## COURTNEY BAY MAY BE ABANDONED

(St. John Telegraph.)

It was rumored in the streets yesterday that H. A. Woods, chief engineer of the eastern section of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and A. M. Bouillon, district engineer of the G.T.P. in New Brunswick, are soon to visit L'Etang, Charlotte County, for the purpose of making a detailed inspection and arranging for surveys with the idea of establishing the company's Atlantic terminal there. If this rumor be true the decision of the company to find an outlet at L'Etang instead of at St. John, will come as a great blow to the people of this city who had hoped for so much in the development of Courtney Bay.

Mr. Bouillon was asked last night by a Telegraph reporter if there was any truth in the rumor, and he refused either to confirm or deny it. Mr. Bouillon courteously informed the reporter that he was not in a position to give out any information on the company's plans at the present time.

It was intimated yesterday about the streets that the prospects for development at Courtney Bay were not bright, and that it was for that reason that the G.T.P. is seeking an outlet at L'Etang. Such a rumor must, of course, have a disquieting effect on the minds of those citizens of St. John who hoped to see in the near future a fine harbor at Courtney Bay and, incidentally, a rapid growth in the city, which has made so little progress.

Prominent citizens when spoken to about the matter last night, expressed fear that the G.T.P. might be forced to take some action as indicated in the rumor, but declared that any failure on the part of the government to carry on the harbor development work so favorably and earnestly undertaken by Hon. Dr. Pugsley should be most emphatically condemned by the people of St. John.

The G.T.P. should it decide to place its terminal at L'Etang, would probably build a line, it is thought, from Nappadogan direct to that port.

It may be interesting to note that a paragraph appeared in a Charlotte County paper a few days ago to the effect that Dr. Daniel had visited St. Andrews and had intimated that there might be important developments at L'Etang.

## LEADER ROWELL OPENS CAMPAIGN

Toronto, Nov. 14.—N. W. Rowell, the new leader of the Liberal party in Ontario, opened his campaign tonight at a mass meeting in Massey Hall. The meeting was well attended and Mr. Rowell received a good hearing.

After paying a brief tribute to the qualities of his predecessor, A. G. MacKay, Mr. Rowell proceeded to outline his platform. Referring to the statements that it was much like that of the conservative party, Mr. Rowell stated that in that case the remarks of the Conservative press that it was a milk and water platform and that it was not sufficiently progressive might react as a boomerang.

He then referred to the criticism of Sir James Whitney that it had taken a long time to hatch such a skimpy chicken and said that he would proceed to show that his platform was not one skimpy chicken but that it was a brood of ten lusty reform chickens which was a far stronger brood than the three skimpy legislative chickens which Sir James had hatched out during his year of power.

### SUCCESSFUL SERVICES.

Fine music, inspiring sermon, large gathering and cheering results were the prominent features of the special service in the Methodist Church last night. "And he made as though he would have gone further," was the text of Rev. Neil McLaughlan as he strikingly pictured Christ after His resurrection walking on the road to Emmaus, where He overtook disciples as they were discussing the great surprise of the empty sepulchre. As the preacher described in detail the many incidents of that day his audience followed him closely and in the application of his theme he pleaded with the audience to invite the Saviour into their lives. As a result of the service, perhaps fully a dozen persons resolved to renounce sin and turn to the Saviour. Selections from the Torrey song-book under direction of Mr. J. M. Lemont, were heartily sung and among the special selections was an enjoyable quartette by Misses Lottimer and Ethel Boyd and Messrs. Young and Blackely. A much enjoyed solo was rendered by Mr. Jas. Biggs. It was the world-renowned Alexander rem, "Mother, I'll Be There." Miss Jennie Torrens and Miss Lottimer were the accompanists. The interesting meeting was closed with the benediction from Rev. J. J. Colter.

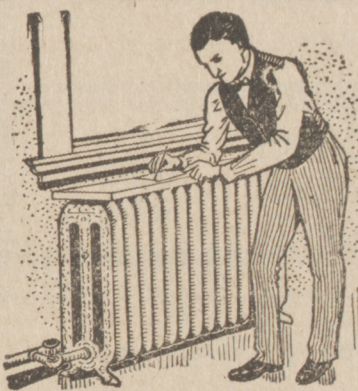
