MOUNT A. WILL NOT PRESS FOR UNDERGRADUATE HOCKEY

Executive of Sackville College Decided Not to Take Initiative in Matter--Garnet and Gold Has Big Squad of Players Working Out For Positions.

Mr. Allison, according to advices received from Sackville, has no intention of bringing up the matter of excluding graduate players from the Intercollegiate Hockey League. However, it is possible that if Acadia should take the lead in attempting to alter the rule governing eligibility, the Mt. Allison people will support her. That is quite natural in view of the fact that some very strong graduate players are eligible to play on the U. N. B. team during the present season.

MT. ALLISON'S ATTITUDE.

A letter recently received by a local man from Sackville says:

"The report is going around down here that U. N. B. boys are worked up a bit because they think that Mt. A. and Acadia are going to push the scheme to bar post-graduates from the hockey league. Mt. A. does not intend to push the thing. The boys discussed it in the executive the other evening and decided that Mt. A. would not take the move up. If Acadia chooses to press it, Mt. A. may support it, for it would be in their interest so have graduates barred, but Mt. A. will take no initiative action, and any talk about there being an agreement between the two colleges to put the thing through is just hot air.

"Of course Mt. A. is not acting this way simply out of love for U. N. B. But one or two of the boys held that

for Mt. A. to try and push the thing through would look too much like putting the knife into U. N. B.

THE MT. A. SQUAD.

"At present, Mt. A. has White, of Woodstock, and Rollie Smith, of St. John, practising in the nets. Lewis a Sydney player, Milford, Cochrane, Murray, a son of Premier Murray of Nova Scotia, Coates and Milton are trying out on the other defence jobs. Milton is also a forward candidate. McDougall, Godfrey, McDonald, a Truro boy; Thompson, the Islander who was a sub. quarter on the football team; Machum, a St. John Freshman; Fuller, McAllister, of St. Stephen; Fraser of St. Stephen; Murdoch and one or two others are working on the forward lines. McDougall, Godfrey, Thompson and McDonald are probably the most likely lot, but McDougall, Godfrey and McDonald are all centre ice men and that may make some trouble."

HOW COULD IT BE DONE?

It is rather difficult to see how such a change in the rules could be made so as to effect 1911 hockey, at any rate, even should Mt. A. and Acadia decide to act together. It is also peculiar that the rules governing Intercollegiate hockey should be subject to alteration merely because in a certain season one or two teams think they are placed at a disadvantage by them.

PARK ASSOCIATION PLANS JULY AND SEPTEMBER MEETS

The Fredericton Park Association at its annual meeting last night, organized for the year and decided to hold race meetings in July and September. The meeting in the latter month will be in connection with the provincial exhibition to be held here. The Park Association will continue this season under exactly the same management as last year, and with that same policy which gave the Association such a banner season in 1909.

At the annual meeting held last night the president, Mr. Thomas H. Colter, occupied the chair. Reports on last season's business were read by the treasurer, Mr. C. Hugh Calder, and then the directors of 1910 were re-elected as follows:

In the fall there will be three days' racing in connection with the Fredericton 1911 exhibition—three days being the limit allowed for harness horses racing in any week under the Miller bill, which now governs racing in Canada. The dates will be from Tuesday, September 19th, to Thursday, September 21st, and there is a possibility of the program calling for three races daily.

A committee was appointed to interview merchants, manufacturers, hotel proprietors and the exhibition directors regarding guaranteeing stakes or purses for the season's races, as is done in the American cities.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
