C.P.R. FINANCING.

The Herald correctly foreshadowed the change in the price of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's new stock issue, some days ago. In the recent past all new stock issues have been made at a 25 per cent. premium, and the change to a higher premium was naturally very much of an experiment, as it is impossible to know to what extent the prospective issue at 25 per cent. premium has been discounted.

On the opening of the Stock Exchange in London today, Canadian Pacific acted in a manner indicative of shareholders' satisfaction with the new price of issue, and, of course, there is reason for this contentment, as the new issue, on the basis of today's quotations, will give shareholders a bonus amounting to about \$8 per share in the "rights" on new stock.

The big speculative rise in the C. P. R. stock has not been without its value to the financing of the company, as it enables the company to get twice as much in premiums as it has received on previous occasions. That is to say, the issue of \$18,000,000 new stock at 150 per share, will bring the company a total of \$27,000,000 and as dividends will be paid on the \$18,000,000, and not on the amount received in premiums, it will be seen that the financing of the C. P. R. is an amiable tribute to the company's international credit.—Montreal Herald.

TORONTO RAILWAY'S FATE.

Toronto, Dec. 12.—The city council yesterday decided by a vote of 13 to 12 not to submit to the ratepayers on January 1, the question of making application to the legislature for power to expropriate the Toronto Street Railway. The vote was taken on an amendment for a six months'—

A VETERAN FINANCIER.

Rights on new C. P. R. stock are estimated to be worth about 8 1-8. The rights will expire on Jan. 22.

C.P.R. ISSUES.

C. P. R. puts its new issue out at 150. The last one of \$30,000,000 on November 15th, came out at 125.

When the directors first decided to issue stock at a premium some of the critics looked wise and declared that a fatal error had been made. It was certainly considered a bold move at the time, but being bold is one of the C. P. R.'s specialties.

KNOX-McCOOK WEDDING

New York, Dec. 14.—The wedding of Miss Katherine McCook, daughter of Gen. and Mrs. Anson G. McCook and Hugh S. Knox, son of the Secretary of State, took place this afternoon at the residence of the bride's parents in West Fifty-Fourth Street. Except for the limited number of persons present, the surroundings of the wedding were on a splendid scale. The spacious house was superbly decorated. A reception for relatives and intimate friends followed the ceremony. After two weeks wedding trip Mr. Knox will take his bride to Washington to live.

The bride is the only daughter of Gen. McCook, who is one of the family of "Fighting McCooks." She made her debut in society three years ago. This is the second time that the name Knox is linked in marriage with that of McCook. Secretary Knox's eldest son, J. H. Reed Knox, married Miss Elizabeth McCook of Pittsburgh in 1907. His bride was the granddaughter of Commander Roderick S. McCook, a brother of Gen. Anson C. McCook.

FATHER CHINQUY'S DAUGHTER SUES

Montreal, Dec. 11.—The ne temere decree and its operations are responsible for another suit. Action was entered on Saturday by Messrs. Desaulniers & Vallee, acting for Dame Rebecca Chinquy, against Joseph Begin, editor and publisher of La Croix, a local weekly catholic paper. It is stated in the declaration of plaintiff that she is the legitimate daughter of Charles Chinquy and Euphemie Allard, who were married on January 13, 1864, by Rev. Mr. Desroches, a minister of the Protestant Church at St. Ann's in the State of Illinois, according to the laws of that State; that she is the legitimate wife of Joseph L. Morin a professor of McGill University.

ATTRACKED PARENTS' MARRIAGE

That the defendant published in his paper, La Croix, on November 18 last, an article in which it was said that Chinquy the apostate, and not be married, and that the woman who associated with him—namely, Euphemie Allard—was only a concubine, that the Chinquy referred to in the article complained of is the legitimate father of the plaintiff, and that before his marriage with the mother of the plaintiff Chinquy solemnly and officially repudiated the Church of Rome on the 3rd of August, 1858; that the Euphemie Allard referred to in the article is the legitimate mother of the plaintiff, that the said article clearly and intentionally insinuates that plaintiff is of illegitimate birth.

CALLS IT AN INSULT

That the article was published with the intent of insulting, and does insult, the memory of the father and mother of the plaintiff; that said article is also meant to throw discredit on the daughter of said Charles Chinquy and Euphemie Allard, namely, Dame Rebecca Allard, the plaintiff; that the said article is of a nature to injure the plaintiff in her honor, as well as in that of her father and mother, and injures her in her feelings, and exposes her to the hatred of the inhabitants of the Province of Quebec.

Damages for \$10,000 are claimed.
