for evading it. The Home Rule Bill has not become law, and the question arises whether people may be dealt with for preparing to resist proposals which have not yet attained the final stage of law and may never attain it.

Sir Edward Carson and F. E. Smith are to be the first to write their names to the covenant in Belfast City Hall where the largest assembly is expected. How many names will appear on this unique declaration of independence is a subject of newspaper contention. Predictions of Ulster enthusiasts range from half a million to a million, but less specious minds point out that the number of non-catholic males in all Ulster is only 430,000.

The Belfast corporation has recommended all employers to give Saturday to their men as a "Day of Rest". The governing body of the Presbyterian Church has issued a manifesto declaring that the Home Rule bill threatens religious freedom and setting apart the day as one for worship and prayer. The covenant is to be signed on the steps of the Belfast cathedral and religious services will be held there as well as in many Presbyterian, Methodist and Church of Ireland places of worship in Ulster cities towns.

Unionist women have formulated a draft of declaration for members of their sex to sign and are preparing a demonstration to take place with those by the men. In some smaller cities, notably Londonderry and Drogheda, the men will assemble in the market place and the women London, Sept. 21—Sir Edward Carson had a narrow escape from injury during the riot at Londonderry, according to a despatch received in London by The Evening News.

A large stone was dropped into Sir Edward's open carriage from the city wall, missing him by only a few inches. The windows of Lord Hamilton's automobile were broken by stones.

FEARS HOME RULE BILL IS WRECKED.

Cork, Ireland, Sept. 21—Addressing the delegates at the annual gathering of the Independent Nationalists here today, William O'Brien, member of parliament for the City of Cork, expressed fear that the Insurance Act was wrecking the Liberal party and would wreck home rule with it. The policy and tactics of John Redmond both had failed, the speaker said, and all that the Nationalists had done was to double the excessive taxation of Ireland in five years.

CARSON TALKS ON TREASON.

Coleraine, Ireland, Sept. 21—"Ulster has never yet been conquered and never will be."

This was the keynote of the speech of Sir Edward Carson, Unionist leader, who addressed a big meeting here today in opposition to home rule. Ulster loyalists, he said, had been accused of plotting treason, but they would sign the covenant, and not caring tuppence whether it was treason or not, they would keep it, and he was sure Ulster would win the fight against home rule.

INSANE BROTHER MADE TROUBLE

Cornwall, Ont., Sept. 23—Two brothers named Elroy, after working together for months to perfect an electrical invention which they expected would eliminate insanity, became insane simultaneously. They became violent and the countryside in the township of Osnaburk was held under a reign of terror for two days, while the lunatics rampaged. The two unfortunates were captured by constable McAvor, after a hard chase and are now in the Brockville Asylum.

LATE HENRY F. BLAIR.

The funeral of the late Henry F. Blair took place Sunday afternoon and was largely attended. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Neil MacLauchlan, assisted by Rev. J. J. Colter. Interment was made at the Rural cemetery.

LATE GEORGE A. BRADLEY.

The death of George A. Bradley of Marysville, occurred Saturday afternoon at Victoria Public Hospital, after a short illness. The deceased was aged thirty-three years and is survived by a widow and a family. The funeral took place at three o'clock this afternoon with service by Rev. Mr. Williams. Interment was made at the Baptist cemetery, Marysville.

LATE EDWARD CAMBRIDGE

The death of the late Edward Cambridge occurred at his home at Burton on Saturday. The deceased was eighty-two years of age and is survived by a widow two daughters and one son. The children are Mrs. Charles Conkley, of Douglas Harbour Queens County, Miss Bessie L. Cambridge and Willard A. Cambridge at home. Mr. J. L. Cambridge of this city is a brother. The funeral took place at two o'clock this afternoon with interment at Burton.

L. T. Marcell proposed the toast to the premier, paying a tribute to his work and defending the national policy, which he declared the Conservatives would always adhere to, and which had enabled Canada to open up the western country and connect it with the east. The banquet, he said, was not to celebrate the defeat of the Liberals but to commemorate the triumph of the national policy and to celebrate the announced determination of the Canadian people to retain, and safeguard, the commercial and fiscal autonomy of the country.

Other speakers included Hon. Robert Rogers, who denied that there was any increasing sentiment in favor of reciprocity in the west and delivered a virulent attack upon the Liberal leaders of the west, who, he declared, were continually stirring up race hatred and religious and sectional prejudice for their own ends.

George Drummond urged that the Canadian manufacturers establish themselves in the western provinces so that the needs and views of east and west might become more similar.

Hon. Mr. Monk dealt with the prosperity of the country and prophesied a triumphant and speedy settlement of the questions which his party has to handle.

Hon. William T. White, finance minister, dealt concisely with the commercial and financial issues of the day.

Telegrams expressing regret over inability to be present were read from F. W. G. Haultain, J. A. Matheson, Sir Richard McBride and Sir R. P. Roblin.

GOOD CHANCE FOR JOBS IN CIVIL SERVICE

Ottawa, Sept. 22—Civil service reform under the Borden Government evidently does not mean any economy in the way of the cutting down of the staff of the inside service. Instead it is being very largely increased.

After the new year over two hundred new appointees are to be added to the inside service.

The semi-annual civil service examinations for candidates for the outside and inside services will be held throughout Canada under the direction of the civil service commission on November 11 and following days and application forms must be filed with the commission not later than October 15.

For the inside service, where salaries are as a rule a little higher and positions are permanent, the positions to be filled by competitive examination include seventy clerkships for men and five for women in the lowest division with an initial salary of \$500 per annum; fifteen positions as stenographer and typist for men and forty for women in the same division and with the same initial salary and forty clerkships for men in subdivision B of the second division with an initial salary of \$800 per annum.

OVER 10,000 EMPLOYEES.

The rate at which the staff of Canada's civil service is growing is not generally known. There are now over 10,000 regular employees on the payroll of the outside and inside service not counting postmasters, temporary employees etc.

Last year there were over two hundred appointees to the inside service exclusive of nearly two hundred appointed to the headquarters census office for the compilation of the census returns.

DUCKS PLENTIFUL

Wild ducks are reported to be very plentiful on the Sheffield and Grand Lake marshes and some good bags are being made. Recently a consignment of thirty-five birds shot by Indians were received by a local provision firm. They were found to be over ripe and the dealers were unable to dispose of them. The authorities should take some steps to prevent the ruthless slaughter of ducks by Indians.

DRIVING ACCIDENT

Mr. Frank Grant of Douglas while driving yesterday near Mouth Keswick met with a bad accident. When in a narrow part of the road with high banks his horse became frightened by an automobile and turned about in the road damaging the carriage and hurting Mr. Grant. The latter was taken to his home the owner of the car.

LIVELY TIMES IN ST. MARY'S.

There were lively times in St. Mary's Sunday. Eleven drunks said to be from the city, were stowed away in the morning in a building near the C. P. R. station. Two of them got into a fight and one was knocked out. This gave rise to the story that a man had been killed. Later in the day three soldiers are said to have been in a mix-up on the hill back of the station and later there was trouble made at the Indian Reserve by a Tobique Indian who is under sentence to stay away from the Reserve.
