THE LIBERAL POLICY CLEARLY DEFINED

"Our policy has been, is, and will be, so long as the Canadian people continue to place in us the confidence they have shown us during 15 years—and that policy is to seek markets wherever markets are to be found. We are above all an agricultural people, our chief wealth is the growth of those products of the temperate zone fruits, cereals and vegetables, and it is our boast—not an idle boast, but a boast founded on actual experience—that in cereals, vegetables and fruits we can, without exaggeration beat the world.

"At the northern extremity of the temperate zone, our cereals have more strength, our fruit has better flavour, our vegetables have more delicacy than similar productions from other parts of the world and under free competition not barred in any way by tariff legislation, they will displace all other products on the tables of the wealthy. Our object today is to open the door of the American market, to open the door of a nation of 90,000,000 which has been closed to us for the last 50 years and when we are at last on the eve of reaching that long sought object we were met with objection after objection, we are deluged by a plethora of sophistry, we are told that if such an arrangement is to go into effect and Canadian vegetables, cereals and fruits can cross the boundary line and be eaten free of duty by the American people it will be all over with the Canadian confederation and even the British Empire will reel and rock upon its foundations."—Extract from speech by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Parliament.

WESTERN CATHOLIC CHAUTAUQU

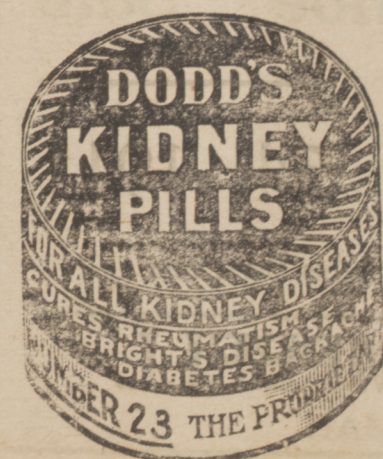

LUMBER USED BY CAR AND FURNITURE MANFRS.

(Moncton Transcript.)

W. Frank Hatheway had a letter in The St. John Globe the other day stating some of his views on the reciprocity agreement. He admits that reciprocity will be an undoubted advantage to the lumbering interests of this province, but fears that it will result in the depletion of the forests. Some people will be inclined to think that this is a rather unreasonable fear. Reciprocity is much more likely to bring home to the people the value of their forests and lead to the adoption of the measures to preserve them. Probably the great trouble now is that we have a very inadequate appreciation of the possibilities of the lumber industry, and do not take as much care of our forests as we ought to do. If the government sees to it that lumbering operations are carried on as they ought to be, there need be no fear of the depletion of our forests. Mr. Hatheway's expression of fear amounts to a confession that the government which he supports is not alive to its duties, or not competent to deal with a problem which demands attention, independently of the fact that reciprocity may create a greatly increased demand for forest products.

Governmental neglect has resulted in greater destruction of our forests by fires than any activity of the lumbermen consequent upon an increased demand for forest products by the American market could do in many years. One very desirable effect of the increased activity of the lumbermen which will follow the adoption of the reciprocity pact, will be to increase the government's revenues, and enable it to take proper precautions against the forest fires. The government will be able to employ more forest officials, and oblige the lumbermen to conduct their operations upon some reasonable system, and neither destroy the young growth, nor leave the field of their operations littered with brush which, as it dries, converts great areas into veritable firetraps. The lumbermen, under reciprocity, will be able to make more money, and they can have no cause of complaint if they are compelled to conduct their operations in a way calculated to assure the preservation of the forests. And if the government sees to it that the exploitation of our forests is conducted on the system which has been adopted in Germany, there need be no fear that they will ever be depleted; and as James Lawlor, secretary of the Canadian Forestry Association, told the convention at Fredericton a year or so ago, the government may hope to get eventually a revenue of over \$90,000,000 a year in the way of royalties from its forest lands. In view of that possibility, Mr. Hazen's government and its supporters appear a bit ridiculous when they oppose reciprocity and the opportunity it presents of developing an industry which may ultimately yield the government such a revenue, to say nothing of the amount of labor and capital it would employ, and the prosperity it would diffuse all over the province.

HON. MR. MORRISSEY PREDICTS LIBERAL SWEEP

(St. John Telegraph.)

That, in the event of a Dominion election in the fall with reciprocity as the issue, the Liberals would sweep the country, was the opinion expressed by Hon. John Morrissey, M.P., chief commissioner of public works, who was in the city yesterday afternoon attending a meeting of the local government. Northumberland, his own constituency, he said, in speaking to a reporter for The Telegraph, would go strong Liberal and, with the exception of York county, he expected that every province in the province would go likewise.

He said he would also be surprised to see St. John city return a Conservative in the event of any election being held.

"I tell you," he remarked, "the opposition in Ottawa will have to be made up of a different class of men than it is at present before the country will rally to its support."
