## A STRIKING CONTRAST

Liberals have no occasion to be downcast over the defeat of their party. On the contrary they may well be proud of it, as they look back upon its splendid achievements and reflect that it went out of office on a great issue of public policy. It was defeat, but defeat with honor. The Toronto Star has been contrasting the electoral records of the two parties since Confederation. There have been four changes of Government during that period. Two Liberal Governments have been defeated, in 1878 and 1911, and two Conservative Governments, in 1874 and 1896.

The two Liberal Governments went to defeat because of questions of policy. The defeat of 1878 was due to Protection offered as a remedy for depression and a shrewd appeal to national sentiment and the holding out to the people a glowing hope that they could get even with the powerful neighbors, who had been most unneighborly. The defeat of 1911 was on a question of public policy, and the defeat was fashioned from the same materials as before.

The two Conservative Governments went to defeat in 1874 and 1896 not on a question of policy but because of scandals, moral collapse and decay. The Pacific scandal ended one Conservative Administration, internal dissensions and weakness ended the other so that these Administrations were not only defeated but discredited.

Alexander Mackenzie left office beaten but respected. Sir Wilfrid Laurier does the same. For fifteen years under his direction, Canada has had unexampled prosperity; foreign trade has multiplied, the West has been extensively peopled, the place the country occupies in the map of the world has been made a great one, and in every way Canada has never had so fine a fifteen-year period. The Liberal Government meets with defeat at the height of its power, attempting to put into effect an advanced policy sound as to economics, but from which the electors were stampeded by a wave of passion.

But says the Star, the Liberal who looks over the four defeats which Governments have sustained, will prefer the up-standing two-isted encounters in which his party was worsted, to the bed-ridden endings which have overtaken the Administrations of the other party.

Toronto Star: Mr. Perley who is mentioned as Mr. Borden's Finance Minister and who is sure of that or some other position in the cabinet, is an American by birth. If the Liberals had sent an American-born Finance Minister to negotiate at Washington the Opposition press would have shrieked with indignation. Mr. Perley of course had no say as to where he would be born, and is a perfectly loyal citizen of the Dominion. So are the American settlers in Canada's West despite the sneers of certain newspapers who were displeased by the Western vote.

Toronto Globe:—Conservative newspapers are selecting one class after another, farmers, wage-earners, financiers, city dwellers, and others, and attributing to them the defeat of the Liberal government. It is no compliment to the classes thus selected. The change was due chiefly to the vast sums poured out like water, and any class accused in a general way of susceptibility should repudiate the charge.

The Montreal Star wants Mr. Borden to appoint Sir Wilfrid Laurier High Commissioner for Canada.

It is strange that the name of Lieutenant Colonel the Honorable Harry Fulton McLeod has never been mentioned in connection with a portfolio in the Borden cabinet. The gallant Colonel has a better claim than Mr. Crocket for without his support Mr. Crocket would never have warmed a seat in Parliament. His claim is also quite as good as that of Premier Hazen.

The announcement that Mr. Borden will receive no more deputations in support of cabinet aspirations of members of the party, seems to indicate that he has practically made up his mind as to his selections and that he is weary of the importunities made on behalf of back benchers.

The St. John Standard announces that Premier Hazen and Hector McInnes are likely to be the cabinet ministers from the Maritime Provinces. Mr. McInnes is a Halifax lawyer, who has never been in politics. The correspondent seems to have forgotten all about Mr. Borden.

There seems to be a dearth of orators this year among the gentlemen who compose the City Council. The reports of the proceedings occupy very little newspaper space, and are dull and uninteresting. The council seems to be sadly in need of a disturbing element.

The report that Mr. A. R. Slipp, M.P.P. has gone to Ottawa to boost Mr. O. S. Crocket for a portfolio in the Borden cabinet was not founded upon fact. Mr. Slipp is still devoting his energies to the Tory cause in Sunbury and Queens.

Although the York Municipal Council has held no meeting since July last a memorial purporting to express the views of that body has been forwarded to Mr. Borden urging the appointment of Mr. O. S. Crocket to a cabinet position.

Mr. Borden used to boast that he had ample material among his followers to make half a dozen cabinets as good as the one which has governed Canada for the past fifteen years. It is up to him now to deliver the goods.

In the provinces outside of Ontario the parties stand 76 Liberals and 58 Conservatives and Nationalists. When all the facts are brought to light we are of the opinion that it will be seen that the Borden victory was a costly one.

An Ottawa despatch to The Standard announcing that Premier Hazen will likely be the cabinet minister from New Brunswick, has caused a cold chill to creep over the local Tory junta.

The announcement is made in an Ottawa despatch that Mr. Borden has decided to receive no more delegations urging the appointment of this or that man to the cabinet. Mr. Borden's troubles are only beginning.

Mr. Pius Michaud, the Liberal candidate in Victoria-Madawaska, had a majority of 1904, the largest received by any candidate in the Maritime Provinces.

Anybody who knows Premier Hazen knows well enough that he will move heaven and earth to secure a portfolio in the Borden cabinet. With him it is now or never.

The prairie provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta, which were visited by Mr. Borden last summer gave a popular majority of 20,000 for reciprocity.

It is a long drop—almost a parachute descent from Hon. Dr. Pugsley to O. S. Crocket but as loyal British subjects we must bow to the will of the people and take things as they come.

Premier Hazen went to Ottawa on Saturday last in response to a summons from Mr. Borden. Col. McLeod and Mr. O. S. Crocket went to the capital without a summons.

It is becoming more and more apparent as each day passes that the Laurier government went down before a storm of prejudice, misrepresentation and bigotry.

When Conservatives read the names of some of the men mentioned in connection with the Borden cabinet they must wonder if they are really awake.

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY  
THE MARKET LEADER TODAY

New York, Oct. 4.—The market sold off after opening to the extent of something like a point in leaders, but selling was not pressed in decline. This fact appeared to indicate that selling was of a nature of distribution instead of being bear pressure as some interests professed to believe. St. Paul fell to a new low record and sentiment on it was quite bearish in some quarters, although conservative interests contended that the stock would be worth something like its present price, even if its dividend was reduced as low as 5 per cent.
