



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, the applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, or certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister or intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Each tender must be signed and sealed by all the parties to the tender, and witnessed, and be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank of the Dominion of Canada, payable to the order of the Commissioners of the Transcontinental Railway for the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, (\$100,000.)

The cheque deposited by the party whose tender is accepted will be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General of Canada as security for the due and faithful performance of the contract according to its terms. Cheques deposited by parties whose tenders are rejected will be returned within ten days after the signing of the contract.

The right is reserved to reject any or all tenders.

PLAIN TALK HANDED OUT TO BORDEN IN THE WEST

Grain Growers at Saskatoon Tell Him That They Are For Reciprocity First, Last and All the Time--Evils of Protection Strongly Denounced--A High Tariff Afflicts the Just--Farmers Have Sunk Party Differences.

(Montreal Star, Ind. Con.)

Saskatoon, Sask., July 4.—The Grain Growers talked plainly to Sir Wilfrid Laurier at Saskatoon last July; they did not talk less plainly to Mr. R. L. Borden last evening. They condemned protection, and they demanded reciprocity. They charged the manufacturers and legislatures with having their hands bloody with the blood of children. They condemned Mr. Borden's proposal for a commission of tariff experts.

They paid very little attention to the other planks of Mr. Borden's platform, on which they admitted that he was in agreement with them, but they declared that they were "for reciprocity, first, last, and all the time." Nevertheless, they gave Mr. Borden a very warm personal welcome and cheered him for his frankness, and there was a small section of those present who cheered his opposition to reciprocity.

The chairman last evening was the same Mr. John Evans who presided last year when the delegation met the premier. Another speaker, Mr. William Lawrence, was also present last year. In neither case did these men mince words. The chairman has during the year, been nominated as farmers' candidate against the Scott administration in Saskatchewan.

Mr. F. W. G. Haultain was described last evening by one speaker as a man who had thrown party advantages to the winds, and stood for the right in his attitude on reciprocity.

From this meeting with the Grain Growers, Mr. Borden went to a meeting in the Auditorium Rink, where he was cheered as he has scarcely been on the tour outside of Winnipeg, Calgary and Edmonton. The meeting was attended by over two thousand people, who cheered again and again his arguments against reciprocity.

SAYS HIGH TARIFF AFFLICTS THE JUST.

"We regard with affection," said Mr. Murdo Cameron, the first speaker at the Grain Growers' conference. "We respect you as a man of honor and a gentleman."

He went on: "We want to ask you respectfully to withdraw your opposition to the agreement that is now before parliament." (Hear, hear.)

He then proceeded: "Of all the events which afflict the just, the high protection tariff in this country is easily the first. It is said that reciprocity would be disloyalty. I cannot concur in this. The fathers of many of us here have given their blood for the empire. We will pay our own expenses when we go to see the King."

"When Sir Wilfrid Laurier was out here last year, we told him that he

had failed to carry out his promises. Now he has taken a step in the direction of fulfilling them, and I do not think it is wise to call him a convicted free trader, when he is so harshly criticized when he takes his first step in that direction. Mr. Haultain threw party allegiance to the winds, and stood for what was right in regard to this agreement.

"I am not a prophet nor the son of a prophet," concluded Mr. Cameron, "but I do predict that this will speedily lead to a reduction in the duties on manufactured articles."

"We would have been only too pleased," began Mr. Sydney Birmingham, "to have found in you a man who would give the farmers what they most desire—reciprocity. They are with you on almost every other question. Reciprocity is the one thing on which the farmers of the west have sunk all party differences. (Hear, hear.)

"It is said we will not leave the party ranks. The western farmer is nailing that lie to the counter. We are for reciprocity, 'first, last, and all the time,' and if we can educate any government, we care not whether Grit or Tory, to give us reciprocity we can soon do away with fifty or seventy per cent. of the other evils from which we suffer. The farmers have none of the influence of great wealth. We have only moral force, but that we will use to the utmost. We wish with all our hearts that we could convert you. (Laughter.) If you can only give us reciprocity, then perhaps we would be able to stand together."

AGAINST DISSOLUTION.

Mr. John Evans, the chairman, declared strongly against protection. "It is said," he remarked, "that we should have protection to ensure good conditions for our workmen. There are conditions in our factories which should make any true Canadian blush. The hands of our manufacturers and our legislatures are bloody with the blood of infants today."

"The western farmers," continued Mr. Evans, "did not look with favor on the proposal for a tariff commission. To be of any value it would have to take the manufacturers over and run them for a year at least. He protested against dissolution this fall before redistribution."

Mr. William Lawrence was called upon to present the remaining demands of the Grain Growers. He proceeded to point out the loss which he claimed the west had suffered by not having access to the United States markets. He put the loss last year at \$18,000,000 in wheat, and \$750,000 in flax.

"We wish to be loyal to Canada," he said, "but we wish Canada to be

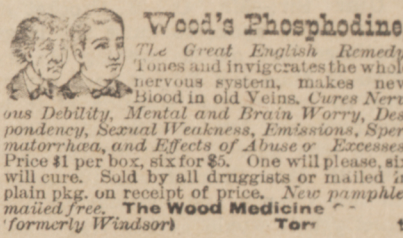

MR. BORDEN UNMOVED.

"I want you to understand," Mr. Borden began in reply, "that I have never spoken or countenanced one disparaging word against the farmers. I respect your views, but I want you to understand that my convictions are just as dear to me as yours are to you. (Hear, hear.) I am absolutely opposed to this reciprocity. (Hear, hear.)

"If you controlled sixty per cent. of the votes of Canada, and would not give them to me unless I supported reciprocity, I would not support it. (Hear, hear.) I have met a great many farmers out west who are opposed to reciprocity."

A Voice—"Those men at the back, the source of the 'hear, hear,' are not farmers."

Mr. Borden continued: "I do not mean here. I have met practical farmers in the west opposed to it."

A Voice—"Not one in a hundred."

Mr. Borden went on: "I do not know how many, but I do not suppose any one does."

Subsequently at the large meeting, Mr. Borden replied to the criticism of his proposal for a tariff commission. He said that the Grain Growers seemed to think that he was proposing a perambulating body such as we had had in the past. What he proposed was a body of experts who would give their whole time to the tariff. Further, they would have power to investigate any grievances in regard to combines, and parliament would remove grievances on their report. This statement was received with cheers.

ROSTERN IS UNDEMONSTRATIVE.

The afternoon meeting was held at Rosthern. Rosthern and Saskatoon are in the constituency which is represented at Ottawa by Mr. George McCraney, Liberal. Rosthern especially is a strongly Liberal town, and the chairman of the meeting made no attempt to disguise that fact.

"If there is a Liberal-Conservative Association from the Atlantic to the Pacific," he said, "that needs encouragement, it is at Rosthern; but I can say this to Mr. Borden, that I do not think there will ever be an acclamation from Rosthern, as each victim puts up his deposit and generally fails to redeem it. All we do is to put a piece of beefsteak to our black eye and hunt for the next victim."

There were about three hundred people at the meeting, and, as usual, they gave Mr. Borden an excellent hearing. There were no interruptions but there was little cheering, except in response to appeals to loyalty.

The civic address at Rosthern was presented by Acting Mayor Stewart, Mayor McGregor having died at the end of the week, and his funeral was held just after the public meeting, and was attended by Mr. Borden and his party.
