TEAM ORGANIZED  
LAST NIGHT

Two Upper Canadian Players Likely to be Imported—Four Old-timers to be on Deck

Moncton, Dec. 7.—Some twenty-five representative citizens met in the Supreme Court Chambers this evening to consider the hockey situation. It was decided to organize a professional hockey club for the Maritime League, to be known as the Victorias. One defence and one forward man will probably be imported from the upper provinces.

The local men will be Wortman, goal; Crockett, Gregory and Norman. A subscription list was opened and a considerable amount subscribed. F. W. Sumner heading the list with \$100.

It was estimated that \$5,000 would be required to put the club through the season, of which, of course, a large amount will come from the games.

Officers were elected as follows: F. W. Sumner, president. Mayor Kelly, vice-president. C. F. Gross, secretary-treasurer. Managing Committee—F. R. Sumner, chairman; P. A. Belliveau, Dr. F. R. Taylor and the secretary-treasurer.

OTTAWA WILL NOT  
BUY TAYLOR'S RELEASE

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—It is learned from a fairly authoritative source the Ottawa Hockey Club will not attempt to secure Fred Taylor by purchase or otherwise from the Wanderer Club of Montreal, and that if the celebrated hockeyist performs in the east at all this year it will be with the Wanderers. Those who know something about N.H.A. matters in Ottawa also state that Russell Bowie, the old Victoria rover, will be seen in Wanderer colors this season. Bowie has been sought after by the professional clubs for many years, but never took the leap.

## HOOF BEATS

Trainer Don McLain who raced the trotter Jack London in 1910 and drove him to a record of 2,124 states that before going to see the trotter that was raced this year as Professor Spinx, 2,114 he received a letter offering him \$1000 if he would make affidavit that Professor Spinx was not Jack London, 2,124.

Walter W. 2,044 has proved a profitable horse for Bob Neil. In the three years Mr. Geers' nephew has owned the son of Little Frank he has won \$14,250 in 32 starts. He has been first in 13 races and only three times has he been back of the money. Driven by his caretaker "Dutch" he set the Montgomery Ala. track record at 2,044 this fall.

The comfort of horses is studied in Kacous. A new rule that works well there is to put into hivery stables all horses found standing unblanketed. The owner is compelled to pay the cost of this procedure and soon learns that his horses must be made comfortable before leaving them. It has superseded the system of arrears and fines and seemingly increases the number of humane persons.

This is Pardee's answer: "You and I cannot do business for I have learned that Sterling McKinney is not a poor man's horse."

"Ringing" of Jack London for Prof. Spinx Severely Punished—Horse has been Suspended

New York, Dec. 6.—At a session which lasted all afternoon and until late last night the Board of Review of the National Trotting Association passed a sentence of expulsion upon A. E. Richardson of Coldwater Mich., for "ringing" the horse Jack London, 2,124 as Professor Spinx. The horse was suspended until the illegal winnings through him \$1,690 and a fine of \$50 for changing his name have been paid and the money distributed to the rightful winners.

Chas. H. Haskins of Fattall was expelled for "ringing" Hattie M., a bay trotter as Girdle, in a local race at the Greene county fair at Cairo, N.Y.

Charles P. Doble who was suspended for non-payment of his entrance fee in a race held under the auspices of the Maryland State Fair Association at Laurel, Md., remains suspended by the Board.

The judges in a match race at Huntington Pa., were sustained in awarding the race to Albert Bellini, in his contest with Black Nig, the question of a run under the wire being involved.

Trouble also centred around Professor Spinx at Montreal on August the 3rd last, when his winning of the 2,32 trotting event at Delorimier Park was protested. It was then said that the horse came into the country under the name of "Tahier" and the owner had no right to change it.

R. C. R. AT HALIFAX  
WANTS GALLOWAY  
FOR HOCKEY TEAM

The R.C.R. at Halifax is after Alex. Galloway of "H" Company, R.C.R., of this city to play in the regimental team in the Garrison Hockey League. If the hockey situation does not develop here, shortly, he will probably be transferred to one of the companies at the Royal Canadian station at Halifax, leaving after Christmas. It is likely, however, that steps will be taken shortly to re-organize the Fredericton hockey team and Galloway, in that event, will stay here.

A four-team New Brunswick Hockey League, composed of St. John, Fredericton, Marysville and St. Stephen, has been proposed. Such a league would be more compact than that of 1911.
