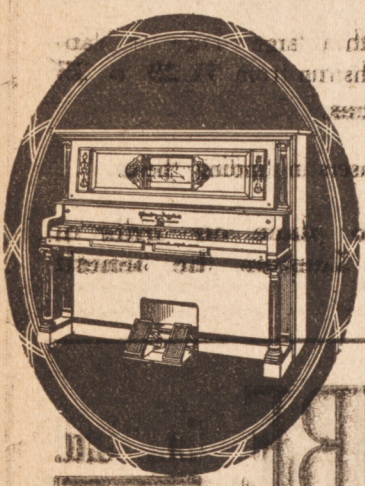

KING'S CO. LIBERALS HAVE WINNING TICKET

The Liberal party, and Conservative party, are now, however, to make any such pretences. They wished to run a Liberal government which would be in the interest of the whole people. He referred to the Liberal party and expressed his belief that it would be a large measure of prosperity as a consequence of the reciprocity agreement. This was sure, would be the greatest boon to Canada since the old treaty was in force in 1854 to give them applause. St. John had not gone ahead for years as she ought to have done. Her population was practically the same now as it was forty years ago. Everything, however, related to the agreement going through, and then St. John would go ahead as her position and opportunities warranted.

DR. MCALISTER'S SPEECH

Dr. McAlister, M. P., the last speaker, was received with a tremendous ovation. He said that he supposed that some of the papers would be saying that he had left his parliamentary duties to come down and attend this convention. The truth, however, was that he had some private business to transact. He congratulated them on the excellence of the ticket and said he was sure it was composed of three men as good as they could have found. It was a winner. All they had to do was to take off their coats and go to work in order to win. He believed in fighting (laughter and applause) and he was going to fight. (Cries of "the sooner the better.") Yes, the sooner the better, because the sooner the Liberal party would be in power, the sooner the people would be benefited.

He had been returned by them to the Dominion parliament, but from a financial standpoint it would have been better for him had he been allowed to stay at home. Cries of "it would not have been better for us, though." Some time ago he had announced that he might be required to leave the service papers in the west had been saying since that Dr. McAlister had got tired of the Liberal party and wished to retire. That was not true, and if they did not hold their tongues he would try to go back for another five years. (Cheers and laughter.) The Liberal party in Ottawa was going ahead. Three weeks ago Mr. Borden forgot himself and said, "O leave things alone, the country is prosperous." He had no doubt that had times Mr. Borden's followers had voted against their own consciences, when voting for their party. The Liberal party was the greatest asset the country stands possess of at present, and it was amusing to notice their changes of base in regard to the navy. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the most wonderful man in Canada today. (Cheers and applause.) This country was a better one than the States, and had greater resources.

"We do not realize here in the maritime provinces," said Dr. McAlister, "just what reciprocity means. The measure will pass through the Canadian parliament and I do not doubt it will pass through the United States Senate, likewise. It was idle to raise the cry that because we advocated reciprocity the country was in danger of annexation. He believed that after the next general election the Liberal party would go back to Ottawa stronger than ever. "So far as the local house was concerned," Mr. Hazen had promised that if Kings County returned three men to support him, he would fix up the Central railway. They had done this, but he had failed to keep his part of the agreement. The Central Railway went on, was never any good anyway, but at least the last year, the old government ran it. They had a surplus of \$2,100. Mr. Hazen has now managed to accumulate a debt of more than \$50,000 on the property. But the same was true of everything. All the Liberals of Kings had to do was to take off their coats and fight for the ticket they had just nominated and fight to a finish to win.

Speeches were then made by Mr. Wetmore, who promised his hearty support to the candidates, and S. Carter, and the meeting broke up after raising cheers for the coming candidates, Hon. Mr. Robinson and Dr. McAlister.

AT OPORTO, PORTUGAL

Oporto, Feb. 16.—Serious rioting occurred last night, following a meeting of the Catholic Association, and many persons were wounded. As the Catholics came out from their hall, they were met by a crowd of the police, who fired and wounded a man and a woman and wounded two Republicans. This was the signal for a general conflict. "Shouting, a rapid fire of bullets was exchanged, and destroyed the offices of the Catholic newspaper, Laparole, and the headquarters of the workmen's Catholic Club. During the clash many shots were exchanged. The police were powerless. In consequence of the rioting, the civil governor of Oporto resigned today.

STORIES OF CANNIBALISM FROM CHINESE PROVINCES

Pekin, Feb. 16.—Several cases of cannibalism, the result of the great Chinese famine, were reported today from the province of Szechuan, the centre of the starvation zone. According to these reports a man, a woman and two children were killed and their flesh eaten by villagers in the community west of the Tsin Mountains, just south of the tea district. From Canton and Shanghai, dispatches were received today from missionaries who confirm the story of cannibalism. Missionaries in the field in the famine had been seen word that the famished people are insane from suffering and that rioting is frequent. Soldiers sent to the district have been attacked.

BEAUTY AND HEALTH

DEPEND ON THE TEETH

New mothers realize the importance of preserving the beauty of the child's first teeth. Their little bodies are bathed the first hair washed and the scalp kept sweet and clean, but the teeth too often are overlooked. The result is that many children out of every ten are hopelessly disfigured by their teeth, a condition sad to realize, and wholly unnecessary. A child should be taken to a dentist at least twice a year, and when the child understands that these visits are part of the year's routine life, will grow accustomed to them and so longer dread the dentist's examination. A soft, tooth brush, should be bought, and a reliable powder, taking care that it is not gritty. Twice a day the child should wash its teeth and it should be taught to rinse the mouth and gargle the throat. Nothing will keep the mouth in better condition than the daily gargle. A child should be fitted to meet life with every possible asset, and one of these will be a set of strong, white teeth, for with them comes health and sweetness possible in other ways.

MAIL RECIPROCI

New York, Feb. 16.—The Canadian Club of New York, which is a telegram was received from Washington, announcing the passage of the Canadian reciprocity bill by the House. The news was vigorously applauded and congratulatory messages were immediately despatched. President Taft and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada.

Previous to the receipt of the news from Washington, a number of speakers had expressed the wish that the reciprocity proposals would be realized.

"I guess our wishes come true," remarked Dr. Neil MacPherson, former president of the club, who was the next speaker.

"Canadians will have a greater feeling of respect and admiration for President Taft in view of the earnest manner in which he has striven for this reciprocity agreement, because it is a sure sign that the imaginary barrier that separates the United States and Canada will be broken down and swept away forever. No single thing could so thoroughly cement the two peoples."
