## TAYLOR RISKS DISQUALIFICATION IF HE GOES TO NEW GLASGOW

Montreal Wanderers Drew Renfrew "Cyclone" in Shuffle--Ottawa Willing to Waive Claim--Harry Scott has Approached Taylor on Behalf of New Glasgow--Moncton Made Him Good Offer

(Canadian Press.)

Montreal, Q., Dec. 22--If Fred Taylor the bald headed Renfrew cyclone wants to go to New Glasgow to play hockey this winter, there is only one bar in the way, and that is that he will be per anently disqualified so far as the National Hockey Association is concerned. Taylor was drawn by Montreal Wanderers in the Renfrew deal.

Ottawa doesn't want him particularly, but Taylor wants his civil service position at Ottawa guaranteed or be furnished with a ten thousand dollar bond. Under the present troubled state of government positions, the Wanderer management are doing what they can to secure the hockey star's position, but there will be no ten thousand dollar bond. He hasn't signed his Wanderer contract yet.

SCOTT TALKED TO HIM

Harry Scott of Fort William who

starred with Moncton last year and who played with New Glasgow this season, has been after Taylor's services and also tried to sign Marty Walsh, who is a hold-out on Ottawa. Scott had a talk with Taylor in which the "Cyclone" intimated that it didn't matter where he played as he got the price he wanted for it. Scott asked him if he would consider an offer from the New Glasgow team, and Taylor replied in the affirmative. "It will have to be \$1,500 though," said the former Renfrew star, "Scott thinks that his team would give that sum to land the Cyclone and it is waiting instructions from the Nova Scotia town. It is said that Moncton offered to give Taylor \$1,300 for the season. Scott also talked to Harry Gaul and Joe Dennison and the latter is likely to go to New Glasgow.

## WINNIPEG CITY VOTES GRANT FOR ENTERTAINMENT OF SCOTCH CURLERS

Winnipeg, Dec. 21--The Board of Control decided to recommend to Council that an additional grant of \$4,000 be made to the Manitoba Curling Association, the money to be applied for the entertainment of the Scotch Curlers, who will attend the bonspiel. The visitors are to be the guests of the city, and the \$4,000 is to be used to pay their hotel bills and for their special entertainment during the bonspiel. The cities of Montreal and Toronto are treating the Caledonians in a similar manner.

A grant of \$1,000 has already been made by the city to the association this being by the way of an annual grant. The association asked for an additional sum of \$5,000, but the board, after investigation, thought that \$4,000 would be sufficient.

The Manitoba Curling Association is preparing to give the Scotchmen a magnificent time during their visit to the greatest bonspiel in the world. A special feature of the programme will be theatre nights at the different theatres of the city.

## JAKE STAHL AND HARRY SMITH BOTH ARE REINSTATED

Cincinnati, Dec. 20--Player Garland (Jake) Stahl, who has been mentioned as the possible manager of the Boston American League team next season, was reinstated without the infliction of a fine by the National Baseball Commission, in a decision promulgated today. Stahl violated a rule of the commission by failing to report during the season of 1911 to the Boston American League club to which he was under reservation.

In his application for reinstatement Stahl stated that while he retired from baseball last spring to go into business, he now desired to rejoin the Boston team.

Harry Smith, who played with Brooklyn team, also was restored to good standing without having to pay a fine. Smith was suspended for leaving the service of Brooklyn last spring without the permission of any of its officials. In extenuation of his action Smith declared he was anxious about the condition of his wife, who was ill, and that he wished to be near her.

Marty O'Toole, the \$22,000 pitcher, has a bad shoulder and Pittsburgh is filled with the little glooms.

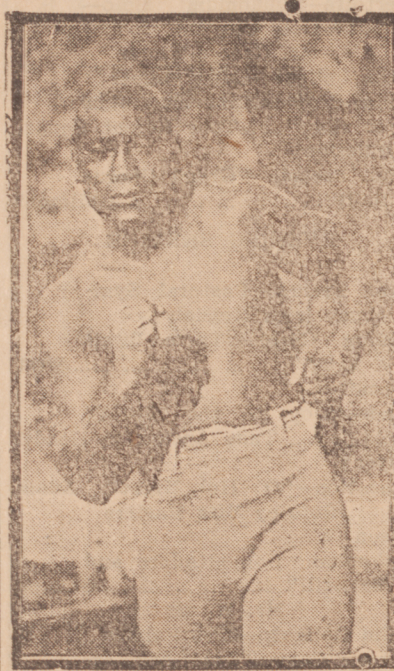
It is said that Connie Mack is anxious to acquire Bradley, of the Boston Red Sox, to the Athletics' roster.

## JACK JOHNSON RETURNS FROM HIS SOJOURN IN EUROPE

Denies Report of His Retirement--  
Will Fight Any Man Living for  
\$30,000 Purse

New York, Dec. 22--Jack Johnson the champion pugilist, arrived here early today on the steamer Kron Prinzessin Ceilie from Europe. A crowd of the champion's friends were at the dock to greet him and received him with a long round of applause. The big fighter's first words phrased an energetic denial of reports that he had retired from the ring. He proceeded to state that he was willing an anxious to defend his championship against any man in the world. "All I want is my price," he said. "If any club will hang up a purse of \$30,000, I will fight my man living."

When told that reports from the other side of the Atlantic said he was not in condition and weighed more than 300 pounds, Johnson flung back his coat, stuck out his chest and exclaimed: "I've lived a quiet life while abroad. All that talk about my rumpages in France and England is rot, I'm in fine condition and weigh no more than 235 pounds." He then proceeded to a scale and stepped onto it. The beam registered 235 pounds.

## RUGBY FOOTBALL PAYS IN TORONTO

(Toronto News.)

Varsity had a good financial year so far as rugby was concerned this fall, the Blue and White quitting over \$10,000 ahead on the season, and at this rate they will be able to go ahead and continue the concrete grandstand all around the field without bothering about the cost in the slightest.

Over 40,000 attended the games this fall, and there is not the slightest doubt that with more accommodation of the same kind as that which is offered on the west side of the field, the attendance would have been even larger.

The receipts for the year amounted to \$20,544.31, which includes the final intermediate and junior intercollegiate games and the Mulock Cup final. The expenditures totalled \$5,696.94, which left a balance on the right side of \$14,847.37. The final game, of course, was the most expensive, but that can be laid mainly to the cost of the new bleachers. The Montreal trip, as usual, was a costly affair, totalling \$517.46. The expenses for the Dominion final were \$2,355.63.

The intermediate and junior games brought in very little money. The time the two soldiers' teams from R. M. C. played at the stadium they brought in just \$68.25, and the Mulock Cup final, between Junior Arts, and Victoria, brought in another \$65.70.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties--Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties--Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
