FINAL DIVIDEND ON STANDARD OIL

The directors of the Standard Oil Co., of New Jersey are scheduled to meet next Wednesday to take action on the quarterly dividend disbursement, which it is understood will be the last of this stock before the dissolution of the company.

It is expected that \$10 will be declared the same rate as this time a year ago, although in some quarters an even larger distribution is looked for.

C. P. R. DECLARES THE USUAL DIVIDEND

Montreal, Nov. 13.—At a meeting of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company held today a dividend of two and one-half per cent. on common stock for the quarter ending Sept. 30 last being at the rate of seven per cent per annum from revenue and three per cent per annum from interest on the proceeds of land sales and other extraneous assets was declared payable Jan. 2, next to shareholders of record at 3 p.m. on Dec. 1 next.

UNION BANK TO MOVE

Quebec, Nov. 11.—Mr. Balfour, general manager of the Union Bank of Canada, speaking of the coming removal of the bank's headquarters to Winnipeg is unable to give even the probable date of the change.

The shareholders must vote on the proposition next month, and then the bill to authorize the change must pass parliament. Afterwards the directors will decide the date of removal.

Mr. Balfour however has nothing whatever to add to the announcement of the causes for the change contained in the president's letter to shareholders which points out that 59 of the bank's 245 branches are west of the Great Lakes and that desirability of more central supervision.

The change is altogether in the interests of the bank's shareholders, says the president and general manager both of whom express personal regret that it should be necessary to remove the head office from Quebec, where they state however that he large business being done by the bank here will be well taken care of. The bank has only two branches east of Quebec, and the new head office in Winnipeg will be about midway between eastern and western operations.
