RARE HONOR FOR SIR WM. WHITE

New York, Nov. 17.—Sir William White came to New York today to receive the John Fritz medal, which the United Societies of American Engineers presents annually to the person, irrespective of nationality, who has during the year benefited humanity to the greatest extent through the application of science.

Sir William White is one of the most celebrated engineers and naval architects of the world. After completing his studies at the Royal School of Naval Architecture he joined the construction department of the British Admiralty in 1867. As director of naval construction, which office he held from 1885 to 1902, he practically reconstructed the British navy. With the exception of the late Lord Kelvin, Sir William is the only Briton who has received the John Fritz medal.

OWNER OF VICTORIA CROSS ARRESTED FOR MURDER

San Francisco, Calif., Nov. 16.—Devotion to two children whom he refused to abandon through a years of adventure in various parts of the world, led to the arrest here of John R. Swann, wearer of the Victoria Cross, believed to be a fugitive wanted by the British government for murder committed in Bloombfontain, Transvaal Republic, in December, 1901. A chance remark by one of the children led finally to his arrest. Swann is also accused by the police here of having killed two men in Alaska three years ago. Papers found in Swann's possession show that he was a member of British Artillery enlisting from Kirkspok, Eng., and that after repeated mention for bravery in the despatches to the home government, he was awarded the Victoria Cross. A police circular printed in Johannesburg, also found among Swann's effects, gives a description of a man wanted for murder and offers \$1,000 for his arrest. The description, according to the police, fits Swann to the minutest detail.

READY FOR BANKERS' MEETING

New Orleans, La., Nov. 17.—A dozen special trains speeding from as many parts of the country are bringing to New Orleans a host of eminent bankers to attend the meeting of the Bankers' Association in this city. Committee meetings and features of entertainment in connection with the convention are scheduled for Monday and the sessions proper will begin the following day. The officers of the association expect the coming meeting to be the most important as well as the largest in the history of the organization. Currency reform will be the all-absorbing topic of discussion. Unless all signs go astray the association will give its formal approval to the main features of the plan which the National Monetary Commission will report to Congress this winter. Another subject that will receive the attention of the convention will be the working of the postal savings bank system and its effect upon the general banking business of the country.
