## RAMSEY MACEY WON WITH WANDERER AT DETROIT

Won \$10,000 Trot--Mixup in This Event--Fast Field Against Macey's Horse--Anna Axme and Pronto Won Their Races--Funny Crank Forced One to go Over

Detroit, Sept. 20—The Wanderer, piloted by Ramsey Macey, the youngest driver on the Grand Circuit, won the \$10,000 Michigan Stake from a classy field at the State Fair meeting today. Young Macey drove the high going gelding to perfection and had much to do with the victory, which brought him rounds of applause from the biggest crowds of the week.

Conditions opposed a race strictly to form as the track was about as bad as the Grand Circuit horses have struck this season.

FAVORITES FELL DOWN.

Four trotters that figured to be the best in the field could not negotiate the going. Dorsh Medium, even-money favorite over the big field, did not show a flash of her expected ability until the final heat, when she managed to finish third. Ruth McGregor raced more consistently than any of them, but she could not stall off the rushes by The Wanderer, when that tall gelding took after her in the stretch. Annie Kohl was set back for running at the end, after she had won a heat. Dave Halle became unsteady and refused to stick to the trot.

The Wanderer trotted his race in the home stretch each time he won, and Macey had to hand ride and whip him to get him up to the others and then hold his advantage until the wire had been passed.

Macey had come up from Lexington to drive The Wanderer and his friends joshed him before the race, but kicked themselves after it was over for the gelding sold in cheap fields with odds of about 20 to 1 against him.

One heat in the unfinished three-year-old pace, the Horseman Futurity, saw Anna Axme win handily and Impetuous Palmer finish beyond the red flag.

2:16 PACE.

The field in the 2:16 pace numbered 13 and Bessie Bee was the choice and she won it, just as she did her last out. Major Odell indulged Elbrino Belle with the lead to the stretch in the first heat and then whisked by her. There was a long delay before the next, owing to broken hobbles and lost shoes. When they got away Major Odell was in front. Cox came fast with La Restina in the stretch, but Major Odell stood a drive and won by a neck.

## FINISH REMNER WON REMARKABLE RACE SATURDAY

One fifth of Second Behind Bonhag's Record for Five Miles--Collins Finished Second

New York, Sept. 22—Hannes Kolehmainen of Finland, winner of the Olympic distance races at 5,000 and 10,000 metres, gave a remarkable exhibition in winning a five mile handicap race from scratch at Celtic Park today in 25:09 2-5, just one-fifth of a second behind George Bonhag's American record, made two years ago.

The little Finnish champion only arrived here this morning from Pittsburgh, where he won the five mile national championship yesterday and had been pushed at any stage of today's race by any of the runners, to all of who he was conceding liberal handicaps, there is no telling what new record he would have hung up.

Thomas J. Collins, of the Irish-American A. C., who had 225 yards, finished second, 70 yards behind the champion, who showed scarcely a sign of fatigue after he broke the tape.
