## TECUMSEHS

## REPLACE RENFREW

## IN NATIONAL H. A.

Renfrew Players Divided among other Clubs—New Goal Net Adopted—Meeting was Harmonious

(Montreal Herald.)

Exit Renfrew—enter Tecumseh. The most notable result of the annual meeting of the National Hockey Association, held at Kastel's Hotel on Saturday, is summarized in the foregoing sentence. Because the remaining clubs in the Association were not willing to share their gate receipts with the Renfrew Hockey Club on the sixty per cent. for the home tea, and forty per cent. for the visiting team basis, the Creamery Town Club declared they would drop out.

An application from the Tecumseh Club, as foreshadowed exclusively in the Herald last week, was before the meeting. Renfrew's attitude made it easy for Tecumseh, for the remaining five clubs in the Association refused to adopt the sixty and forty per cent. proposition.

## PLAYERS DIVIDED.

In the meanwhile the players of last year's Renfrew team are divided among the clubs of the league. Wanderers get the prize packet in Fred Taylor, the Listowel Cyclone. Donald Smith, the Cornwall man, who is now on his way to the West, also becomes the property of the Wanderers if he cares to fall in line, and sign a contract which will be tendered him. Sprague Cleghorn goes to Toronto, and his brother to Quebec. Lindsay, the Renfrew goalkeeper, goes to Tecumseh, but Lindsay is said also to be one of the Western possibilities. Skene Roman goes to the Ottawas and Larry Gilmour to the Canadiens.

## DRASTIC MEASURES.

Drastic measures were adopted to deal with the contract jumpers. Those who "sling their hook" to other clubs outside the N.H.A. will be barred from the N.H.A. henceforward forever and clubs of the N.H.A. will be barred from playing against teams numbering such players in their ranks. This will undoubtedly lead to a pretty controversy when the Western challenge for the Stanley Cup comes in.

## NEW GOAL NET.

The meeting decided to adopt the goal net devised and patented by Percy Lesueur, the Ottawa goal-keeper. It is claimed for this net that it effectively minimizes the risk of disputes concerning the scoring of goals. T. ## CARL MORRIS

## PUT IT ALL OVER

## "DENVER-GOLIATH"

Referee Stopped Bout in Ninth Round after Jack Geyer had been Badly Battered

New York, Nov. 13.—Carl Morris, the Sapulpa giant, and also the original "White Hope," battered Jack Geyer, the Denver Goliath, so badly in their bout at the Olympic A.C. tonight that Referee Charlie White stopped the one-sided affair in the ninth round.

The end came gradually, for after the first two rounds the man from Sapulpa systematically pounded, swatted, lambasted and hammered his tottering rival, until poor Geyer was almost helpless. White's action came just as it seemed that Geyer had about as much as he could possibly stand.

## STARTED WELL.

The fight looked as if it might develop into a great one in the first round, for Geyer held his own in this session, and gave almost as much as he received in the second. When he came up in the third, however, his left eye was beginning to close and before the round ended it was shut tight. From then until the end the bout was a hopeless affair for Geyer. In the fourth Morris had everything his own way. He chased Geyer around the ring, landing left jabs to all parts of the face, hard uppercuts to the jaw and left hooks to the face and nose. A hard left-hand swing sent Geyer reeling about the ring in the fifth. Morris landed in this round and evaded practically every blow struck at him by Geyer.

Geyer was weakened in the sixth. Morris chased him around the ring and showered him with rights to the jaw and lefts to the body. The seventh was full of in-fighting. At this style of milling Morris was much the better and he did the more damage.

## GEYER SHOWED PLUCK.

Morris landed a terrific left on Geyer's bad eye in the eighth that made Geyer wince. Morris tried to be a bit fancy in this round and Geyer struck him a hard right on the eye. This tended to infuriate Morris and he chased his opponent around the ring, landing hard right and left swings, hooks and jabs. Morris stopped Geyer's rush with a straight left to the nose in the ninth, and then proceeded to batter his reeling adversary's head and body, until White stopped the slaughter. The Oklahoman tipped the scale at 235, but Geyer was 20 pounds lighter. Geyer showed wonderful pluck. There was not a knockdown in the nine rounds, but frequently Morris had his man on the ropes in the rounds, the ring being only 17 feet square.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate and erect a house worth \$300.00.
