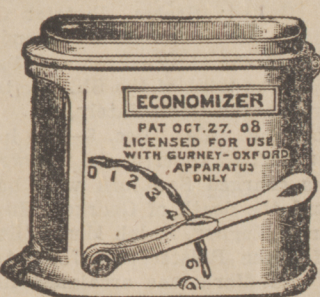

WHAT ONE SHORT YEAR BROUGHT ABOUT IN POLITICS

What a change a year has brought in Canadian politics!

Yesterday the House of Commons rejected an amendment to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, moved by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his capacity of leader of the Opposition, in which it was presented:

"We beg to represent to Your Royal Highness that, by resolution of this House, adopted the 29th of Mar. 1909, it was affirmed that:

"This House fully recognize the duty of the people of Canada, as they increase in numbers and wealth to assume in larger measure the responsibilities of national defence."

"And further:

"This House will cordially approve of any necessary expenditure designed to promote the speedy organization of a Canadian naval service."

"That in pursuance of that resolution the late administration proceeded to adopt a well defined policy of naval organization."

"That with regard to that policy, as well as to the whole question of naval defence, there is in the present Cabinet a flagrant conflict of opinion and that some of its members have repeatedly, both before and during the last elections, denounced naval defence in any form whatsoever."

"We respectfully submit to Your Royal Highness that it is a fundamental principle of constitutional government that the advisers of the Crown shall be heartily in accord on all important questions of public policy, and that the inclusion by the Prime Minister, in the present Cabinet, of members holding such

diametrically opposite views on a question of the highest importance to the Dominion and the Empire, is contrary to the well understood principles of responsible government and should not receive the approval of the House."

This amendment was rejected by a majority of 44, the vote standing: Conservatives and Nationalists, 121; Liberals, 77.

What happened 363 days ago? On that day the division upon the address took place, or rather the divisions, for there were two of them.

The first division was upon Mr. Borden's sub-amendment, and it was rejected by a majority of 58, the vote standing: Liberals, 126; Conservatives, 10.

That amendment said:

"We beg to assure Your Excellency of the unalterable attachment and devotion of the people of Canada to the British Crown and country in its position as one of the nations of the Empire. And we desire to express our regret that Your Excellency's gracious speech gives no indication of any intention on the part of Your Excellency's advisers to consult the people as to the naval policy of Canada."

The second division was upon Mr. Monk's amendment. It was rejected by 53 majority, the vote being, Liberal, 120; Conservatives, 67.

That amendment read:

"This House regrets that the speech gives no indication whatever of the intention of the government to consult the people as to the naval policy and the general question of the contribution of Canada to Imperial armaments."—Toronto Star.

ARMOUR CONCERN BUYS A BIG PLANT

London, Dec. 7—The reported prospective purchase of Nelson and Company's Argentine meat plant by Armour and Company for two and a half million dollars, is generally credited here and has filled the English salesman with some apprehension as they foresee the complete manipulation of the British trans-Atlantic importing trade by American interests to the detriment of Canada and England alike.

MEETING OF UTAH WOOLGROWERS

Salt Lake City, Utah, Dec. 8—Optimistic reports concerning the outlook for the woolgrowing industry in this State were presented today at the annual convention of the Utah Woolgrowers' Association. The convention, which is one of the largest in point of attendance ever held by the association, will continue in session over tomorrow.

S. Consul in this city, on the "New Brunswick" in which it is pleasing to note that the province receives the benefit of valuable advertising gratis and complimentary observations are passed upon the fruit growing possibilities. The following is what Mr. Culver has to say:

"Apple culture in New Brunswick province has received great impetus through the recent apple show held in St. John. It was a splendid exhibition of almost perfect fruit, and was a revelation to the people, showing as it did what scientific cultivation on will accomplish and what the climate and soil of New Brunswick can produce."

"There were displayed all the leading varieties of apples, perfect in texture, flavor and coloring, including the McIntosh Red, Fameuse, Dudley Winter, Wealthy, Wolfe River, Alexander, Bethel, Bishop Pippin, Golden Russet, King of Tompkins, Ben Davis, Northern Spy, Stark, Talman Sweet, Wagner Gano, Baxter Gravenstein, Blenheim Pippin, Grimes, Golden Ontario, Fallowater, Salome, Baldwin, Canada Baldwin, Blue Pearmain, Scott Winter, and St. Lawrence."

"There were sixty barrels, 650 boxes and 1,422 plates, attractively and artistically arranged. The provincial department of agriculture exhibited 448 boxes."

"The apple industry had received little attention in New Brunswick until the department of agriculture began to present scientific methods of cultivation, which caused the people to realize their opportunities. From the interest manifested in the lectures and demonstrations by leading horticulturists it is safe to say that this province is destined to become a great apple country."
