TERRIBLE CONDITIONS IN TORONTO SLUMS

Toronto, Ont., July 5.—The lodging house evil, the foreign housing problems, dark rooms, back-to-back houses, basement and cellar dwellings, insanitary privy rooms, lack of drainage, inadequate water supply, exorbitant rents, overcrowding of houses, rooms and lots are the conditions found by the medical health department in Toronto slums. Four thousand six hundred and ninety six houses were inspected.

FADS AND FASHIONS

A notable feature of the season's fashions is the extraordinary popularity of black and white and navy blue and white, especially in the form of stripes of various widths, for these mappie effects are seen in cloth, voile, nixon, silk and in satin and are exceedingly smart with a touch of bright color in the trimmings, such as cerise, turquoise blue or emerald green.

Black chantilly lace scarfs over white chiffon, trimmed with a ruching of soft black taffetas dechiquete (pinked out edges) or with an old time ruching of narrow black velvet ribbon, are most picturesque; some of these are arranged hood fashion at the back and form a kind of mantlelet manon that is most attractive with summer attire and the now all-prevalent pekine gauze dresses that have come to stay for a while, at least.

Some very pretty new models for afternoon dresses have made their appearance. The newest are absolutely novel in shape and color. New silks are being shown every day. Very supple taffeta is much used in one or two contrasting colors. A new kind of silk is the "Chine." This is chiefly used for tailor-mades, cut with a short jacket. The jackets are trimmed with a silk fringe or "ruches" in the same color. Green in all its shades and blue are greatly in favor, and a new blue, rather vivid, is called "Clair de Lune."

One of the very latest novelties from Paris is the full jabot of plaited maline, in which a plaited piece of the material about twelve inches long is caught together in the centre with a strip of maline and pinned at the front of the lace collar, forming a semi-circle of spreading fan-shaped jabot.

Another new jabot, which is very similar, has the lower edges graduated by being cut obliquely. This is made of marquisette, with insertions and edgings of valenciennes or cluny lace between which a bit of color is often introduced.

Carved parasol handles are very popular. Mushroom tops are still seen, but are smaller than formerly, and beaded handles are much in evidence, and are very beautiful in their many colors.

The vogue of the ear-ring is given impetus by the fancy of Queen Mary for these barbaric ornaments. The long pear-shaped kind, especially in pearls and jade, are extremely popular.

HOKE SMITH FOR SENATE

Atlanta, Ga., July 6.—The senatorial situation is attracting much attention with the near approach of the date when the Georgia legislature will choose a successor to Senator Terrell in the United States senate. The balloting will begin next Tuesday and all signs point to a spirited contest. Senator Terrell, who was appointed to fill the seat of the late Senator Clay until the legislature could choose his successor, is a candidate for election to the full term of six years. The leading candidate, however, appears to be Hoke Smith, who was Secretary of the Interior under President Cleveland and who has just been inaugurated for the second time as Governor of Georgia. Governor Smith, it is understood, has long aspired to a seat in the United States senate and his supporters are now preparing to make a strong fight for his election. On the other hand, the anti-Smith element, which includes many prominent politicians in all sections of the State, will leave no stone unturned to prevent his election. A number of other candidates for the toga are receiving more or less attention. One of those whom it is believed could make a formidable showing should he decide to make an active fight is Pleasant A. Stovall, the Savannah editor. "Tom" Watson, the former Populist leader; W. A. Covington, one of the authors of the State prohibition law, and several others have announced their candidacies.

St. Catharines, Ont., July 5.—Two Armenians, Avel Khajayn and Kirkon Varatamar were arrested on charges of appropriating \$1600 and \$1700. The accused were president and secretary of an Armenian Educational Society which gathers funds and sends at home for the education of children.

Miss Nora Gunter has returned home for the holidays. She has been teaching the school at the Barony.

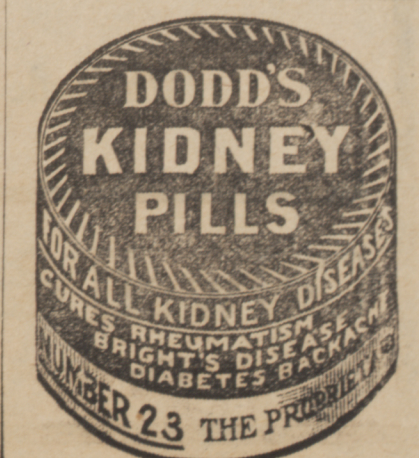
