



cultural nation on the face of the globe. Every edible plant grown in the north temperate zone is grown to perfection in this country. Fifteen years ago our farm products were valued at about \$169,000,000. Last year they were valued at \$70 millions of which the grain crop alone accounted for 330 millions. Since 1900 alone the farm products have shown an increase of 210 per cent. In 1896, we exported to Great Britain farm produce to the amount of 62 millions. Last year the export was 138 millions. In the same period the export of our farm products to other countries has increased from 50 millions to 150 millions. The value of the live stock has increased threefold as well.

The growth of our cities has also been very remarkable. Toronto has grown from two hundred thousand to over four hundred thousand, and its yearly building statistics from four millions to twenty-one millions. Montreal has grown from less than three hundred thousand to fully six hundred thousand, and its real estate values proportionately. Building sites in the business district of these cities which fifteen years ago could be bought at five dollars per square foot are now selling at fifty-five dollars. Winnipeg has grown from 35,000 to 200,000; Vancouver from 3,500 to 11,000; Edmonton from 5,000 to 40,000; Calgary about the same, while there are scores of cities of from five to fifteen thousand today which had no existence till after the date named. Montreal's assessment has risen from \$150,000,000 to \$430,000,000; Toronto from \$115,000,000 to \$315,000,000; Winnipeg's from \$35,000,000 to \$175,000,000 and Vancouver's from a few millions to \$140,000,000. These are dazzling figures.

The Toronto "News," the leading Conservative newspaper of Canada, in a special issue devoted to Canadian progress and Canadian resources says: "It would appear therefore from the rapid growth of the country in the past few years, and from the many favorable indications that this growth will continue; we shall see real estate values rise to higher levels. Today we have a population of 8,000,000. It is no exaggeration to say that ten years hence the population will have doubled. As stated before, the twentieth is Canada's century."

Such are a few of the facts and such is the confession of an enemy regarding the wonderful development of the decade past. The work of the Laurier regime stands patent to all. He found it brick and left it marble. Such has been the work of the great statesmen whom the electors, in a moment of weakness, delusion and panic, have removed from power. Will his successor be able to continue the great work? Time will tell, but we look to the immediate future with many doubts and not a few fears for the outlook. The Liberal party has been smitten, but Liberalism is as full of life and vitality as ever. The cause of the common people in their fight against entrenched privilege and predatory wealth is never lost. The millionaire, the monopolist and the plutocrat have won for the time being and the government is in their hands, but there will be a strong opposition in the House and Sir Wilfrid will still be their leader and there is no fear but that the triumphant party will be put through their paces. The Ministers who have been defeated will doubtless find some seat elsewhere and ere long again be in the line of battle.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

TO ATTEND UNVEILING IN ATLANTA

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 28—Ten thousand troops from many States will march through the streets of Atlanta one week from next Tuesday in the great military parade in connection with the unveiling of the Old Guard monument. The monument is to commemorate the tour of the Northern States taken by the Gate City Guard of Atlanta a few years after the close of the civil war to remove some of the ill feeling which prevailed during the reconstruction days. Among the famous military organizations that have accepted invitations to attend the unveiling are the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston, the Old Guard of New York, the State Fenethios of Philadelphia, the Fifth Regiment of Maryland, the Richmond Blues, the Washington Artillery of New Orleans, the Governor's Foot Guard and Putnam Phalanx of Connecticut, the Montgomery Blues, the Mobile Cadets, the Citadel Cadets of Charleston, and the Governor's Guard of Columbia.
