The Marathons put a spoke in our wheel yesterday for they pulled out a victory by the score of 1 to 0 in a game which was never surpassed in Fredericton. It was anybody's game until the last inning. Then Fredericton's chances went one by one. Bates and Winter had a great pitcher's battle between them with honors even. It was a base on balls the only one allowed by Bates during the game, followed by two singles that gave the Greeks their solitary run in the fourth inning. The locals more than once had what seemed to be good chances to win the game but nothing came of them.

STILL AT HEAD OF LEAGUE

The result of the game still leaves the Fredericton team at the top of the N. B. & Maine League but with the narrow margin of seven points between them and the Marathons. Today the locals went to Woodstock for a league game and on Saturday to St. John for another game with the Marathons. A lot of things may happen as a result of these games. If Fredericton wins both the team will have the standing of .667 at the end of the week, and the Marathons will be second with .600. Should they have a standing of .640 and Fredericton lose both the Marathons Fredericton would be second with .571 or in third position if Calais should beat St. Stephen on Saturday. If the team wins at Woodstock but loses at St. John the Greeks will have first place by a margin of 21 points. If the reverse happens the standing will be, Fredericton, .619; Marathons, .600.

YESTERDAY'S GAME

Yesterday's game was fast. Four men faced Bates in the first inning. Fryer and Williams struck out. McGarry hit safely but Nelson flied out to Griffin. For Fredericton Larry Conley started well. He put out a nice single to centrefield and went to second on Ganley's sacrifice. Duggan put up a fly to McGarry and Frank Hughes struck out. Bates was solid as a church in the second. Riley went out on a foul to the catcher. Connelly struck out and "Bucky" Lynch was thrown out by the short stop. In their half of the inning the home team did almost the same Bob Conley fanned. Callahan put up a little fly to the second baseman and Griffin did the same to Riley. In the third the visitors looked dangerous. Winter flied out to P. J. Duggan. "Tanker" Hughes at this time pulled off one of the best plays of the game fielding the ball to third base in time to catch Lynch and retire the side. Fredericton could do nothing in this inning. Ganley hit to Winter and Duggan to Riley. Hughes put up a pop fly that Hughes got under.

FREDERICTON'S CHANCE

The fifth inning was marked by two of the Marathons interfering with Fredericton players and being put out for so doing. Nesbitt was safe on Griffin's error. Fryer hit to Duggan and the first-base man put

the ball to second. Callahan took the throw and Nesbitt ran into him knocking the ball out of his hand. Nesbitt put up a kick that he was safe but that did not go with the umpire. Williams just after stood right in Murray's way when he was trying to field a pop foul. The umpire handed the same thing out to him. On both decisions the visitors raised a howl. McGarry retired the side by flied out to Hughes. In the second half of the inning it was only the hardest kind of luck that kept Fredericton from scoring. Bob Conley was the first man to bat. The first ball that Winter pitched he drove to deep centre for three bases. With no one out and a man on third it seemed that only a miracle could keep the home team from scoring. The crowd began to root. Callahan came to bat and hit straight to Fryer. Ganley was coaching Conley on third and told him to hold the base. Owing to the noise made by the crowd the base-runner misunderstood and tried to get home. Fryer had no trouble catching him. In the eighth with two out Larry Conley hit safely and Winter filled the bases by passing Bob Ganley and Duggan. Hughes was asked by the crowd to murder the ball but all he could do was to fly out to Nelson. The ninth inning brought Fredericton the last hope of winning. White the new out-felder was sent in to bat in Callahan's place and Tift in Griffin's. Bob Conley made a poor start by striking out. White drove out a nice clean single to left field and the crowd began to yell. White spoiled the effect of his hit and dished Fredericton's chances by making an apology of stealing second and getting caught a mile off the bag. North Randall Track in Great Shrapc—Soprano Wcn Great Race in 2.08 Trot

Cleveland, Aug. 9.—The North Randall track is fast. If there are any horse fans skeptical on this point just let them look over the cold figures of this afternoon's programme and be convinced. For the four events contested this afternoon, two trotting and two pacing, the time average for the quartette of races was just 2:06½.

The pacing heats were slower than the trotting events, the slowest averaging 2:07 13-16, while the trotters averaged 2:05 21-32.

SOPRANO FORCED OUT

In the Fasig stake for 2:08 trotters Billy Andrews repeated his performance of a year ago, when he won the Fasig stake with Teasel, by winning today with Soprano. To win, however, Onruin had to drive Soprano the fastest heat trotted this year and incidentally the fastest two-heat race of the year.

Pitted against Soprano was the Austrian bred stallion Willy, who showed sensational speed in the opening heat, and forced Soprano to step in 2:03½ to win.

WORLD'S RECORD TIED

A world's record was tied today when the free-for-all trotters headed by Dudie Archdale equalled the four-heat time average of the race won by Norman B. at Columbus in 1905. In that race Dr. Strong won the first heat, Snyder McGregor the second, and Norman B. the next three.

The fastest heat in that race was 2:05½, trotted by Snyder McGregor in the second heat, but today Joan trotted the second heat in 2:04½, while the average for the four heats was 2:06 5-16.

CLEAN-UP BY WALTER COX

Walter Cox made a great clean-up with Ernest in the 2:10 pace. In addition to beating Black Joe, the favorite, Ernest distanced My Shady Belle, Dora J. and Zulu Hal, and incidentally collected first, third and fourth moneys.

Eleven pacers started in the 2:14 pace, and after the cripple Hal Kin won the first heat in 2:05½, Eddie Dillard landed the next three rounds handily. Ed Geers made strong finishes in the third and fourth heats with Akar, which made it look as if the veteran had started to drive sooner in each heat he might have won.

The Cleveland pacer Oral met with an accident on the back stretch in the second heat, when his hoppers broke, thus forcing him to stop and be distanced.
