**TRUEMAN DIED HEROIC DEATH**

St. John, N. B., June 28—A despatch from Dr. R. W. Brock, of the Geological Survey, to the family of J. Douglas Trueman, who was drowned while on a scientific expedition into the Rainy River District of Ontario, indicates that he died a heroic death.

A man named Knox and Dr. Walcott, secretary of the Smithsonian Institute were in a canoe below the steep rock falls, near Steep Rock Lake. The canoe upset, and Walcott could not swim, and Trueman and Knox got him on top of the canoe. Apparently fearing that there were too many to hold onto the frail craft, Trueman left to swim ashore, but did not get far when he called for help. Knox left to aid him, but before he reached him, Trueman sank in thirty fathoms of water.

**DIRIGIBLE BALLOON DESTROYED**

(Canadian Press.)

Busseldorf, Germany, June 26—The Leppelin dirigible balloon Schwabin I, stationed here, was totally destroyed this morning. The balloon was lying at anchor in front of the balloon shed when a strong gust of wind caught it and broke it from its moorings. A number of mechanics seized the ropes, but the balloon was wrenched out of their hands into the air, where a moment later it exploded, caught fire and was totally burned up. Several of the workmen sustained injuries.

## JUDGE PARKER SCORES TRUSTS AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

Baltimore, June 25—Judge Parker was elected temporary Chairman of the Democratic National Convention. Mr. Bryan nominated Senator Kern to oppose Parker. The latter declined the honor and named Mr. Bryan to make the fight.

**MR. BRYAN'S SPEECH**

Mr. Bryan claimed the right to speak today on the ground that in three Presidential campaigns he had borne aloft the banner of Democracy as its Presidential nominee. Now that the fruits of victory were at hand, he said, he should not be denied an opportunity to rejoice with his party. The Democratic party—"a pillar of fire by night for the plain people"—now that the dawn had come, should, he declared he made a "pillar of cloud by day." Mr. Bryan made another point which elicited unbounded enthusiasm from his hearers. He declared that the sinister influences which had been at work in the Republican National convention at Chicago were operating even more brazenly at Baltimore. But, he added the Democratic party could not be run by the Ryans or bought by the Belmonts.

### TARIFFS AND INEQUALITY OF WEALTH

Judge Parker after a scathing criticism of the recent Republican convention and of Col. Roosevelt in particular, said in part:

In this great country which boasts of a wealth of one hundred and thirty billion as against eighty billion of Great Britain and Ireland sixty-five billion for France and sixty billion for Germany all are conscious that too large a part of our wealth has been secured by a small percentage of our population and that the cost of living rises faster than the average income.

The principal cause of all this is to be found in the tariff statutes and in the combinations restraining trade and competition created for the purpose of wringing from the public every dollar which the tariff statutes make possible.

The average of duties under the tariff of 1789 was eight and one-half per cent. Now the average is fifty per cent.

In 1842 the average was 32 per cent in 1846 it was reduced to 25 per cent which worked so well that a reduction to an average of 20 per cent followed in 1857.

Protected interests benefited by two increases during the war, the first to an average of 37 1/2 per cent the second to 47 per cent. That high average, then excused only by the exigencies of the war is exceeded now, as the average is nearly 50 per cent.

The Republican party has thus heaped the machinery of government to enrich the few at the expense of the many. That increase of 30 per cent in the average has taken thousands of millions from the general public and devoted it to the creation of swollen fortunes.

The same party which shut out foreign competition was found willing to permit the formation of combinations which effectually banished home competition. The common law on the subject and the Sherman act were treated by Republican officials as repealed by implication.

### THE AWAKENING OF THE PEOPLE

An awakening of the people led the Republican National Convention of 1908 by its platform to promise a revision. True, it did not in terms promise a revision of the tariff downward, but its assurance of a revision of the tariff by a special session of Congress to be called immediately after the inauguration of the next President was intended to hold the tariff-reduction Republicans in line, while the trick in the phraseology was to be made clear to the tariff beneficiaries.

In vain did the people demand of Congress the fulfillment of the Republican pledge, for the masters of that party—the protected interests—insisted on the pound of flesh nominated in the bond. And it was yielded. Congress passed and the President signed the Payne-Aldrich bill.

One outcome of this breach of faith was a Democratic House which has acted so wisely and courageously as to arouse the enthusiasm of the people and inspire the Democratic party with justifiable hope of early opportunity to render a public service so sorely needed.

Under sagacious and intrepid Democratic leadership special bills have been passed having for their purpose a revision of the tariff downward ultimately to a revenue basis. The Presidents' use of the veto power has postponed, however, the hour when the people shall enter into the en-

### FAILURE OF RECIPROCITY IN CANADA

The temporary failure, owing to the action of the electorate of Canada, of the effort to effectuate reciprocity with that country is regrettable. The agreement proposed was in the interest of the people of both countries. The movement started was in the right direction because it was toward a competitive policy. Its immediate and laudable purpose was to lessen the cost of living in each country.

Whether later the mutual advantage of our respective people shall be appreciated by our neighbors across the border, the consciousness that we took the right course should content us. In all probability, however, the sober second thought of the people of Canada will induce reconsideration of the action of last year.

### THE CEMENT REDUCTION

The temporary reduction of the duty on cement by the Canadian opponents of reciprocity is significant of the results that in due course may be expected.

All honor to the Democratic House, our proposal.

For the ills that flow from that tariff increase from an average of 20 per cent. to 50 the Republican party is responsible. For the continuance of that rate against the efforts of a Democratic Congress a Republican President is to blame. It is evident therefore that relief can come only through the election of a Democratic President and Congress.

Mr. Taft said in a speech in 1908 that during the preceding ten years nine-tenths of the combinations to restrain trade had come into existence.

Little was done by the party in power to retard the weedy growth, and that little feebly. That an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure was never so forcefully illustrated. The prevention of combinations would have protected all the people and harmed none. The process of destruction punished the innocent investors as well as the guilty organizers.
