LUMBER CUT WILL BE CURTAILED

Murray & Gregory will Cut Operations in Half--Defeat of Reciprocity One Cause of Curtailment

The present prospects are that the cut of New Brunswick lumbermen will be very much curtailed during the Heifer Calf under 6 mos.-W. W. coming year. A dull year in the lumbering trade will be the consequence and as that industry effects practically every person in the province a period of general depression may be expected.

Mr. J. Fraser Gregory of St. John, president of the St. John River Log Driving Company and a prominent lumberman is in the city. He stated that the lumber-cut of his firm during the coming winter would be just about half what it ordinarily is. The unsatisfactory condition of the lumbermarket is one reason why the cut is curtailed and the postponement of the enlargement of a market in the United States by the defeat of Reciprocity is Bull calf under 6 mos.—E. L. Allen, another. Cow 4 yrs. old and upwards-A.

OTHERS CURTAIL OPERATIONS
