**THE PROFITS OF THE MIDDLEMEN**

(Toronto Globe)

The problem is acute in the United States as it is in Canada. The cost of living has become excessive, and makes life for the great majority of people hard and cruel. The other day one hundred Grangers of Pennsylvania met in New York to discuss the problem. They found that the prices paid for footstuffs by the people in the city was out of all proportion to the prices paid to farmers in the country for live animals, vegetables, fruit, and eggs. In their despair they turned to Theodore Roosevelt.

In his vigorous way the ex-President told the Grangers that the middlemen, who squeezed down the prices to the farmers on one side and squeezed up the prices to the consumers on the other side, were the enemies of justice and good living. "Every middleman," he declared, "who does not help the consumer to get the food products of the farm in good condition and at the least possible increase on the price paid the farmers should be driven out of business. I want to pay a man when he works, but don't want to pay him when he is in the way. The man who gets between the tiller of the soil and the wage-earner in the city, and who thrives mainly at the expense of both, ought not to be helped. He does not pull his weight."

In Canada the situation is more urgent than it is in the United States. Despite Canada's amazing productiveness the cost of some of the food staples is higher in this country than in the United States, notably higher than in Britain. And the Ontario farmer gets less for his farm products than does the farmer in New York State. This is the problem which remains, and which must be solved. The difference between the price paid by middleman to the farmer and the price paid by the middleman to the consumer is far too great to be either just or tolerable. The cost of living is so indefinitely high in Canada that the question must be taken cognizance of by the government.

**RICH LANDS OPENED TO SETTLEMENT**

Rapid city, S.C., Oct. 2.—With this Ridge reservations Uncle Sam started the ball rolling in one of the largest land lotteries he has ever conducted. A total of 466,562 acres is thrown opening of registration today for the remainder of the Rosebud and Pine open to settlement, comprising some of the finest agricultural and grazing lands in South Dakota.

The registration is being conducted at the land offices in Gregory, Chamberlain, Dallas and Rapid City. The applicant is required to appear personally at one of the registration points and swear before a notary public to his qualifications to take a homestead. The sealed affidavits will be mailed to Judge Witten at Gregory, where the drawing will commence on October 24. On that day the metal cans containing the sealed bids will be dumped on a large public platform at Gregory. A child will be selected to go on the platform and pick up the envelopes one by one. The first envelope will be numbered "one" and the person who filed it will have the privilege of making the first selection from all the lands subject to entry and may choose for his homestead the finest level farming land at \$6 an acre or the roughest grazing land at 25 cents an acre. The second envelope will be numbered "two" and so on until the number of 160-acre tracts is exhausted.

**OTTAWA SURFEITED MANY GUESSES AS TO CABINET**

(Montreal Star.)

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—Mr. R. L. Borden put in a busy day Saturday, in the work of drafting the cabinet, which he will officially be asked to form, probably on Tuesday or Wednesday next. The city is all agog over the prospects, the tension among the politicians here only being equalled by the interest of the different departments of civil service, who are naturally speculating much as to who will direct their affairs.

Mr. Borden is working away and saying little. He has not left his home since arriving here, save for Tuesday's demonstration. There is nothing official obtainable, and nothing in view. On the common talk among the politicians it is not particularly difficult at least to indicate the list from which the cabinet will be chosen even if it be impossible at this stage to forecast specifically the departments over which they will preside.

Nova Scotia, of course, has the honor of having the prime minister, though as president of the council he will not really have a department. There is considerable talk of Mr. John Stanfield of Colchester, having a portfolio. He was one of the most active of the party whips. Quebec seems likely to have four ministers.

In Ontario there is some difficulty indicating the choice, by reason of the comparatively large number who are assumed, entertain aspirations and possess qualifications from length of service or otherwise.

It is regarded as certain that Hon. Frank Cochrane is coming, and others spoken of for the six portfolios include Mr. A. Broder, Dr. Reid, Hon. Adam Beck, Col. Clark, Mr. Osler, Mr. McDonnell, Mr. Foster and Mr. Crothers.

It is considered quite possible that at least one member may enter the cabinet from Ontario, without portfolio. Hon. T. A. Lougheed will doubtless be provided for. He lives in Alberta. The British Columbia representative may be Mr. A. S. Goodeve.

Rumor more commonly associates Hon. Frank Cochrane with the portfolio of public works. In the case of Mr. Doherty he would probably be made minister of justice.

Col. Hugh Clark, if called upon, may be assigned the militia department.

**COATESVILLE LYNCHING CASES**

West Chester, Pa., Oct. 2.—The term of wourt which convened here today will be made memorable by the trial of the persons accused in the lynching of the negro Zach Walker, who was burned to death by a mob at Coatesville on August 13 last, following his arrest for the murder of an officer. It is expected to commence the trials this week. In addition to those against whom a charge of murder has made for alleged complicity in the actual lynching, the chief of police of Coatesville and one of his subordinates are to be tried on a charge of manslaughter, growing out of their alleged failure to take any steps to prevent the lynching.
