NEW FINANCE MINISTER STILL CAMPAIGNING

Gananoque, Ont., Nov. 4—"I do not believe there is any healthier sign of the times, than that an honest man should change his party in the interests of his country," said Hon. W. W. White, minister of finance in the course of his speech to the electors of Leeds, in the Opera House here last evening.

Mr. White reiterated the emphatic statement which he made at Lansdown that he did not come into the Conservative party when the victory was won but while the result was still uncertain, and with a full sense of the responsibility of what he was doing. His stand on reciprocity, he said, he had taken because he believed it to be a grave menace to the physical independence of the inter-provincial trade of Canada, and to the good roads movement extension of rural mail delivery and reorganization of the supervision of the public expenditure and all the planks of Mr. Borden's platform, were again given Mr. White's unhesitating approval.

BURGLARS KILLED NIGHT WATCHMAN

New York, Nov. 4—Burglars frustrated in their attempt to rob the country home of Isaac Guggenheim the millionaire and copper magnate at Port Washington early today shot down and killed the watchman Alfred Crocker. The burglars escaped in a boat, after the sound of the shots, members of the Guggenheim family and servants ran out and found Crocker lying dead on the lawn in a pool of blood. A revolver was clutched in his hand but none of the chambers had been discharged, showing that his assailants had dropped him before he could fire a shot. There no clues between footprints on the piazza.

NEW METHOD FOR HANDLING OF MILK

(Toronto Globe)
Homogenization will solve the problem of milk prices, according to Mr. P.P. Farmer, who delivered an address before the Toronto branch of the International Stewards (Hotel) Association in the Prince George Hotel last night. Mr. Farmer reviewed the upward movement of milk prices in this city in the past few months to the present level, which, he said, is the highest on record in this Province.

Yesterday morning he said, milk commences to sell in Toronto at a price the highest in the city's history. He showed how farmers in the neighboring counties had, owing to poor crops this year compelled the dealers to pay them higher prices, how an increased demand without a corresponding increase in the supply developed during the Exhibition this year, how the drop in English cheese price and the rise in Ontario cheese affected the milk prices, and how the price of milk now would only have been one cent higher than last year had not the farmers insisted upon their price.

Mr. Farmer then told of the discovery of the pasteurization process, which reduced the worry of the producer and consumer over purity. Most of the local dealers were now employing this method of purification, but this process produced what the speaker called a "cooked flavor in the milk and reduced the cream line."

In 1907 M. Goulin of France discovered the process known as homogenization, which produces a condition in the milk making it possible to keep it for an indefinite period without any deterioration. Mr. Farmer, after explaining this process in its technical details, showed how it would solve the problem of milk prices by enabling the dealers to keep a supply of milk from a period of heavy production on the farm through a period of low production and thus make them almost independent of the influence of the farmers on the price.

He said that homogenization was being introduced by the dealers here as fast as staff and equipment would permit, and that when it was pretty generally established the consumers in this city and elsewhere would be immune from violent fluctuations in the price of a daily necessity.



DIDN'T UNDERSTAND DIVORCE LAW

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 6—A peculiar matrimonial mix-up in the case of Mrs. Sophia McLeod whose action for the annulment of her marriage with Alfred McLeod, superintendent of one of the subway construction companies in New York city came up in court here today for trial. Mrs. McLeod was married in 1877 to Augustus Doull in Prince Edward Island and lived with him until 1890, when they separated. She came to Cambridge to live in 1897 and sued for divorce in Rhode Island the next year and received a decree. She was not informed by her Rhode Island lawyer she declares that residence in the State for a year was necessary to give her a right to sue for divorce there. Believing her decree was valid she was married to McLeod in 1900. Last April she was informed by McLeod that there was doubt as to the validity of her divorce decree. She refused to live with him until the point should be settled. McLeod then left Cambridge and went to New York, where he has since resided. Mrs. McLeod now seeks to have the Rhode Island decree set aside and her second marriage annulled.





ONTARIO LIBERAL LEADER PREPARING PLATFORM


