MARKET PRICES

Roller oats are quoted at \$5.25 per bbl., and \$2.50 per bag. Cornmeal, \$4.85 bbl., \$2 bag.

Turkey sold today at 18 to 16c; ducks 15 to 17c. and chickens, 13 to 14.

Green Mountain potatoes are quoted at \$1.05 on car and \$1.20 to jobbers other varieties, \$1.10 to \$1.15, and 95c. to 91c.

Butter is quoted at 28c. for choice stock, and looks higher. The foreign flour demand was poor today, with bids few and far between.

D. U. R. CASE TOO SOON

The fight of the municipal ownership advocates to have their proposition for acquiring possession of the Detroit United Railway sent to the people ahead of Mayor Thompson's settlement on a 3-cent fare basis has been compromised by a plan to submit both propositions to the electorate on the same day. This will put the contest directly up to the people. It also will save the expense of holding two elections. The election will however, hardly be held before the end of January. It is believed that the Thompson plan will win.

MONEY IS TIGHT

"A good deal of interest," says Thornton Davidson & Co., "is being displayed in the money market-financial circles just now. As indicated in our last circular, there had been no difficulty in obtaining all the money required for stock market purposes since the first of the month. In fact, many sources were rather pressing than otherwise and some of these were prepared to accept rather lower rates in order to get their money placed."

"During the past week however, there seems to have been a slight change in sentiment. It is stated that money is no longer offering as freely as previously and that in a few instances rates have been advanced fractionally, while throughout the whole market there is a feeling that the brakes are being gently applied."

WEARY OF FRESH AIR

Wall Street, November 16—The New York Curb is undergoing a strong agitation in favor of deserting Broad Street for an indoor exchange. The breeze blows pretty strongly up and down Broad street, and rain falls on the just and unjust.

Fresh air is a fine thing, but the brokers say they get too much of a good thing.

BIG MEN DROP OUT

New York, November 15—It is understood that important changes are contemplated in the directorate and officers of the Standard Oil Co., under re-organization, in accordance with the decree of the Supreme Court and that the members of the so-called "Old Guard," in consequence of ad-

vancing age, are desirous of giving place to younger blood.

John D. Rockefeller and Wm. Rockefeller, Oliver H. Payne, C. W. Harkness, H. M. Flagler, and some other leading men in the company are to retire.

Younger men such as A. C. Berford, W. C. Teagle and H. C. Folger, Jr., will gradually succeed to the management.

A NICE RISE

Stocks had a nice leap anyway. During the nine business days from October 27 to November 9 advances reached doubled figures in quite a few instances.

Union Pacific improved more than 11 points, Reading fully 13, Lehigh Valley 12. Canadian Pacific upwards of 12, and a host of others from 5 to 7 points among the railroads.

Steel, of course, carried the honors in the industrial division by bounding up from 50 to 63, or at the rate of 1 1/2 points each day the exchange was open.

The Guggenheim speculative favorite, Smelters, after having been very severely handled, went 1 1/2 points against the bears, while its ally, National Lead, gained fully 9 points. Naturally the bears had to make a stand some time or other.

U.P.'S GOOD SHOWING.

Union Pacific's annual report for year ended June 30th, 1911 shows 16 1/2 per cent. for common stock, an increase of \$71,118,284 in profit and loss surplus, \$61,078,316 cash demand and time loans. No change in capital stock, an increase of \$31,783,230 in funded debt and no sales of investment securities during the year.

The striking feature of the report is the increase of \$71,118,284 in profit and loss surplus, mainly through the dividend of \$53,728,678 paid up to the railroad by the Oregon short line as profit on Northern Securities account, now closed up. While the account was open the U.P. system carried investment securities under assets at cost less than proceeds of the investment stocks sold. Crediting assets now with cost of securities paid with Northern Securities profit may pretend some disposition on part of profit and loss surplus now amounting to enormous total of \$186,914,931.

New York, N.Y., Nov. 16.—U. S. Supreme Court has handed 13 indictments against officials and agents of Lehigh Valley and B. & O. Railway, charging rebating.
