## ROMAN CATHOLIC PRELATES TO BE CREATED CARDINALS

Washington Nov. 17.—In view of the fact that three prelates of the Roman Catholic church in America are to be created Cardinals at the special consistory to be held in Rome ten days hence, it may not be uninteresting to tell how a cardinal is made and what his duties are.

In the first place the College of Cardinals consists of seventy members, divided into three ranks—Cardinal Bishops, Cardinal Priests and Cardinal Deacons. The latter hold no titles and may be laymen. Cardinal Antonelli was a layman and was created a Cardinal long before his ordination. Each of the Cardinal Bishops has charge of one of the suburban sees in Rome, while each of the Cardinal Priests holds a title or parish in Rome.

The Cardinals owe their appointment solely to the Pope. The Pontiff as a rule announces the names of those appointed as a secret consistory of the Cardinals usually at the consistory following the names are made public.

In the creation of the three new American Cardinals there appears to have been some slight departure in the customs of procedure, which is not surprising in view of the fact that the number of American prelates thus honored is without precedent. In the case of a new Cardinal living any distance from Rome it has been customary to designate a member of the Pope's household, usually a monsignor, as an Ablegate to convey to the new member of the Sacred College the zucchetto, or skull cap, the red beretta and the documents authorizing the investiture of the new Prince of the Church with the beretta.

But as regards Cardinals Falconio, Farley and O'Connell, they have been summoned before the Pope in person which is the usual procedure followed only in the case of a new Cardinal who resides near Rome. This action on the part of the Pontiff has led to the supposition that all of the ceremonies in connection with the elevation of the three American prelates will take place in Rome.

In each of the three previous instances of the creation of an American Cardinal the ceremony of conferring the scarlet hat has been performed in the United States. In the case of Cardinal McCloskey who was the first American prelate to be admitted to membership in the Sacred College, the ceremony took place in the Cathedral in New York city. Cardinal Gibbons, the second American Cardinal, was also delegated by the Pope to receive the insignia of his office in the United States, and on the silver jubilee of his priesthood, in the historic cathedral of Baltimore, Cardinal Gibbons was installed primate of the Catholic church in America by his venerable friend Archbishop Kendrick of St. Louis. Cardinal Satolli, who was the Papal ablegate in the United States at the time of his elevation to the cardinalate, received the insignia of his high office in Washington.

The raising to the cardinalate as a matter of fact means the investiture of three hats, the skull cap, or zucchetto; the beretta, which is the same shape as the ordinary beretta, and differs only in color from a bishops or priest's, and the red hat. This last is simply held over the Cardinal's head by the Pope and is never worn. At a Cardinal's death it is laid upon his breast until interment, when it is suspended over the sanctuary of his cathedral. The red hat is figure-

tive of the intellect which it surmounts, which is to be used in the service of the church and the color is symbolical of the death which is to be preferred to betrayal of the trust. It is a round flat, uncomfortable headgear, with a low crown and wide stiff brim from the inside of which hang double triangles formed of fifteen tassels.

On ordinary occasions when not engaged in ecclesiastical ceremonies a Cardinal uses the zucchetto, or skull cap, a tiny rounded covering shaped to the surface of the head and lined with chamois skin.

The death of a Cardinal is an occasion of the most impressive requiem services. His body lies in state in the cathedral robed in its official garments, with the scarlet hat resting on his breast. In preparation for burial, he is first laid in a cypress wood coffin, a little case at the end containing a record of the chief events of his life. This is deposited in a casing of lead covered with precious woods and the three are sealed with the cardinal's arms in the presence of a notary. The body is finally entombed under the high altar of the cathedral and the church is draped in mourning.

### CANADIAN MISSIONARY MURDERED IN CHINA

merce—Chang Chien, president; Hsi-Yen, vice-president.

Board of the Navy—Admiral Sah Chen-pink, president; Tan Shush-Heng, vice-president.

Board of Instructions—Tang Ching-Chung, president; Yang-To, vice-president.

Board of Colonies—Si Show, president; Yuan Shun, vice-president.

Board of Interior—Chao Ping-Chun, president; Wu Chen, vice-president.

Opinion is divided with respect to the object Yuan Shi Kai has in view in his cabinet selection. Some think that he has lost his astuteness and intuition, while others hold that he is playing a deep game. His real object may be to convince the throne that a capable cabinet cannot be formed, but he gives the impression to visitors, both Chinese and foreigners, that he is determined to defeat the rebels. The foreign diplomatic representatives have under discussion the appointment of a committee for the disbursement of the maritime customs, which are being reserved by the inspector general, Francis Arthur Aglen, for the payment of loans and indemnities. This seems to be the beginning of foreign interference in the financial affairs of China. Certain members of the National Assembly are advocating the discontinuance of that body because a large majority of the elected members have left the capital. Those who remain are chiefly the throne's appointees and the assembly is without a quorum.

Reports reach here of the murder of a German in Shen Si-an of a French priest in Sze Chuen province, but these are isolated instances of harm coming to foreigners, who have been well protected considering the excited condition of both revolutionaries and imperialists.

No attempt is being made to re-establish telegraph communication of the postal service in the western provinces. On this account no late communications have been received from many places where foreigners reside. In Quang Chau, Manchuria, foreigners have been asked to join the protective organizations.

### NOT KNOWN IN OTTAWA

Ottawa Citizen:—The local police know nothing regarding the identity of A. Baggs, the Ottawan who according to a Fredericton, N. B., despatch, has been passing forged checks in that city. The Ottawa department is of opinion that "Baggs" is only a blind, but have no idea to the real artist. "We have had so many local cases of forgery," said an official in the department today, "that really it is impossible to fix the Fredericton charge on anyone in particular. No doubt, however, Mr. Baggs is from city or vicinity."

### WORK COMPLETED

Mr. D'Arcy McGrath who has been engaged for some months as engineer on the I. C. R. division at Chatham arrived in the city yesterday work having been completed. He will remain here for sometime.

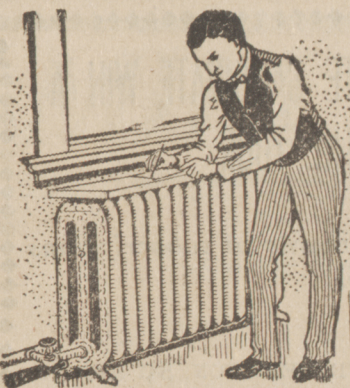
