Baltimore, Md., May 8.—Frank Gotch the titleholder and Gus Schoenlein, (Americus) of Baltimore, will contest for the world's heavyweight wrestling championship, at the 5th Regt. armory here, on May 30, Decoration Day.

Word that Baltimore had secured the match in competition with Kan-Boston, was received by Schoenlein today. Gotch is to receive 40 per cent. of the gross receipts and Americans 35 per cent., while the remainder will go to the Monumental Club for expenses in staging the contest.

RAIN EXPENSIVE FOR LEAGUES

New York, May 8.—Baseball postponements due to rain have cost the big league clubs nearly \$2,000,000 thus far this season. Up to yesterday there has been twenty-seven postponements in the National League and twenty-one in the American, and receipts so far this year are much below normal.

Figuring on an average attendance of 6,500 the forty-eight unplayed games mean that the clubs are \$74,000 receipts from 312,000 persons.

"A large company of the members of the parish of the Church of the Saviour, Episcopal, and their friends gathered at the guild room of the church Monday night for the purpose of uniting in a farewell to Rev. and Mrs. G. R. E. MacDonald, who left this week for Fresno to reside. There was no set form of entertainment, and the evening was passed in an informal manner, with social converse and a happy time generally. As a token of esteem and of the friendly relations between the rector and the members of the parish, B. L. Barney, on behalf of the parish, presented to the retiring pastor and family a set of solid silver salad forks and a set of silver bouillon spoons. The Society of the Knights of King Arthur also had part in the gift presentations, Rev. Mr. MacDonald being the recipient from that organization of a brass desk set, the presentation being made by John Kolb. The young ladies of St. Martha's Guild also showed their regard for the rector by presenting him with a solid silver asparagus fork, the presentation being made by Miss Edna Holyroyd. Refreshments were served during the evening, and the affair was altogether a pleasant one, and all united in wishing Rev. and Mrs. MacDonald much happiness and success in their new field of work."

"Very Rev. G. R. E. MacDonald, Dean of St. James Pro-Cathedral, begins his duty today, officiating at both the morning and evening services.
