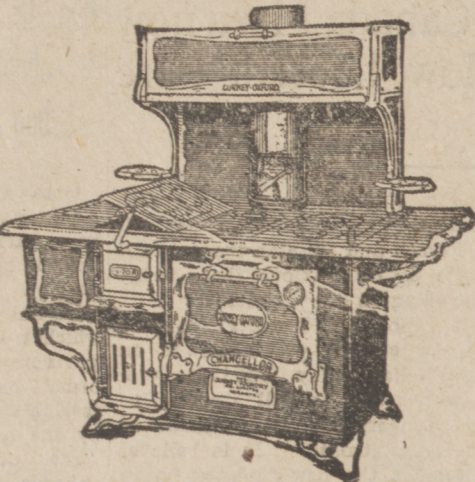

## CANADA MUST SHARE IN BRITAIN'S WARS

(Canadian Press.)  
Montreal, Q., Nov. 16.—That Canada by attempting to reserve the right to participate in or to keep clear of Britain's wars, is declaring herself a sovereign state and that she cannot retain this principle and remain a part of the British Empire, was declared by Mr. John Williamson in an address at the Nomads Club last night.

"Canada cannot remain British and get clear of taking a part in Britain's wars," he said.

## GRAIN SHIPMENTS SHOW AN INCREASE

Montreal, Nov. 16.—Grain transportation figures show that the C.P.R. has so far marketed over six million more bushels of grain than at this time last year. To date the C.P.R. has marketed 46,575,000 bushels of grain while at this time last year, they had marketed just 40,288,000 bushels. Of the grain marketed, this year, 32,425,000 bushels were wheat. In one day recently, the C.P.R. marketed 482,000 bushels of wheat and 153,000 bushels of other grains.

## CONSCRIPTION FAVORED AT MILITIA CONFERENCE

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 16.—The military conference which was called together by Col. Sam Hughes, the new minister of militia, was a decided success. Some one hundred military men from all parts of Canada, were present and they took hold of the conference with enthusiasm. After an introductory address by Col. Sam Hughes the conference divided into three sections, infantry, artillery and cavalry. The infantry section was presided over by General Cotton. It was generally agreed that the rural regiments at present were in a serious condition, and a remedy that larger pay and armours for the rural regiments were recommended, and a resolution to this effect passed. A number of officers advocated compulsory service and the idea was greeted with much applause. However, no action was taken, this and other matters being left to a resolution committee composed of Col. Weston, Col. Akelle, Col. Davidson, Col. Rogers and Col. Stuart. General Cotton advocated that the customs duty on uniforms and accoutrements be removed, a suggestion which was received with considerable applause.

It was Col. Ponton of Belleville, who brought up the question of compulsory service. He thought the pay was not the trouble so much as the need of a campaign of inspiration amongst the young men. He depreciated the spirit of anti-militarism which was sweeping the country. He thought manhood suffrage should be dependant on service. The country was ripe for this move. Col. Wetmore agreed with this idea. It was an excellent suggestion. There should be some form of compulsory service. Sir Henry Pallat said that in Toronto the cadet corps was the greatest strength for recruiting. As for jarring at the troops, they never heard of such a thing. On the contrary, they were always cheered.

Col. Fisher of Brockville, also advocated some form of conscription. Lieutenant Colonel Thompson said that the city corps were at present up to strength, but the rural militia was a heartbreak, unless there was an improvement, they might as well disband. Better pay and armours, he thought, was the remedy.

## LAST HORSE SHOW IN THE GARDEN

New York, Nov. 17.—New York's twenty-seventh annual horse show, which is to open tomorrow, will have more than usual significance, for it will be the last of these famous gatherings in Madison Square Garden. For a sensational reason, if for no other, the management has planned to make the show this year more brilliant than any of its predecessors in order that the farewell to the old home may literally be made in a blaze of glory. One feature that will contribute largely to the success of the event is the imposing array of prizes that have been offered, their total value being fully \$40,000. But what will add as much as anything else to the success of the show will be the array of foreign military officers who will compete with officers of the United States Army. Three American army officers, one English and the one Canadian officer will judge the military events. The Americans are Lieut. Col. David S. Stanley, quartermaster's department; Capt. J. D. Long, cavalry instructor at West Point, and Maj. H. J. Allen, of the general staff. Lord Davies, who recently married Miss Vivien Gould, will represent the English army and Col. William Hendrie will represent the Canadian forces.

## MRS. VEMAILYA SAYS SHE IS INNOCENT

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 16.—Mrs. Louise Vermilya yesterday made the first public statement she has given out since she was placed in jail on charges of poisoning Policeman A. Bissonette. She denied any knowledge of the ten deaths that have occurred beneath her roof in the past eighteen years. She received newspaper men in the county jail hospital, where she is recovering from the effects of poison said to have been taken by her while under surveillance.

"I never poisoned anyone," said Mrs. Vermilya, "all those who died came to my home when they were pretty near done for and then died on my hands. How they got poisoned I do not know. Smith simply was a boarder. I was engaged to marry his sonette and I never heard that Miss Lydia Rivard was engaged to him till after his death. I did not try to commit suicide. I did not know the pepper box brought to me contained arsenic. I asked the nurse to bring me some white pepper, never thinking she would bring the box of roach poison. In fact, I forgot the roach poison was in the pantry."

"All stories about my having a fondness for the dead are false, and when I go on the stand as I shall insist on doing, I will have no difficulty in proving that I am not the ogress I have been pictured, but a victim of ghastly circumstances."
