THE STOCK MARKET TODAY SHOWED SLIGHT DECLINE

New York, N.Y., Nov. 10.—Second in importance only to the approval of the Tobacco plan is the decision rendered by the Commerce Court after the close of business yesterday, which granted a temporary injunction to the railroads restraining the enforcement of the Inter-Mountain rate schedules, which were some time ago imposed upon the transcontinental lines of the Interstate Commerce Commission. While this injunction is only temporary, it nevertheless indicates very clearly that the court doubts the justice, and perhaps even the constitutionality of the Commission ruling. The matter will eventually reach the Supreme Court, which may define the powers of the Interstate Commission in a way that will restrict the activities of that body. A reversal of the ruling on Inter-mountain rates would mean a difference of many millions of dollars, and usually of gross revenue of the railroads. This news, supplemented recently by favorable developments in the situation at large, greatly aided the bull position in the stock market.

SYNOD DECLARED FOR MINIMUM STIPEND OF \$900 AND HOUSE

The Synod sessions ended last evening, the business of the concluding session being rushed through. The next session will be held in St. John, beginning on the first Tuesday of November, 1912.

The report of the standing committee was adopted. It recommended the establishment of a minimum stipend of \$900 and a house, but did not recommend the immediate appointment of a financial agent to carry out the recommendation. It was suggested, however, that Bishop Richardson at the Laymen's Missionary Congress, to be held in St. John shortly, lay the matter before the laymen of the church.

On the motion of Mr. F. E. Neale, a resolution was passed recommending the appointment as soon as advisable, of a financial secretary to visit the various parishes.

The reports of the Sunday School commission, governors of King's College, Colonial and Continental Church Societies, Women's Auxiliary secretary of synod, printing committee on moral and social reform were received and adopted.

It was decided that the money to be raised for Kings College be retained and the interest paid over.

The notice of motion given by Rev. D. Conners to the effect that no party to a marriage after a divorce, granted for cause arising after marriage, shall hold any office, parochial or diocesan, stands over until next session, there not being sufficient time to consider it.

In pursuance of notice of motion by W. M. Jarvis, the grants from the widows and orphans special fund were increased from \$150 to \$250.

Changes in the forms of statistical returns were decided upon.

The usual votes of thanks were passed before the synod adjourned.

GREAT INTEREST TAKEN IN REVIVAL SERVICES AT METHODIST CHURCH

A lively interest is manifested in the special services being conducted every night in the Methodist Church by Pastor Neil McLaughlan. Mr. Jas. Lemont holds the musical baton, and the enthusiastic selections from the Torrey song-book serve as a reminder of the great evangelist's rink campaign eighteen months ago. Special numbers have a place on the program every night—a solo, duet, or quartette. The well rendered quartette last evening was by Misses Lottimer and White and Messrs. Young and Seggee. Miss Jennie Torrens was the accompanist. The exercises usually are bright and varied and the pastor will not allow any long-winded addresses or prayers. In proof of this Rev. S. A. Baker, pastor of the Reformed Baptist Church, was invited to deliver a nine-minute address, and although he only exceeded the allotted time one-half minute, he spoke from three texts, including John III, 16, with much pathos and held the attention of the large congregation. Many a preacher with only one text has demanded the attention of his audience three times as long. Rev. J. J. Colter and Mrs. Colter, Rev. Thos. Stebbings and several others took part in the exercises. In some respects the meeting was a wonderful one, and the pastor could only promise good seats to those who arrive early tonight. In response to the invitation extended by the pastor last night six or eight persons expressed a desire to flee from the wrath to come.

The New York Women's Trade Union League in its report for the past year stated that its membership through union affiliation has reached 52,184 of which number 20,129 are women. Among the new features of the past year has been the organization of a strike council, incorporated with a fund of \$10,000 to be used for emergency strike purposes during strikes for women workers.

ASK GOVTS. TO BEAUTIFY ALL CAPITAL CITIES

(Continued from page eight.) example in every way to the municipalities dominated by it. Its officials should be men of the highest type chosen from the whole province for their worth and efficiency.

"That whilst it is universally admitted that a general movement being made toward every improvement which can be achieved in every city, and it is quite becoming that public property in cities that occupy the dignified position of national or provincial capitals of this country should be properly cared for by the national or provincial governments.

"That this Union of Municipalities views with favor and will uphold with all the influence in its power any initiative which may originate either in the national or provincial capitals of Canada to promote the improvement and embellishment of such cities in a manner which would tend to make them models of development and progress to all municipalities.

"That this convention is of the opinion that such cities as are the provincial or federal capitals are under heavier obligations than other cities and have to shoulder obligations of a much more expensive nature than other localities in the form of public receptions, exemption from taxation for federal and provincial properties and such embellishments as tend to beautify the seats of government."

EMPRESS OF BRITAIN WAS IN COLLISION

Liverpool, Nov. 9.—The C. P. R. liner Empress of Britain, arrived here this afternoon after having been in collision with a local steamer of the Gulf of Man, a small island in the Irish Sea, near the southwest extremity of the Isle of Man this morning. The liner was very little damaged but the other vessel put into harbor in the Isle of Man in a water-logged condition.

BOOMING PANAMA-PACIFIC SHOW

Phoenix, Ariz., Nov. 10.—A large delegation representing the San Francisco Commercial Club has arrived here to participate in the celebration of Panama-Pacific international exposition day which is to be observed at the Arizona State Fair tomorrow.

RECORD IN WOODS IS FORTY-SEVEN LIVES

Washington, Nov. 8.—The United States Biological Survey has added to the roster kept by that bureau of all hunting fatalities in this country, forty-seven names of victims thus far this year.

"One fact which we have learned during the three years we have kept this record," said Dr. T. S. Palmer, chief of the bureau, "is that there are practically no deer-hunting accidents in states which prohibit the shooting of does. This is to be cause in these states the hunter hesitates a moment before firing to determine whether the animal is a doe or a buck. In case the animal happens to be of the two-legged variety, that brief pause before pulling the trigger is enough to save his life."

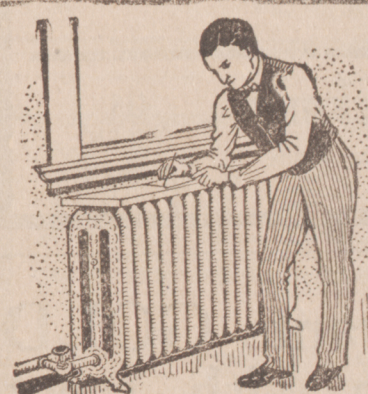
