A TROTTER CLUB FORMED IN LONDON

London, Sept. 20—With the object
of raising light harness racing
the high standing prevailing in Amer-
ica, the London trotting club has
been organized.

The club has adopted the latest
rules in harness racing and
will insist on their observance. The
system of penalties and suspensions
which prevailed under the old trot-
ting union of Great Britain will be
revised and enforced.

The style of starting has been re-
modelled and all horses will be re-
quired to be sent off behind tapes the
track will be closed to horses that
are late in answering the starters
bell, thereby obviating the delays
have made the sport unpopular with
spectators. A new body of stewards
has been appointed and it will op-
erate under a fresh set of racing rules.

The first meeting of the new club
will be held at Amber Court Park,
Thames Ditton, at the end of the
month.

HON. J. W. SIFTON WAS PROMINENT WESTERNER

Winnipeg, Sept. 19—There died this
evening here Hon. J. W. Sifton, pre-
sident of The Free Press Publishing
Company and one of the foremost
old-timers of the city. Mr. Sifton,
who had been ailing for some time,
was one of the oldest inhabitants of
Winnipeg, and there was no part of
the west with which he was not
familiar.

Apart from the fact that he was the
father of two distinguished Cana-
dians, Premier A. L. Sifton of Alberta
and Hon. Clifford Sifton, the late
Hon. John Wright Sifton was prom-
inent in the public eye for many
years. He was born in the County of
Middlesex, Ont., on August 10, 1823.
In his earlier years he was a farmer
and oil operator. He served as
Reeve of Oil Springs and Cornwallis,
and later sat in the Lambton County
Council. Mr. Sifton then became a
contractor for the construction of
telegraph and railway lines in the
northwest. He built the telegraph
line from Winnipeg to Fort Pelly,
and he also built several sections of
the Canadian Pacific Railway. He
moved to Manitoba in 1878, being
returned to the legislature of that
province, and elected Speaker the
same year. He was one of the lead-
ing members of the Liberal party.
Besides his activity in the party he
filled many other public positions,
including that of inspector of public
buildings in Winnipeg. He was pre-
sident of the Grand Lodge of Good
Templars of Manitoba for many
years. In religion he was a Metho-
dist. In October, 1853, he married
Kate, the third daughter of James
Watkins of King's County, Ireland.

G. O. P. CAMPAIGN OPENS IN OHIO

Columbus, O., Sept. 21—The Re-
publican campaign campaign in Ohio
was formally opened here today un-
der auspicious conditions. Good-sized
delegations were on hand from cities
throughout the State and much en-
thusiasm was manifested on every
hand. The chief orators of the day
were Senator Henry Calot Lodge of
Massachusetts and former Vice Presi-
dent Charles W. Fairbanks of Indiana.

TORONTO'S FALL MEETING OPENS

Toronto, Sept. 21—The fall meeting
of the Ontario Jockey Club, which
will bring the racing season in Cana-
da to a close opened at Woodbine
Park this afternoon under conditions
that give promise of a very successful
meeting. The feature events on the
card for the opening day were the
Toronto Autumn Cup handicap at
one mile and a quarter, the Dominion
Handicap, at one mile, and a steep-
chase for novice timber toppers at
two miles.

VANDERBILT CUP RACE POSTPONED

Wauwauasota, Sept. 21—Owing to
continued rain, officials in charge
of the race meet decided at 10 o'clock
this morning to postpone the running
of the Vanderbilt cup race, scheduled
for today. A conference was then
called to discuss another date for
the races.

London, Sept. 21—The White Star
Line has cancelled future sailings of
the steamer Olympic, says the cor-
respondent of The Chronicle at
Southampton. He adds that on the
return of the Olympic from New York
early in October she will be sent to
Belfast, where she will be fitted with
an inner skin and additional bulk-
heads. This work, it is said, will
occupy six months.

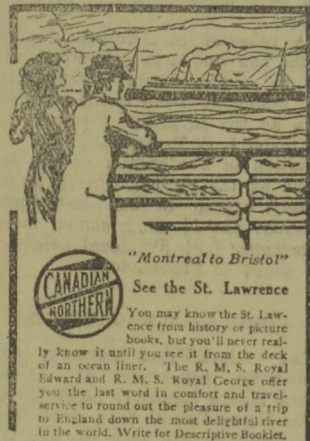
