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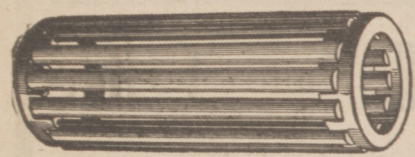

GRAIN GROWERS

WILL NOT NOMINATE

Brandon, July 28.—The grain-growers of western Canada decided at a meeting here last night that in the approaching election separate candidates will not be nominated for Parliament to represent that powerful agrarian society. Instead a resolution was adopted that members exert all their influence in the party with which they affiliate to have candidates named who will be favorable to the principles advocated by the grain-growers. This decision is expected to govern the association in the three prairie provinces, though it is not necessarily binding. The activity of this powerful organization of farmers threatened to seriously complicate the political situation in the west if they placed separate candidates in the field. This decision will be a relief to the old party leaders, for it means no third party men, at least for the present. An element in the meeting last night desired to create a third party. The secretary and president of the organization left hurriedly for Ottawa today in order to get the grain bill through before dissolution.

Through with Fighting Game in England—Thinks he was ill-treated on Uther Side

London, July 31.—Hugh McIntosh, the Australian promoter, who a few days ago announced he had all of the big fighters including Sam McVey, Jack Johnson, etc., under contract, declared today that he was through with the English fighting game. He is going back to Australia and will take his stable of fighters with him. The overseas colony is wild over the fighting game and McIntosh believes he can make real money there.

He complained bitterly today that he has been double-crossed by men he considered his best friends and advisers, and lost most of his money as a result. According to him certain men who have been aiding him openly to break down the monopoly of the National Sporting Club has been conspiring with the officials of that club to separate him from his money.

While the National Sporting Club has been bidding against him for big contests, McIntosh said today he learned that none of its offers have been of a bona fide character. Men in his camp have been utilized to influence him to make offers at purses, which precluded his making any money.

"The British are the worst sports in the world," said McIntosh today. "They want the cream of everything and no outsider has a chance here. It is back to Australia for me short ly, and I will get my money back there easily."

GERMANY TO HAVE A GIBRALTAR

Berlin, July 31.—What is regarded as one of the most important steps yet taken toward strengthening German sea powers will be accomplished tomorrow when the entire Island of Heligoland, which commands the entrances to the great ports of Hamburg and Bremen, will be taken over by the military authorities and converted into an independent fortress rivaling Gibraltar in completeness of defense. It will be manned by a separate force of troops and officers and will be constantly equipped with a supply of ammunition sufficient for all emergencies.

Score was 3 to 2, Greeks Winning in Last Inning—Bates Pitched Well

Errors at critical times by Fredericton infielders let the Marathons score two runs in the first inning of yesterday's exhibition game at St. John. The Fredericton team pulled up tying the score in the seventh inning. In the last inning Tarbell drove a long fly out to Tift in centre field, which the centre fielder caught but could not return to the plate soon enough to prevent McGarry from scoring the winning run.

The Telegraph's account of the game follows:

In an exciting exhibition game of ball on the Marathon grounds yesterday afternoon, Fredericton was defeated by the Marathons with a score of 3 to 2. It was a fast game from start to finish and Pitcher Tarbell for the winning team, and Bates for Fredericton, were greatly admired for their work in the box. The Marathons made two runs in the first inning. After two men were out Riley hit to Callahan at short who threw badly to first. Riley stole second. Connolly drew a base on balls. McGarry hit to Howe on third who muffed, and the bases were filled. Nelson smashed a single to left field, scoring Riley and Connolly. Lynch flied out to centre and retired the side.

Fredericton made their first score in the third inning. Tift was hit by a pitched ball and went to second on Duggan's sacrifice to pitcher. L. Conley got a base on balls and Hughes singled to left field, scoring Tift.

There was no more scoring until the seventh inning, when, under the same manner as in the third, Tift brought in the second run for Fredericton, and tied the score. He was hit by a pitched ball and went to second on Duggan's sacrifice and scored on L. Conley's single to left. The men from the capital were blanked in the next two innings and the score was still tie when the Marathons started in for their ninth and here is where they won the game. McGarry singled to right field and Nelson bunted safe to third. Lynch hit to pitcher, who muffed and there were three men on bases. Tarbell flied out to centre field and McGarry brought in the winning run on the throw home.
