will reduce their operations from the
average amount of 25,000,000 to about
10,000,000 feet and smaller concerns
will curtail proportionately.

REPEAL OF PIKE LAW.

There are several reasons for this
great shrinkage of the Aroostook
log cut. The lumber market has been
very dull this year, the New York
demand especially, having been slack,
and a great many millions of feet of
logs have been "hung up" or stranded,
on the way to boom, so that there
will be a lot of old stock available
for next year's sawing. The falling
off in the operations of concerns saw-
ing Maine logs in New Brunswick
mills is chiefly accounted for in the
repeal of the Pike law, under which,
for forty years, the product of such
logs was admitted free into Ameri-
can markets. The lumber now has to
pay a duty of \$1.25 per M.

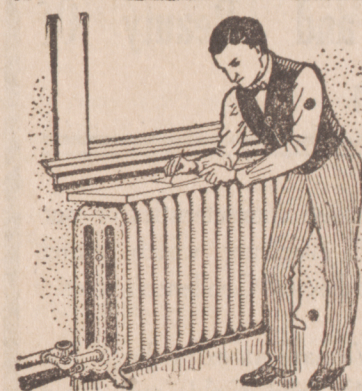
