On the completion of the bridge it was moved to the farm on the hill, then owned by the late Postmaster Hilgard. Mr. Eastman occupied it as a dwelling for many years.

UNIQUE HOLDUP AT ENTWISTLE

Entwistle, Dec. 6.—Full and satisfactory adjustment of the recent differences arising between the Railway Commissioners and local officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific at this place appears now to be assured through the energetic action of a committee of determined citizens, who are today making no effort to keep back the facts from publication. Upon the refusal of the G.T.P. train crews to obey the recent order of the Commissioners to make regular stops at Entwistle as well as the suburban station a mile and a quarter outside the town, the committee mentioned organized a night party with red lanterns, boarded the train in true outlaw style, and after paying the fare of 20 cents per head, as demanded by the conductor for their few minutes ride of a mile and a quarter to the suburban station proceeded to advertise the situation to the train's passengers.

It had been the plan of the "hold-up" committee, in case the train crew should not accede to their wishes to go to Edson and board the Division Superintendent with a formal demand for explanation as to his reasons for failure to comply with the order of the Railway Commissioners. This proved unnecessary as the Superintendent was on board, and was also wroth, stating to the committee the next morning in no mild language that stopping a train was a penitentiary offence and that action on that ground had already been commenced.

The committee advised the Superintendent to go ahead with the action as that was just the kind of publicity they were looking for. Finding his threats as well as his bluffs futile, the Superintendent ordered the train stopped at Entwistle, and even became so docile as to promise regular stops at this station in future. A monster petition of Entwistle citizens is now being prepared with a view to bringing the G.T.P. officials into a clearer understanding of up-to-date hold-up methods when townsfolk rights are called in question. As there was no bloodshed in this instance it is generally believed that the Entwistle outlaws will not be immediately prosecuted for their determined undertaking as a red lantern organization.

QUERIES ANSWERED

Hon. Mr. Cochrane told E.M. MacDonald that the government does not propose to introduce a bill confirming the lease of the Vale Railway from the Acadia Coal Company, and stated that the passenger service for the people of Thoburn has been discontinued.

Mr. MacDonald was also told by Hon. Mr. Cochrane that P. S. Archibald had been employed in an engineering capacity by the government to report on the acquisition of the proposed branch line of the Intercolonial.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley was told that the transcontinental work which remains to be done between Moncton and Lewis consists of fifty-three miles of track to be laid; eighty-three miles of ballasting; twenty miles of grading; one per cent of bridge superstructure and ninety per cent of work on station buildings.

REGINA'S NEW LEGISLATIVE BUILDINGS

Regina, Sask., Dec. 8.—His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught will be asked to officiate at the formal opening of the new Saskatchewan parliament buildings. The date for the opening has been fixed but as buildings are now practically completed it is expected the opening will take place early in the coming year.

The new parliament buildings, the corner stone of which was laid October 4, 1909, by Earl Grey, then Governor General of Canada, it to be by far the most imposing structure in the Province. The building consists of a main structure, surmounted by an imposing dome and flanked by two large wings. The design of the exterior is a free adaptation of English Renaissance work, combining dignity, simplicity and purity of style.

The main entrance is by a triple doorway through a spacious vestibule, into the main entrance hall. The chief feature of the interior arrangement is the magnificent legislative chamber, which was designed after a careful study of the principal legislative halls of American and European capitals. An unobstructed view of the speaker's rostrum is to be had from every part of the house. Public galleries line three sides of the chamber.

The council room and the departments of the provincial government and premier have given places of honor on the main floor of the central structure, with the offices of the clerk close at hand. The reading room, stack room and committee rooms occupy much of the space in the last wing, while the west wing will be given over to writing rooms, public waiting rooms and offices for members.

A part of the ground floor will be assigned also to the public works, treasury and agricultural department of the government. The attorney-general's department, the department of education, the department of railways and those of the provincial secretary and municipal commissioner will be located on the second floor. In the basement will be provided the dining room for members, the staff lunch rooms, and a completely equipped kitchen. Sixty fireproof vaults have been installed in the building for the safe-keeping of the provincial records and official accounts.

The building was erected from plans drawn by a leading firm of Montreal architects. When completed the structure will represent a total outlay of nearly \$1,500,000 and will take rank among the finest public edifices on the American continent.

At the present time the local government appoints the clerk of the peace and the clerks of the Circuit and County Courts. These offices are filled by lawyers who do not reside in the County and when they visit it they leave behind a bill of costs which the ratepayers must pay. Mr. Perley takes the ground that as the government appoints these officers, it should provide the money to pay them and he has promised to see that this is done.

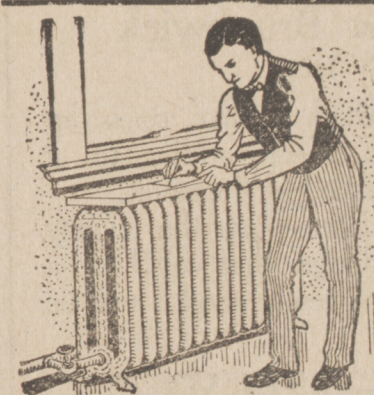
