U.N.B. APPEALS TO TROPHY TRUSTEES IN HOCKEY TANGLE

Acadia Refuses to Call Meeting of Faculty Representatives and Asks for Replay at Wolfville

The matter of awarding the Summer Trophy which emblematic of the Intercollegiate Hockey Championship of the Maritime Provinces has been referred to the trustees of the trophy two of whom, Hon. F. J. Sweeney and Hon. H. F. McLeod, are now in the city. Acadia, which played a tie game with the U. N. B. at Wolfville some time ago has informed the local college that there is no necessity for holding a meeting of faculty representatives to consider the matter of the U. N. B. protest of one of the goals scored by Acadia in one of the tie games and has requested U. N. B. to make arrangements for replaying the game at Wolfville. The coolness of Acadia's proposal and refusal to call a meeting has not been very well received by U. N. B.

ACADIA'S PROPOSAL

The first communication from Acadia concerning the matter came yesterday when a wire from Wolfville was received stating that the secretary of the M. P. A. A. A. had decided that the U. N. B. had no ground for protest and that U. N. B. must defeat Acadia in Wolfville before it could claim the championship.

U. N. B. REPLIES

U. N. B. replied by asking that a meeting of faculty representatives be held for the purpose of reconsidering the protest. Today the following telegram was received here:

Wolfville, March 3.

H. G. Deedes, Pres. U. N. B. A. A. A., Meeting or protest at this late date illegal and useless as protest on goal judge's decision cannot be won. We have no reason to call meeting. Have you other than protest? How about date of play-off? Would suggest Trites as referee.

MOCK TRIAL TOMORROW

NIGHT WILL PRESENT

INTERESTING FEATURES

The annual Mock Trial at the University will be held in the library at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening. The case besides containing the usual college "pests" will have something of local interest this year. The prisoner Mr. Abinidab O. Gunter is thought to be the agent for T. Eaton Co., a mail order house in Toronto. He is arrested on a charge of robbing the mails on the Gibson Branch in an effort to get letters containing money orders to this house.

The evidence will be brought out by the following witnesses: Isaac Methuselah Levi, a Hebrew merchant; Sarah Heartburn, a lady of fashion; Ebenezer Stoooper, a politician; Sgt. Chaplain, a policeman; Mrs. Stavem, a boarding house mistress; Johnny Sawed-off-short an orphan; Hop Ling Tong, laundryman; Rev. George Washington Roy, preacher (colored) Tom Longboat, mail clerk.

The officers of the court will be: Judge, Mr. Justice H. G. Deedes; Clerk of the Court, E. R. Macnutt; Crier, G. P. Carpenters. The counsel for the prosecution will be R. B. Clark and R. M. Smith, counsel for the prisoner H. C. Belyea and J. T. Hebert.

There will be no admission charge and it is expected that there will be a large number of spectators present.

COURT DECREES MARRIAGE ANNULLED IN EVANS CASE

Plaintiff may Assume Maiden Name— Court Orders her to be Paid \$75 per Month

In the Divorce Court this morning His Honor Judge McKeown gave judgment in the case of Maud Katherine Evans vs William Herbert Evans in which evidence was taken some days ago. His Honor dissolved the marriage and gave the plaintiff the right to resume her maiden name. He also decreed that the plaintiff should be paid seventy-five dollars a month by the defendant as long as she should retain her maiden name, payment to begin on issuance of the decree. The judgment was a lengthy one and reviewed the evidence in detail. The plaintiff in this case was Miss Bishop of Bathurst. She and the defendant resided in Montreal where the offense alleged in the libel took place. Miss Laura Moore co-respondent in the case was stenographer for the defendant. The fence in this case was withdrawn early in the proceedings.

OTHER CASES

The Court will sit again on the 16th instant when the case of Galloway vs Galloway will be continued and evidence in the case of Clarke vs. Clarke heard. The latter case up to the present time is undecided. Further evidence will be taken in the Galloway case. It is probable that the counsel for the plaintiff will endeavor to call witnesses in rebuttal of the evidence of the defendant. The defence is expected to make objection.

IMPORTATION OF DAIRY STOCK PRACTICALLY PROMISED

Delegation from F. and D. Association Waited on Government this Morning—Seed-judging Demonstration

A delegation from the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association waited upon the members of the Provincial Government this morning and requested that steps be taken by the government to import dairy-cattle. The delegation was composed of Mr. Riley of Melrose, Westmorland Co., Mr. B. M. Fawcett of Sackville and Mr. Morris Scovil of Gagetown. Col. H. Montgomery-Campbell of Apohaqui accompanied the delegation which acted in pursuance of a resolution passed by the F. & D. Association yesterday.

The delegation was received by practically the entire government and presented their views emphasizing the need of encouragement of the dairy industry and the benefit which would follow the importation of dairy stock particularly Ayrshires and shorthorns.

In reply the delegation was told that the government intended to give the matter earnest consideration and action was practically promised.

SEED-JUDGING

This morning the members of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association devoted their attention to a demonstration in seed-judging in which Mr. S. J.
