REDUCED CUT
OF LUMBER ON
LEASED LANDS

Crews Already Being Sent Into Lumber Woods---Wages About Average---British Market Steady, Better Prices Expected

The approach of colder weather is turning attention generally to lumbering operations and already crews of men have been sent from this vicinity to the lumber woods. A considerable number have been sent to the scene of operations on the Tobique and also into the Quebec woods by those operating on the headwaters of the St. John River. Wages offered are about average, \$30 to \$35 per month. It is understood that Mr. John Kilburn, who has operated in the Province of Quebec for some years past, will again lumber on the headwaters of the St. John. His outfit was brought out of the woods last spring but preparations are being made to take it back.

CUT TO BE SMALL.

The general expectation is that the cut will be curtailed as the lumber market is still dull, although showing signs of recovery and improvement. Considerably less lumber will be cut on Crown Lands and other leased lands during the coming winter. The Miramichi Lumber Company, which has cut extensively on Crown Lands in the past, will lumber largely on its own lands.

BRITISH MARKET.

From Liverpool comes reports that the soft wood market in which this province is interested, continues steady, with a prospect of increased prices paid by the British consumer. The increase is to be made to cover higher cost of importation. Freight from St. John and other ports in this province continue high and the spruce market so far is unchanged. Dealers in this province however, are reported to be holding their stocks in prospect of better prices and the latter seem sure to come.

AFTER BIG GAME

BOARD OF TRADE
COUNCIL TO CONSIDER
MATTER OF CAR-SHOPS

Meeting Probably Will Be Held This Week---A. R. Gould President of St. John and Quebec Railway Likely to Attend

The Council of the Board of Trade will probably meet this week for the purpose of considering the matter of putting forth Fredericton's claims as a divisional point and site of the car-shops for the St. John & Quebec Railway. Although it has not been definitely decided it is thought likely that Mr. A. R. Gould president of the St. John & Quebec Railway will meet the council and hear what is offered in support of Fredericton's claims. It is probable that the offer of a free site for car-shops which was made in the spring will be renewed the exhibition grounds and buildings being the property considered most favorably situated.

Fredericton is not out of the running for either divisional point or car shops and it is understood that steps will be taken to back up the city's favorable geographical situation with offers of a very favorable nature.

The selection of a divisional point on the new line is understood, will rest to a considerable extent with the Dominion Department of Railways as the intention is to have the line under I. C. R. management. The situation of Fredericton as the terminus at the present time of an important branch of the Intercolonial Railway, should be a strong factor in bringing both divisional point and car shops to Fredericton.

COMPLETED ENGAGEMENT

The Klark-Urban Company completed its engagement at the City Opera House Saturday night playing "The Dairy Farm" to a good house. The company will play the Maritime Provinces for the next fortnight and will then go to Newfoundland.
