TO WITHDRAW
STEAMER VICTORIA
AT END OF WEEK

Business not Warranting Daily Service by One Line--Shippers Transporting Potatoes by Scows

The steamer Victoria of the St. John River S. S. Company's line will make her last trip of the season to this city returning to St. John on Friday. She will then be laid up for the winter. This is a remarkably early date for the withdrawal of a steamer from the Fredericton-St. John route. The Steamer Elaine of the St. John River S. S. Company's line will continue on the route giving a tri-weekly service for that line which will be kept until the close of navigation. The steamer Hampstead will also be maintained on the Gagetown-Fredericton route.

The withdrawal of the Victoria is due to the falling off in business. The passenger business generally decreases in the fall and the freight business has also been seriously affected although ordinarily the autumn sees an increase in business of this class.

CHANGE IN SHIPPING METHODS

One reason for the falling off in freight traffic is the change in the method of shipping potatoes which has gone into general effect this year. Formerly the river steamers transported large quantities of potatoes from points along the river to St. John and Fredericton whence they were shipped to market. This year the method generally practiced by potato-shippers is to have scows placed at points along the river where they can be conveniently loaded. When loaded the scows are towed to St. John by tugs and their cargoes discharged directly into steamer or warehouse.

By this procedure the cost of cartage and rehandling is saved. It is estimated that 3000 barrels of potatoes have been shipped by scows from Sewell's so far this season 2,500 barrels from Burton and large quantities from other points. The shipping season is by no means over yet. The general adoption of the mode of shipping potatoes is largely due to Mr. F. del. Clements who has planted a large acreage in potatoes and who was one of the first to ship by scow.

PRICES INCREASED

The prices being paid by shippers for potatoes are \$1.40 to \$1.50 per barrel. On the other side of the international boundary the ruling prices are \$2.00 to \$2.25.

Better prices on the local market are expected however but it is extremely unlikely that the figures current in the United States will be reached.

Percy Seely, city traveller for the same house, have returned from a very successful hunting trip and brought with them probably the finest moose head shot this season and one of the finest ever secured in the Province. The antlers, which are very symmetrical, have a spread of 62 inches, 13 points on either side and with fine broad pans. The moose was shot at Schooner Lake, near Gasperau, Mr. Joseph Flowers was the guide.

CURTAILMENT
OF LUMBER-CUT
ON MIRAMICHI

Mill yards Filled with Deal Sawed this Year--British Market Shows Few Signs of Improvement

A slack winter as far as lumbering operations are concerned is what seems to be promised for the Miramichi as well as other parts of the province. This is due to the depression in the British lumber market which it is feared will continue for some time to come. Hon. John Morrissey stated this morning that although it was difficult to forecast what would happen in the lumber market was generally expected that the cut by Miramichi operators would be curtailed. Mr. Morrissey stated further that the extension of the time for the free exportation of pulp-wood from the province would not have much effect towards bettering conditions.

NOT A DEAL SHIPPED

Many operators in Miramichi have not shipped a deal so the British market preferring to hold their lumber in their mill-yards to selling in a low market. Recently an increase in freight rates in New Brunswick to British ports has aggravated conditions for the lumber operators. With a season's cut in the mill-yards it is highly improbable that any large amount of lumber will be brought out of the woods next spring. Conditions in Great Britain at the present time do not seem to indicate that better prices will be realized in the near future.

NEW ATTORNEY
GENERAL TAKES UP
WORK OF DEPT.

Surveyor General Completing Business of Solicitor General's Department --Further Changes Expected

The new attorney general of the province, Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, took a firm grip on the reins of office this morning and proceeded to place the business of his department in proper condition for his handling of it. Other members of the provincial executive remained in the city today engaged in routine business connected with their departments. The Surveyor General, Hon. H. F. McLeod, is completing the business of his former office by representing the Crown today at Woodstock in a murder trial.

NOT UNEXPECTED

The decision to allow the office of solicitor general to remain vacant was not unexpected but is quite certain that the vacancy is but temporary. Hon. Robt. Maxwell is quoted in the St. John Telegraph today as saying that the vacancy would remain until after the next general election.

MR. WILSON'S POSITION

It is also practically assured that Mr. John E. Wilson, M. P. P., for St. John City will enter the provincial cabinet at no distant date without portfolio. Hon. Robert Maxwell being provided with a government position in order to make room for Mr. Wilson. It is well known that Messrs. Maxwell and Wilson have been pulling against one another in St. John City for some time past with the result that the local government party there is split into two factions. The elevation of Mr. Wilson to cabinet rank is calculated to heal the breach. This agreement concerning Mr. Wilson's advancement was reached, it is understood, a few days ago when Premier Flemming went to St. John and conferred with the interested parties. At present Hon. Mr. Maxwell is president of the executive council.

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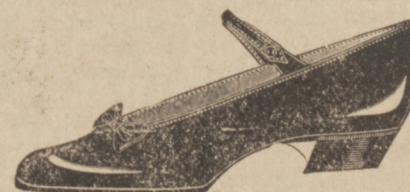
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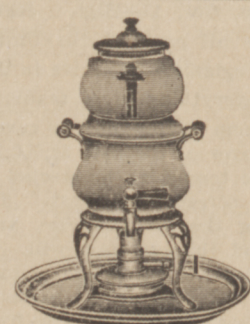
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
