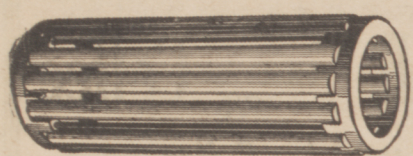

AMERICAN TROTTER PROVED SUPERIOR IN MIXED RACE

Stanley Mack Won 2.17 Trot and 2.20 Pace Class with Prince Wilkes, Favorite Second—Miss Letha Got Second Money in 2.12 Pace—Frank Patch Winning Premier in 2.30

Stanley Mack in the mixed class, Frank Patch in the 2.12 pace and Premier in the 2.30 pace were the winners yesterday, the first day of the July harness meet at the Fredericton track. Premier and Frank Patch were the favorites in their classes but the talent had been away off on Stanley Mack. Prince Wilkes ruled as a favorite in the mixed class with Frank Power as second choice. The Yankee trotter after making a poor showing in the first two heats won in fairly easy style in the last three Premier Wilkes the favorite won two heats but was unable to come on when needed during the other heats. He was heavily backed and the spectators did not feel particularly joyful when he got nothing better than second money.

In the 2.12 pace, Miss Letha furnished the excitement making Frank Patch go to win in the last two heats. Her performance in the third heat brought the grandstand to its feet.

In the 2.30 there was little excitement Premier having everything his own way.

The crowd at the races was not so large as it should have been and the attendance should be better today. The racing was too long drawn out the final heat in the mixed race not finishing until within a few minutes of seven o'clock. The repeated scoring particularly in the mixed race was mainly responsible for the dragging of the races. Spectators and drivers alike complained of this feature of the starting.

The grey mare had lots of friends among the spectators and when Frank Patch came back and won the third heat she was again a good second, the Patch horse winning by the closest of margins after Letha had gone a great mile. The last heat was largely a repetition of the third but Frank Patch won in easier fashion, the race being between Letha and Thoughtful with the Marysville horse getting the place.

2.30 PACE

Premier took the 2.30 pace in straight heats. The first he won in 2.20½ the horses getting away on the fourth score. Premier held the lead from the start, Daisy B. which was favored for second place appeared to be lame and finished fourth Freda Posey getting second. The Fredericton mare came back in the next two heats however taking second easily.

MIXED CLASS

The 2.17 trot and 2.20 pace class furnished the excitement of the day. Stanley Mack, F. B. Rideout's horse from Medford, Mass., was the winner but got only sixth place in the first heat with eight starters. Prince Wilkes was the strong favorite in spite of Frank Power's showing at Woodstock. The way the Wilkes horse won the first two heats seemed to indicate that public confidence was well founded but in the third Stanley Mack came to his own winning in 2.16½ with Prince Wilkes a close second. After that the gray was not in the running and almost got the flag in the fifth heat. Masterpiece a Massachusetts trotter came in for third money in the last heat. Grand Rapids, Mich. July 26.—At Comstock park track, yesterday the 2.20 trot for the \$2000 Grand Rapids railway purse was won by Argot Hal with nine starters and only four to finish.

Adeleross was the favorite, but the best she could do was to take fourth money. Argot Hal won the first two heats and had a long lead for the third, but had a break which gave him a fourth place finish.

The first heat started with Aero, the fastest horse owned and driven by "Pop" Geers, in the lead. Anvil second and Argot Hal and the rest pretty well strung out for the first half mile. At the half mile post the three leaders bunched and at the stretch Anvil took the lead but was speedily passed by Argot Hal.

In the second heat Aero broke at the start and Argot Hal took the lead which he kept until the end, with Aero retaining a close second and only losing first honors by a neck.

Argot Hal took the lead in the third heat with Anvil second, Mary G., third and Hannah Louise fourth, and those places were kept until the grandstand was reached when the leader broke and the other horses passed him.

The 2.14 trot for a \$1000 purse was a hotly contested one. Game Maid, the winner, and Hal Atkin, were the horses did the prettiest work.
