SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

MARYSVILLE TRIMMED SUSSEX 4 TO 1, IN LAST NIGHT'S GAME

Visitors Took a Brace in Second Period and Out-scored Crescents—Wade of Marysville Star of Game—Len Inch Prominent—St. John to be Ordered to Play here Tuesday

Sussex dropped another game last night Marysville winning 4 to 1 in a game which showed features similar to those of the Sussex-Fredericton game. Marysville did all their scoring in the first half before Sussex got going. In the second half the visitors made their one lonely tally and beat Marysville's attack off their own net. The Sussex team in both games played here has shown an ability to last and to play a very effective game in the second half.

CHANGES IN STANDING

As a result of last night's game Sussex have finished their schedule with a standing of .500 having won all games on their own ice and lost all foreign matches.

Fredericton with three games lost and three won has the same standing but has two games to play, with St. John and Marysville. It is probable that President Inch of the N. B. H. L. will set Tuesday next as the date for replaying the Fredericton-St. John game here. The St. John people through the press have stated that they will not play the match. If they will not play they will have to default. Marysville by winning last night's game goes up one place in the league standing and Chatham drops to the bottom.

NO STRIKING FEATURES

Last night's game had no striking features. Sussex seemed more used to the rink and they skated in good style. White and Mace were the two Sussex men who shone on the forward line. Eveleigh at cover point was more noticeable than he had been the night before. Fenwick the point played a peculiar form of defence staying in the net with the goal-keeper almost all the time. The pair guarded the nets well particularly in the second half.

For Marysville Wade was the star and the opinion was freely expressed that he should have been playing on the team throughout the season. Dennison and Robertson on the wings played hard all through the game. Len Inch at point came back hard his rushing and defence playing being prominent at all times.

STARTED FAST

The game started fast with play about even. Inch and Dennison were prominent for Marysville and White for Sussex. Inch rushed from end to end but failed to score. Sussex was kept on the defensive. Fenwick stuck right in the net and the visitors played a stubborn defensive game. The Sussex forwards were letting their opponents through however. Bird got through and passed to Hovey who scored Marysville's first goal.

Marysville bored right in and Wade scored three minutes afterward. He repeated the trick one minute later. Sussex bucked up and Mace put a shot in that looked good but Fullerton saved. Marysville relieved the pressure and Robertson scored from a mix-up.

Sussex was not discouraged. White and Leclair took the disc down again and again but Fullerton was ready each time.

A light went out and there was a pause while it was being fixed. Then it was discovered that Roy Robertson had cut his foot. Manager McLeod of Sussex declined to drop a man and then there was a wait until Robertson had his injury attended to.

SECOND HALF

Marysville started the second half with a rush. Play stayed at the Sussex end. Fenwick and Smiley were both in the net and kept the Crescents from scoring. Dennison got 3 minutes for tripping.

Sussex rushed the play to the other end but failed to put the disc in. Inch rushed the puck to the Sussex end. Sussex took it back and Mace scored after a good piece of combination. Sussex had another chance right afterward but failed to take advantage of it. Play went to the other end and Eveleigh tried to stop the disc by throwing his stick. He got 3 minutes with the timers for it. Inch rushed from end to end and repeated the trick but his shot was stopped. Dennison got by everybody but his shot was stopped by Fenwick. Roy Robertson and Eveleigh mixed things and the Marysville man took a rest in the penalty box.

SUSSEX PLAYING HARD

Sussex were playing fast. White got away several times and lost the rubber each time. Marysville became aggressive. Fenwick was cautioned for kneeling in goal. Hovey was penalized for tripping and shortly afterward time expired.

He ran last time only at the express and urgent desire of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at whose repeated solicitations he first consented to enter the government.
