Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 2.—The customs receipts for the Dominion for the first six months of the fiscal year just closed have been \$45,306,326 as compared with \$35,559,541 during the first six months of last year, an increase of \$9,746,884. For the month of September alone the collection amounted to \$7,710,181, an increase of \$1,242,241 over September 1910.

After a dreary wait of two hours in the station, I started across the Restigouche River, and I may say right here, that its lovely beauty went far beyond my greatest expectations.

Soon after my arrival, I visited "Catherine Cottage," which is built of logs. There are steps leading from the highway road down to this picturesque cottage, around the cottage runs a wide verandah, and from the verandah are steps leading down to the waters edge. Tall trees bend over the cottage as though they were protecting it from the winds and storms.

From the verandah can be seen the broad sweep of that far famed stream known as the "Restigouche," on either side rise tall mountains, crown'd with autumn verdure. It is a beautiful sight to see the last rays of the sun lighting up the mountain tips, with a golden splendor. Nothing to disturb the quiet evening air, but the cry of the gulls or the clang of the wild geese. And falling into a dreamy lassitude, methought of the times, when in the quiet dusk of evening, the Red man's birch canoe, loaded with the spoils of the chase, glided down the placid stream to the wigwam, nestling close to the mountains. But ah me, the scene is changed, instead of the wigwam, I see the white man's house close to the beach, and here and there on the mountains are cottages of well to do farmers, and the lights in their windows, wink and blink like great shining stars.

But though the Restigouche has grand and awe-striking scenery, yet I think it cannot compare with the dear old Miramichi in its simple beauty.

WARNING TO MR. BORDEN

Under the title of 'The New Cabinet and the Province of Quebec,' the 'Patrie' has the following to say in part:

"To give the Province of Quebec its just representation in the cabinet Mr Borden will only have to follow the invariable custom which has prevailed in the federal administration since Confederation.

"In the first ministry of Sir John A. Macdonald it was determined one time for all that Quebec should have three ministers. Since 1867 there has always been in the cabinet three French-Canadian ministers holding important portfolios and occasionally as well a minister without a portfolio or the solicitor-general, the latter not making part of the cabinet.

"It is a false principle to think that, because the Province of Ontario gave to the new Premier a solid support it should have the right to exercise a larger influence. The composition of the cabinet should not be based on the result of the ballot in the different provinces. All our parliamentary history is there to prove it. Quebec did not have more representatives in the Cabinet because she gave a nearly unanimous support to Sir John A. Macdonald, and later to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and she should not have less now that Ontario goes en bloc, and gives a majority to the 'First Ministers.'

The 'Patrie' then suggests that among the Quebec representatives are men admirably adapted for Cabinet positions. It mentions Mr. F. D. Monk first, then Mr. Rodolphe Forget, and in a block the names of the Hon. L. P. Pelletier, Mr. D. O. Lesperance, Mr. L. Coderre, Mr. B. Nantel and ex-judge Doherty.

"With such elements at his command we do not believe that Mr. Borden dreams of looking outside the ranks of his representatives for the ministers who will represent the Province of Quebec.

And we hope that in the delicate choice which is left entirely to his discretion he will take into consideration the worth and personal abilities of the candidates without listening to the counsels of certain narrow spirits to whom real merit gives offence and who favor only mediocrities.

Though the danger of reciprocity has been averted, that is not all. The victory must be completed by the formation of a cabinet enlightened and strong, composed of men of initiative and not of men enjoying reputations more or less overrated.

"A bad move now might have disastrous results. If they wish for example to accord only two insignificant portfolios to Quebec, and set aside representatives of worth for unpopular mediocrities, it is believed that the Conservative-Nationalist deputation from Quebec, which is united and free will rise as one man at the opening of parliament to demand an account from the new minister for his conduct.

"The people want at the helm some new men, men of action and prestige and not persons worn out and timid that the Federal atmosphere would make them seem only still more dull and useless."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eight acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


