WHERE THEY WILL GO AND WHEN

The formalities of the customs house are quickly and courteously transacted and serve chiefly to remind the visitor that he is in another land, but still within the realms of His Majesty King George V. Carriages will be provided to take The Mail's party to the big Hamilton hotel, where headquarters will have been reserved for them in advance.

Six days will be spent in Bermuda.

The many places of interest on these beautiful islands can be thoroughly explored. The scenery is diversified and the vegetation luxuriant; palms and many brilliant flowering trees and shrubs, the brilliant plumage of the birds, and the picturesque coast line, with its coral reefs, forming a constant succession of lovely pictures. Bermuda is an important naval military depot of Great Britain, and the presence of the garrison contributes greatly to the social attractions of the place, while the red-coats and bluejackets add variety to the street scenes.

Carriages will be provided on one day for the drive to St. Georges, a picturesque old town, once the capital of the Islands. Visit en route to the Devil's Hole and view the remarkable collection of many species of beautiful tropical fishes. A steamship trip to the reefs is made to view the "Sea Gardens"—coral grottoes. A trip in glass-bottomed boats is provided that our party may view the beautiful aquatic plants, anemones, seafans, fish, etc., in their native element at the bottom of the sea. The royal dockyard is visited on the excursion, also the celebrated Bermuda aquarium, one of the world's finest collections.

Other entertainments and excursions are being arranged for the party, so that their stay on the Islands will be one round of pleasure and profit, from an educational standpoint. The visit to Tom Moore's house, in which he lived in 1804, will be of special interest to lovers of the great Irish bard. Mr. Moore wrote of Bermuda:

Could you but view the scenery fair,
 That now beneath my window lies,
 You'd think that nature lavished here
 Her purest wave, her softest skies.

ON TO NEW YORK.

Leaving Bermuda our party will be taken to New York on the Quebec Steamship Co.'s fine new steamer, "Bermudian," a trip requiring two days and nights. In New York two days will be profitably spent, the mornings in riding about the city in the great touring cars, the afternoons in visiting the shopping districts, the art galleries and museums of natural history. On both evenings one of the famous Broadway theatres will be visited, members of the party being allowed to choose the play they would most like to see. Among the most notable places to be visited while in New York are: Wall Street, Trinity Church, the Battery, the Aquarium, Flatiron Building, Singer Building, Madison Square and the famous Metropolitan Life Building, Central Park, Grant's Tomb, etc.

Leaving for Washington on the night train, our party will have three delightful days in that city. The itinerary includes visits to Congressional Library, the Mint, Senate Chamber, all Government Buildings, Mount Vernon, and a drive along the famous Potomac.

Returning by way of New York again, our party will visit Boston and then return home by rail, tired out but happy and full to bursting with delightful reminiscences of a splendid tour with which to regale their friends.

FINAL VERDICT

Augusta, Me., Nov. 7.—The governor and council announced last night their decision to accept the corrections on the vote of Limestone, Westfield, Athens and Martinic, which defeat the repeal of constitutional prohibition by 753 votes.

Gov. Plaisted announced that he would call a special session of the Legislature, probably in February.

One of the three reasons given by Gov. Plaisted for calling the legislature is to "submit an amendment to the constitution which will permit the enactment of laws concerning the liquor traffic which are capable of honest enforcement because sustained by the sentiment of the several communities to which they will be applied."

Gov. Plaisted, speaking to the council, called attention to the fact that the resolve for the election made a special session of the legislature imperative.

"These are strong reasons why the legislature ought to assemble before another general election is held," he contended. "Our laws relating to the conduct of elections need revision. The irregularities connected with the last election are nothing short of scandalous. The recent election has left regulation of the liquor traffic in an even worse position than it was before the election."
