BROCKTON HAS 431 ENTRIES FOR TWENTY-ONE CLASSES

Lexington, Ky., the Centre of Interest in Trotting This Week--Racing at Brockton Fair Begins this Afternoon with Four Races

Boston, Oct. 2.--This week marks the beginning of the end of the harness horse racing season and it promises to be a week overflowing with splendid racing. Here in New England we have the famous Brockton Fair, where racing is the main feature and where most track managers could go for points on how to secure horses.

The country-wide interest is centered on the far-famed Kentucky trots as the annual meeting at Lexington is best known. Springfield, Ill., with its mammoth fair, is attracting more attention than ever, thanks to a live wire in charge of the racing, and for the first time makes the Blue Grass meeting feel the result of a clash in lates.

Brockton is going to have the best racing in its history, if rain does not give the horses a heavy track. The entry totals up something like 431 in the 21 classes. Bert Merrill, who does the starting, will have his work cut out to get this long program off in four days, but he is up to it and will handle the big fields as easily as the small ones.

The Illinois track has drawn some of the cracks of the big line, with The Harvester as the headliner. They do not pay for even championship performances against time at Lexington, so the handsome offer from Springfield has drawn Geers and some of his stable from Kentucky for the first time in more than a score of years.

UNDER NEW OWNERS.

Lexington gives its first meeting under the new owners, with Ed Tip-ton at the head, handicapped by starting in at the tag end of the season which finds less good horses racing than for a long time. R T C is the crack stake trotter of the year and will win about as much money as a harness horse ever has in one campaign. He has never met a trotter of class, so what he would have done in a year that had a Dude Archdale, a Joan or a Penisa Maid is only a guess. His stablemate, and by many counted a better trotter, was shown up last week by Dudie Archdale, who made him look pretty common without getting out of the 2:07 class.

The Transylvania in the old days used to be a tough race for a favorite to get away with, but lately the popular choice has not fared so poorly, and this week it looks like a cinch for whichever gelding Murphy decides to start.

The Kentucky Futurity is the one bright spot in the early closing events on the Lexington program. The field which takes the word tomorrow will have four 3-year-olds with race records faster than 2:09, while the fifth member of this year's exclusive circle, Justice Brooke, is too lame to start. It is an open race and at this distance it is hard to tell whether Miss Stokes, Atlantic Express or Peter Thompson will go to the post favorite.

Lon McDonald has been nursing a bad wonderful cripple, Miss Stokes, along with this \$10,000 plum in mind and if she opens up fairly sound today she will very likely have a
