THOMAS J. LYNCH NOT LIKELY TO BE REELECTED PRES.

Barney Dreyfuss of Pittsburg Opposed to Reappointment as Head of the National League

New York, Sept. 26.—Thomas J. Lynch in all probability has been elected for the last time as president of the National League. A bitter fight will be waged against him at the league meeting in December should he aspire to succeed himself. That fight while it might not be led by President Barney Dreyfuss of the Pittsburg Baseball Club, will undoubtedly be supported by him. Mr. Dreyfuss is against Lynch.

It has been known for some time that the league's executives actions have not met with the approbation of the Pittsburg club officials. Exceptions have been taken once or twice to decisions rendered by Lynch—decisions, it is said that were in direct contradiction to the league constitution; but at the time no action was taken to force Lynch to show cause.

Now, however, a showdown has been called for. The action of President Tom, in turning down the Pittsburg club's protest of the extra games played last Sunday in Cincinnati and Chicago has aroused Dreyfuss's ire and he has declared that Lynch must show where the error lies—in other words the league chief must either prove the constitution to be wrong or else admit that he himself is exceeding the authority invested in him.

CONSTITUTION IS VIOLATED

The protests were entered because the constitution says that when the teams concerned have opened dates no double-headers shall be played.

There was a second date on which the second games of last Sunday could have been played.

When President Dreyfuss was approached on the subject of what action he intends to take in the matter he protested that he had nothing to say yet.

"Let's wait until the baseball season is over," he said; "let's wait until the league meeting in December."

PROBABLE LINE-UP

When the crucial test comes it is expected with Pittsburg, Cincinnati, and probably St. Louis will line up against Lynch. Murphy of Chicago has never had much use for President Tom, and if Chicago's votes go wrong, Philadelphia's will go the same way. Indeed, it would not prove so surprising were a coalition formed, with Pittsburg, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Chicago and Philadelphia opposing Lynch. It is hard to say whether this arrangement would stand the test of voting for another candidate but when it comes to declaring against the incumbent the five will undoubtedly be found of one voice.

The Chimes trotter Melody, who is winning over the half-mile tracks, is owned by Mars Cassidy, the running horse starter.

Tommy Murphy says he has a high-class trotter for the futurities next year in Katy O'Neill, by Moko, owned by A. H. Cosden.

The dead Onward Silver, 2:05, is represented at the races by Spanish Queen, 2:04; Dorothy Hansboro, 2:06; and Pansy Silver, 2:09.

MT. ALLISON RAISES WAIL ABOUT WEAK RUGBY TEAM

Not yet Known if Paisley will Coach --Forwards Light--Seven old Players Available

Sackville, Sept. 27.—With the re-opening of Mount Allison University interest in the Intercollegiate Football League has revived here. Already the collegians are at work on the preliminary preparations for the matches for the King-Richardson trophy. As yet, however, it is difficult to judge of the material on hand and the prospects of the season.

Of last year's fifteen, Trappell, full back; McDougall, half; McKean, quarter; Lawrence, Cochrane, White, Peacock and Moore are among the missing, though White will probably return to college a little later on. Should he return, however, he will not be in the game, as he is recovering from an attack of typhoid fever. There are thus on hand this year of last season's team Frank Smith of St. John, Milford and Godfrey, halves; Dickinson and Cautain Buckley, quarters; Parker and Woodman, forwards. Then of last year's substitutes Grant, half; Thompson and Fuller, quarters, and Lewis, forward, are again available. Just what new material is available is not yet certain as some of the new comers have yet to turn out.

The outlook is that there will be considerable material on hand for practice, but how good it will prove is very much a question. The forward material is apparently unusually light and that is causing the boys considerable worry, as last year's forward line was altogether too light and was outweighed in all the college games. At this writing the Mt. A. men are evidently feeling a bit glum but they are getting into harness with vim and hope to give the other teams at least a run for the honors. So far as one can rather, however, they are anything but hopeful of retaining the trophy.

U. N. B. FORWARDS LACK WEIGHT BUT PROSPECTS ARE FAIR

Red and Black Squad Worked as Teams Yesterday—Fredericton City had First Practise

The U.N.B. Rugby squad received its first hard work-out yesterday, when Coach "Babe" Church selected two XV's and pitted them against the other. There were upwards of forty men out in uniform and during the practice changes were frequently made in the two teams to give all the men a chance.

TEAM WILL BE LIGHT.

The Red and Black team, according to present indications, will be lighter than usual, particularly on the forward line. That is a deficit however, that can be counterbalanced by speed. The half-line has available material in Howe, Willis, Machum and McGibbon, men who have figured there last year and in preceding seasons. Besides there are Frank Donnelly, Murray and others who are out after places. Charley Barry, who was discovered late last season as a full-back, is doing as well as ever in that position. MacDonald, formerly of St. F. X., has played full-back, but has not yet turned out. Harry Lynch, who played with U.N.B. several seasons and who was with St. F. X. last year, will return to U.N.B. Lynch is one of the best forwards playing with college teams in the Maritime Provinces and would be a decided strength to the Red and Black.

CITY PLAYERS OUT.

The Fredericton City team held its first work-out at Scully's Grove yesterday afternoon and will work out every day this week at 5 p.m. The turn-out was small last night, but more players are expected to be out today.



DEPARTMENT OF THE NAVAL SERVICE

A competitive examination will be held in November next at the examination centres of the Civil Service Commission for the entry of Naval Cadets for the Naval Service of Canada; there will be 25 vacancies.

Candidates must be between the ages of 14 and 16 years on the 1st of January next; must be British subjects and must have resided in Canada for two years immediately preceding the examination; short periods of absence abroad for purpose of education to be considered as residence. Successful candidates will join the Royal Naval College at Halifax, in January next; the course at the College is two years and the cost to parents, including board, lodging, uniform and all expenses is approximately \$400 for the first year and \$250 for the second year.

On passing out of College, Cadets will be rated midshipmen, and will receive pay at the rate of \$2 per diem.

Parents of intending candidates should make application to the Secretary Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, before the 15th October next.
