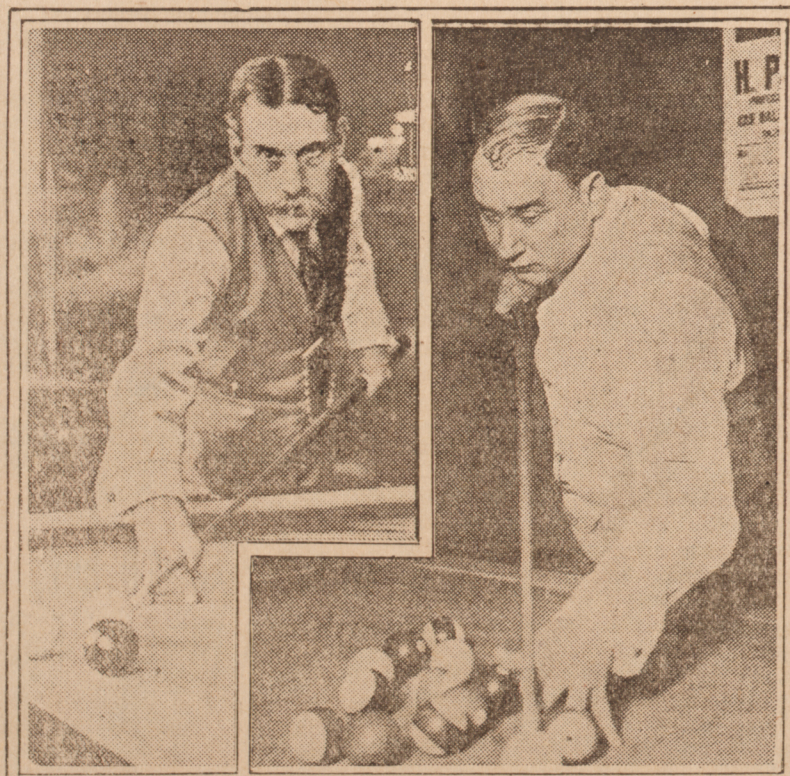

A RAT TRAINER'S
UNIQUE CLAIM

(Montreal Herald.)
"Rats wanted. Color, age or nationality immaterial. Tenderer is requested to state training and experience of rodents."

Will the city call tenders for trained rats or will it be content with engaging the services of an ordinary rat-catcher? A request of this nature it is understood is to be made to the Board of Control, by authorities in whose hands rests the welfare of the citizens' health.

Rats and the important part these rodents play in carrying plague germs has been recognized for years, and the wholesale onslaught on their numbers in England during a scare of bubonic plague recently was in line with the appreciation by medical men of the menace they are to the public health. Montreal is a seaport, and as such is not immune from a scourge by this dreaded plague, and the authorities intend to take precautionary measures.

BISHOP OF LONDON
WRITES OF FREDERICTON

The Bishop of London, writing of his recent visit to Canada in the Treasury, has the following reference to St. John and Fredericton:

"There were enough bishops left (we had shed off several by that time) to go round all the churches of St. John (to be carefully distinguished, at the risk of great offence, from St. Johns, which is the capital of Newfoundland), and we all did our best to give our messages at two churches apiece, while the chaplain-general, who did yeoman's work all through among the men, had a mass meeting of men in the biggest hall of the city as well.

"Then came another beautiful steam up the spacious St. John river for eighty miles to Fredericton, where the faith and love of Bishop Medley long ago built the dignified little cathedral by the side of which he is buried. It was not exactly 'roses, roses' all the way, but it was private cars and private steam yachts all the way, and just as often lent by Presbyterians or Roman Catholics as by church people. This is part of the noble generosity of spirit which breathes through Canada.

"Fredericton reminds one of Salisbury and Lichfield. It has an old Cathedral Close appearance about it, chiefly owing to Bishop Medley having surrounded his beloved cathedral with young trees, which have now grown to a good height. Although it is the centre of government and a cathedral town, it only contains about 8,000 people. Nothing could exceed the warmth of our welcome there, and the service in commemoration of the bicentenary which was held there soon after our arrival, and at which I preached to a great congregation."

This was his lordship's second visit to Canada, and in the course of the article he expresses the belief that this country will have 100,000,000 population in a few years.

HOW TO COMBAT
FOREST FIRES

Quebec, Jan. 20.—The Committee on Forest Fire Legislation made report at the Forestry Convention today. A brief analysis of the different laws existing in each Province shows great variety of method.

It is pointed out that, while the objects and main features or principles might be made more alike, the methods of application must vary with different conditions. The forest fire law of Nova Scotia is declared the best and most efficient, designed for a well settled country, but would only partially be applicable in other provinces.

The essentials of proper fire legislation are discussed in detail, and it is pointed out that proper organization of a protective service is more essential than legislation should not be specific but allow wide latitude in making rules and devising methods to the head of the fire service, who with all his assistants, inspectors and fire wardens—a permanent organization—should be made responsible for the safety of the districts in which the country should be subdivided.

The construction of watch towers equipped with necessary apparatus, the building of trails and telephone lines, while not inexpensive, are essential to complete success, and a supreme effort should be made, even if cover expensive, to stop the evil. To discover fires rapidly and prevent their spread to unmanageable extent would be secured thereby.

The report concludes with the statement of belief that the people are ready for a supreme effort to get rid of the fire evil which threatens to wipe out a large portion of the natural resources of the Dominion, not only in timber, but in soil, thousands of square miles of which are now turned into barrens.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head

of a family, or any male over 18

years old, may homestead a quarter

section of available Dominion land in

Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person

at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-

Agency for the district. Entry by

proxy may be made at any agency, on

certain conditions, by father, mother,

son, daughter, brother or sister of

intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon

and cultivation of the land in each of

three years. A homesteader may live

within nine miles of his homestead

on a farm of at least 80 acres solely

owned and occupied by him or by his
