DISTRICT NURSING SYSTEM INAUGURATED BY VICTORIA HOSP.

Miss Laura Reed to Take up Duties Tomorrow—Military Sick to Use Public Hospital

The regular meeting of the Hospital Trustees was held yesterday afternoon, with Hon. Judge Barry, vice-president, in the chair, and the other members present were Dr. McGrath, Mr. Sterling, Mr. Mitchell, Warden Rogers, Mr. McMurray, Mr. Ed. Moore and Secretary-Treasurer Sampson. Several matters of importance engaged the attention of the Trustees. President Randolph was unable to be present.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Secretary-Treasurer's statement of expenditures for September was much less than the previous month and the report of the matron showed that thirty-four patients were treated and she reported the receipt of a number of donations, which included ice cream, books and magazines, chow chow, jellies, fruit and flowers. The friends who made the contributions were Mrs. Walter McFarlane, Nashwaaksis; Mrs. W. T. Whitehead, Mrs. Jas. S. Neill, Mrs. J. Hugh Calder, the Ministering Circle King's Daughters and the K. of P. Lodge.

GENEROUS DONATIONS.

The Secretary-Treasurer also reported the receipt of a cheque for one hundred dollars from Mr. Chas. E. Neill, one of the managers of the Royal Bank, at present located in Montreal. This generous donor, a son of Mr. Jas. S. Neill, has become one of Canada's leading bankers. A formal resolution of thanks was adopted by the Trustees. A few weeks ago Mr. Willard Kitchen, ex-president of the Hospital Board, sent in a cheque for \$100 to pay the cost of printing the annual report. Having learned that the expenditure was eight or ten dollars more than his cheque, he at once sent his personal cheque for the difference.

TREATMENT FOR SOLDIERS.

An arrangement has been made through Dr. Weaver, military physician at No. 3 Regimental Depot, whereby the soldiers will receive medical treatment in Victoria Public Hospital in the future. With a small number of men in this station it will no doubt prove less expensive to pay for treatment than to maintain the military hospital.

DISTRICT NURSING.

At this meeting arrangements were completed for the immediate inauguration of a system of district nursing. This scheme originated with the Ministerial Association and the two city circles of King's Daughters, the former represented by Rev. Neil McLaughlan and the circles by Mrs. A. R. Slipp and Miss Babbitt. District nursing will prove a great boon to the poor people of Fredericton. Under the scheme the above organizations agree to pay to the Trustees a certain sum annually for which the Hospital management will provide a graduate nurse or a senior nurse who will attend to duty about the city from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. The estimated cost to the Trustees is \$156 for boarding and lodging, laundry \$38, clothing \$40, nurse's bag \$15, together with gauzes, bandages and other necessities and incidentals to the cost of about \$200. Upon application to the matron through a physician, any person may have the benefit of a visit from the nurse free of charge. Persons who may feel able and prefer to pay may give the nurse any amount from five cents to one dollar per visit. Subject to the approval of the Trustee any resident minister or leader of the King's Daughters may apply to the matron for the services of the nurse.

APPOINTMENT MADE.

Miss Laura Reed, a most successful undergraduate nurse, will be the first to undertake this splendid work, which of course, is experimental but its promoters believe results will amply justify the expenditure. It is expected that there will be a large demand upon this nurse in obstetrical cases as the lack of professional assistance has been detrimental to the welfare of many persons. Miss Reed will probably be ready to enter upon her new duties tomorrow morning.

Several other matters engaged the attention of the Trustees during the meeting and after passing a number of bills, the board adjourned.

It was reported about the city last night that a prominent local Tory had received a telegram from Ottawa which was to the effect that Mr. O. S. Crockett's chances of getting a portfolio were slim. Hon. H. F. McLeod, Solicitor General, who was expected home today at noon has been delayed.

GRAND JURY FIND NO BILL AGAINST JAMES PYNE

Recommendation Made by Jury that City Wharves be Lighted—Large County Court Docket

In the York County Court the Grand Jury this morning brought in no bill against James Pyne of Marysville, who was charged with perjury in the matter of making an affidavit in connection with Habeas Corpus proceedings. His Honor in instructing the Grand Jury, mentioned the fact that the city wharves were in a dangerous condition on account of the lack of proper lighting facilities and said that any suggestion by the jury with regard to such condition would be proper. The jury, after being out about an hour, found no bill against Pyne and made a recommendation that the City Council take steps to have the wharves properly lighted. The recommendation will be forwarded to the City Council, which meets in regular monthly session this evening.

The non-jury cases are being heard this afternoon and the only jury case on the civil docket will be heard on Tuesday, October 31st.


OFFICERS ELECTED
