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Fredericton Loses at Winter Port; Woodstock Trimmed

It was plainly seen yesterday afternoon that George Winter and his Greeks have been getting in some good batting practice and as a result they pounded Bates and Brown of Fredericton for 16 safe ones, with a total of 24 bases, and won the game on the Marathon ground by a score of 12 to 5.

There was a good crowd present, and Chick Fraser, who arrived yesterday, was given an ovation when he went on the diamond. Winkler, the new pitcher was also on the field, and looks like real goods, although he was not playing in the game.

Larry Connolly's place in left field was taken by Fraser--Connolly was the star catcher for the Greeks' last season, and is a good ball player, and he showed up well yesterday while practicing with the team.

The visiting team went to bat first, and the manner in which they started in it looked as if they were going to have a walk over. In the first inning they had three singles, a two bagger, a base on balls and a bad throw by Tarbell resulted in four scores. In this inning the Marathons were blanked.

In the second inning a base on balls and a two base hit gave the team from the Capital their fifth and last run, and for the next seven innings they did not get but one man past first base.

The Greeks started in to bat in the second, and by the aid of four hits and a poor throw of Duggan from centre field to third base gave the home players three runs. After a base on balls and a hit had been made off Bates in the third inning, Bates was benched and his place was taken by Brown. This did not stop the Greeks from hitting, however, for they found him for two hits which resulted in that many runs.

Important Matters Enagage Attention of Baseball Executive

Harrington Case Decided in Favor of Fredericton--July 10th Date on which Clubs must get Inside Salary Limit

A meeting of the executive of the New Brunswick and Maine League was held in Houlton yesterday afternoon when several matters which have been agitating the different clubs were taken up and disposed of. The most important business transacted was the decision to increase the salary limit of the teams in the league from \$1000 per month to \$1150.

This will permit of an even faster class of baseball than has been played so far and will give the game more action for their money. The proposal to increase the limit was made by the St. John representatives at the meeting and was supported by Fredericton. Houlton at first demurred, while the Woodstock representative said he had authority to go to a certain limit, but it was not as far as the St. John and Fredericton representatives desired.

The salary list of \$1150 is the largest which has been permitted since the league was formed and should result in making the games faster than they have been. Another decision reached and one which will do much to elevate the game was that profanity on the ball field must be eliminated. The league executive decided that the patrons of the game should be protected in this regard, and a motion was adopted under which all team managers must notify their men that the

THE NEPTUNE-FREDETTE FINES

The fines struck against Joe Neptune of the Houlton team, and Bobby Fredette also of Houlton, for unruly conduct on the field in the recent game with Woodstock, were reported as not yet collected, and the management of the Houlton team was instructed to collect them at once. A dispute regarding a rain guarantee of \$50 due from the Fredericton club to Woodstock was considered, and ordered paid.

FRANK HARRINGTON'S CASE

The Fredericton representatives asked for a ruling from the league as to which team had the call on the services of Frank Harrington, the Wakefield, Mass., pitcher, who at one time pitched for the St. Peter's team in this city. Evidence was submitted from Fredericton and Woodstock the league decided that no team in the league has any call on Harrington and that player was free to sign with any team securing his services first. It is understood that Fredericton will act at once on this decision and it would not be surprising if the Wakefield man joined P. J. Dugan's squad very soon.

FLYNN WILL BE CAUTIOUS IN HIS FIGHT WITH JOHNSON

Kilbane to Fight Dixon on July 4 for Featherweight Title--Johnny Shaw Knocked out

East Las Vegas, N.M., June 27--Contrary to the predictions of sporting writers and some of his trainers, Jim Flynn, the Pueblo fireman, yesterday declared that in his battle here July 1 with Jack Johnson, he will not use rushing tactics. Flynn said he would fight a cautious battle and would make the champion come to him. This time, he asserted, he would let Johnson do the rushing, because Flynn had rushed Johnson in a battle several years ago and was knocked out.

Las Vegas is rapidly becoming a tented city for the accommodation of the crowds expected here for the fight. The National Guard Armory, the Opera House and Commercial Club rooms have been fitted up as dormitories.

New York, June 27--Walter Monahan of Pittsburgh, knocked out Johnny Shaw of Brooklyn, in the fourth round of their scheduled 10-round bout last night at the Royale A. C. Monahan took a terrific beating in the first three rounds, but came strong in the fourth and with use of hard right hooks drove Shaw three times in the fourth round. The third knockdown was much for Shaw and he refused to get up.

Kansas City, Mo., June 27--Tom Dixon, featherweight champion of the south, was matched here today to meet Johnny Kilbane, the world's featherweight champion at Cleveland, July 1. The bout will be of 12 rounds.

In connection with the new salary limit it was decided that the teams should be given until July 10th to get down to it and on that date affidavits as to the total salary list for players on each team must be filed with the secretary of the league. Three of the four clubs represented expressed dissatisfaction with the work of Umpire Duffy, but the league decided to take no action for ten days.

A HYPOTHETICAL CASE.

Herschell Shaw of Houlton, brought up the question of the league constitution which provided that before a team can sign a player released by any other team in the league the consent of all the teams must be obtained and submitted a hypothetical case covering the question. He thought that if Houlton, for instance, wanted a player which the Marathons were willing to release, it was unfair to make the trade conditional upon the sanction of Fredericton and Woodstock being obtained.

Others present pointed out that such a situation might arise if the Houlton and Fredericton teams were fighting it out for the pennant at the end of the season and any one of the other two teams were hopelessly beaten. In this event St. John or Woodstock might have a player who was superior to anything in the league in a certain position and being unable to win themselves might be willing to release, it was unfair to strengthen the Houlton team in order to beat Fredericton out, or vice versa. For this reason it was felt that it would be unwise to make any change in the section of the constitution covering such cases as it stands at present. Mr. Shaw admitted the justice of this view and the matter dropped.

MEETING MOST HARMONIOUS.

The meeting was a most harmonious one and the visitors are loud in their praises of the hospitality of the Houlton representatives who placed the Elks' handsome club house at their disposal for the meeting and strove in other ways to make their visit a very pleasant one.
