## UNITED STATES STEEL FEATURE OF MARKET

(By direct private wires to J.C. Macintosh & Co 604 Queen St Fredericton New York, Dec. 14—One third of the trading yesterday was in the U. S. Steel stocks and they were not only the leaders in the volume trading but also in the way of news. Sensational improvement is manifested in every branch of the trade. Railway orders are flowing in and prices are advancing. Yesterday another class of steel received a boost and steadily the capacity of the Company is increasing, this is more than affirmed by the late report of unfilled orders. To accentuate this Henry C. Frick ventures an opinion that business will keep improving. Further expression is found in the editorial comments of the "Iron Age" the trades newspaper and the "Iron Trade Review" another organ is not less cheerful. As steel looked upon by a great many as the barometer of the business world there certainly are indications of its increasing improvement and we have another commodity which is an incentive in that direction, copper metals are going up reflecting on the copper stocks which if the better prices bring orders must diminish as they have lately. There is probably a good deal of copper still on the ground but with a fair export demand and gradual consumption here prices will be maintained. ceed one per cent to the mile. This is a considerably higher standard than the Intercolonial and will enable the line to be used advantageously for bringing through business to St. John.

"It has not been stated just what arrangement has been made with regard to the bridges, but I think that when the facts are made known it will be found that practically the same arrangement has been made with the present government as was agreed upon by the provincial government, the minister of railways and myself some months ago.

"While Mr. Flemming and the new federal government will naturally receive credit for carrying this great undertaking to a successful completion, it is gratifying to me to know that the firm stand which I and the other Liberal members from New Brunswick took in favor of having a first class road to be operated as part of the Intercolonial system has borne such good fruit.

"There is one thing to be said about Mr. Flemming and that is that he is not slow to absorb other people's ideas, and when I pointed out to him the way by which the bridges across the St. John and Kennebecas rivers could be built by the concurrent action of the two governments and also the enormous advantage for the financial security of the province to have the road operated by the federal government on the percentage basis he readily agreed to this plan. It is fortunate for the province that he did so because without Intercolonial operation the province would have run an enormous risk.
