep Evelyn W. home.

In the second heat he defeated his challenger in 2.03, but the last quarter was paced in 29½ seconds.

In the third heat Evelyn W. hung onto Earl Jr., until the five-eighths pole, where she pushed her nose ahead and held it there by a foot to the wire. This scorching quarter was paced in 28½ seconds.

Cox in the fourth heat decided to drive at top speed the entire mile. The half was reached in 1.01½. Home they came neck-and-neck, and again Evelyn W. nosed her challenger out in 2.02½.

These times break the four-heat record, made in a race won by John M. in 1904. The time of those four heats was 2.02, 2.06, 2.03½, 2.03½. It was also the fastest fourth heat ever paced. Robert J. had held that record, since 1896, when he paced it in 2.02½.

Earl Jr. was heavily backed in the pools and a lot of money was lost on him.

The Buckeye stake, worth \$500, for 2.12 trotters, was another gruelling contest. Belvasia and Stroller split the first four heats. The drive in the second was a thriller. The first four horses came home under a blanket, none of them stepping as low as 2.06. The time, 2.05½, gave Stroller a new record.

Belvasia finally won the race in the fifth heat. The Huguenot, after trotting three great miles, was distanced in the fourth heat, after a bad race. Ernest took the 2.15 pace in straight heats. The summary:
